Scottish Rite Cathedral at Morrison and Lowland streets, has lost its usual aspect of activity since the close of the final exercises yesterday. The concluding ceremonies began at 2 o'clock. General Pike's Book Presented.

Those members receiving as high as the 14th degree were presented with a copy of "Morals and Dogma of the Scottish Rite Masonry," written by that celebrated author, Mason and post, General Albert Pike. The poem "Isadora" with its refrain of "Thou art lost to me forever, Isadora," is one of the most beautiful in the entire language. General Pike was one of the most known and most brilliant of the long roster of Masonic geniuses.

The concluding ceremony of the class was characterized by former gatherings. After the conclusion, refreshments were served to the class in the hall of the cathedral, and final farewells and congratulations were exchanged.

The next semi-annual meeting of the Scottish Rite lodge takes place in June, during the Grand Lodge meeting week. The members of the present class are looking forward to this event with pleasant anticipations of another visit to Portland.

The eighth cathedral class of the Scottish Rite Masons held its banquet last night at the smaller dining hall at the Commercial club, and it was a most delightful gathering of choice spirits, animated by good will and fraternity, the guiding principle of the order. The table was decorated with carnations, and the members and visitors sat down promptly at 5:45. The opening words of welcome were given by President C. Roberts, of the class, and the response of welcome was delivered by Judge Grant B. Dimick, of Oregon City.

Dr. Charles S. Hosmer, of psychology, followed with an address on psychology, taking up particularly the subject "Fact" as a moving force spiritually as well as physically in the affairs of life.

The great speaker, E. G. Jones, spoke of the high ideals of Masonry, and the telling influence of Masonic principles in building up character, and molding life to higher values. He was followed by Colonel Robert A. Miller and H. W. Scott, who paid beautiful and eloquent tributes to the lofty essence of the order, and pointed out that the spiritual key to the arch Masonic was good will to all men.

SIXTY-ONE CROSS HOT SANDS

At Kader Temple, A. A. O. M. S.

BUILD SOON INTO CENTRAL OREGON

Work Will Begin Within Two
Months, Says General
Manager O'Brien.

RETURNS FROM TRIP EAST

Reads of Harriman System Have Not
Yet Decided Between Proposed
Routes, but Are Completing
Their Estimates.

"Authority will probably be given us to start work on the Central Oregon line within the next two months," said General Manager O'Brien, of the Harriman line, upon his return yesterday from an extended trip East. While Mr. O'Brien's trip was largely a personal one, he dropped in at Harriman headquarters in Chicago and New York and talked business with the heads of the system. Some of this talk, naturally, was about the mid-Oregon project that promises to be Oregon's biggest piece of railroad construction during 1909.

"They are figuring out which is the best route to reach the Central Oregon territory," said Mr. O'Brien. "We have several alternate surveys reaching the same district. Just which is the most practical one to build, grades, cost of operation and difficulty of construction being considered, is what has not yet been decided."

O'Brien Favors Deschutes Route.

"I favor the Deschutes route because I think we will get the best grades, the least amount of excavation, and will in the end prove the most economical line to build and maintain. It is naturally a line of low grades, following very closely the Deschutes River for a long distance."

Three different lines into interior Oregon are being considered for the Harriman line. One is up the Deschutes river, another south from Shaniko, being an extension of that feeder of the O. R. & N., and a third is the extension of the Corvallis & Eastern east from the Corvallis, across the summit of the Cascades near Mount Jefferson and thence down into the Central Oregon prairie to Redmond, the center of the Deschutes irrigation district.

The distance to Redmond, the objective point of all three lines, is practically the same by each route, about 125 miles. The Shaniko route is probably the cheapest to build, costing, it is believed, about \$900,000. This line would not be one of easy grades, but would go up and down hill in a way that would make the profiles resemble the teeth of a saw.

Albany Line Less Costly.

The line from Portland to Albany and Detroit and thence across the Cascades, it is said, would cost about \$2,000,000. It would be a practicable road, but the Deschutes line in point of easy operation and few grades. The Deschutes route is the most expensive of all to build, costing not less than \$4,500,000.

The Deschutes route, if followed, will mean eventually a road south from Redmond to Odell and thence clear across to Odell and thence clear east to the Cascades to Ontario, carrying out the original project of the Oregon Eastern, surveys for which are already on file in the Harriman offices in this city. If the Deschutes line is built, it will have an advantage over any line into the interior that taps the western or southern part of the state, because products hauled out on it will have to find their market in Portland. If that business were drained from the Southern Pacific line entering Oregon from the south, these products might go to San Francisco.

It is believed that another Oregon line involved in the Harriman projects for this state that will be a live one during the present year is the Coos Bay branch of the Southern Pacific. It is thought that work on this line will be resumed during the coming summer. "I believe financial conditions here at home are better than they are in the East," said Mr. O'Brien. "This section is an agricultural country and business here is a barometer of the crop conditions, particularly the wheat crop. I got off bad on the weather while I was away, for I was telling everybody I talked with what a delightful winter



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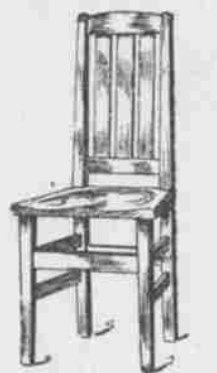
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FIFTH AND STARK STREETS



climate we have. In Chicago somebody called my attention to a newspaper telling of heavy snows here, and yesterday I ran into the storm myself."

Mr. O'Brien said he knows nothing of the purchases of property in the terminal district and has no knowledge of purchases being made there by the Harriman interests.

In regard to the work on the Oregon & Washington, the Union Pacific said there has been no recent progress on this end of the line, although work is going ahead in splendid shape farther north. He does not expect the long tunnel to be started through the Peninsula until the work is still further advanced, for he says the tunnel can be driven in seven or eight months. Mr. O'Brien's office has jurisdiction only over that portion of the Oregon & Washington project lying south of the Columbia River, and the tunnel and the bridge connections, which have already been built, are all he has to construct.

Family Is Not in Want.

Action that doubtless was intended in all kindness, that of a restaurant in the city, in which it was said that a family in Portland was in dire distress and needed assistance from charity, has turned out to have been misdirected.
