IRA BUTLER, AGED 97, DEAD

VENERABLE POLK COUNTY PIONEER PASSES AWAY.

Was Familiar Figure in Monmouth, Where He Took Active Interest in Affairs.

MONMOUTH, Or., Jan. 15.—(Special.)—Ira F. M. Butler died at his home here today, being at the time of his death 96 years, 7 months, 26 days old.

He was born in Kentucky in 1812, when his father was a private in the last war with England.

At the age of 17 he removed to Illinois with his parents, where he remained until he came to Oregon in 1852.

He served as a private in the Black Hawk war under his father, who was a commanding officer. During his residence in Illinois he served a term as Sheriff and was also Clerk of the Circuit Court for a period of seven years under Stephen A. Douglas.

In 1855 he was married to Mary Ann Davidson, of Kentucky, with whom he

resided for three terms in which he was Speaker of the House, in 1857, he was County Judge from 1878 till 1882.

In his home town on his birthday Mr. Butler was annually remembered by a host of friends, who would spend the day in visits of cheer and good will. In his daily life he represented the best type of the pioneer; always mindful of the welfare of his neighbors and fellow-citizens. His every effort was to give aid and help to those in need and also to conserve the interest of his county and state.

He leaves three children, a wife and five children having passed away before him. Those who survive him are Miss Maggie Butler, Miss Allie Butler, of Monmouth, Or., and S. A. D. Butler, of Napa, Cal.

D. W. BAILEY IS REPORTED BY UMATILLA GRAND JURY.

Alleged to Have Forged \$600 Note Against Mrs. Mary E. Coffey at Pendleton.

PENDLETON, Or., Jan. 14.—In the report of the Umatilla County grand jury, made to Judge Bean this afternoon, was a charge that a member of the Umatilla County bar had been guilty of grave misconduct.

The grand jury recommended that the state and county bar associations investigate the matter.

District Attorney G. W. Phelps stated this evening that the lawyer referred to was D. W. Bailey, and that the misconduct was in connection with a \$600 note alleged to have been forged against Mrs. Mary E. Coffey, of this city.

Judge Stephen A. Lowell, of this city, stated as a member of the grievance committee of the State Bar Association, of which Thomas G. Greene, of Portland,

is chairman, that the state association would make investigations at once.

Chairman James A. Lee, of the Umatilla County Bar Association, is out of the city at the present time, but other prominent members of the bar state that the matter will be taken up at once.
