

DR. BROUGHER WILL START MOVEMENT

To Preach Sermons on "What Jesus Did" and "What Would Jesus Do?"

QUESTION IS INSPIRATION

Says Revitalizing of Christ-Spirit by Blending of Teachings in Present-Day Life Is Needed for Advancement of Mankind.

Dr. J. Whitcomb Brougher, whose recent trip brought to his notice the widespread movement to introduce the principles of Christ into daily life and conduct by the test-words, "What would Jesus do?" has decided to take up the plan rapidly in his pulpit work here.

Dr. Brougher purposes preaching a double series of sermons, with a morning and an evening service, the morning sermon to be devoted to "What Jesus Did." This will bring in the life of Christ from all its myriad manifestations, and in all its tremendous significance to the world which followed his coming on earth. The evening services will take up the question of "What would Jesus do?" In this way Dr. Brougher expects to establish the principle and unerringly point the moral of what Christ would do in any and every act of daily life.

"My morning sermons of this intended series," he said, "will be taken up with the life and example of Christ as shown by the Scriptures. Among some of the events in his life may be instanced the wedding-feast at Cana in Galilee, his connection with a fishing trip, his treatment of a mother-in-law, his actions at a wedding, at a funeral, at a discussion about the paying of taxes, his methods of dealing with an outcast man, a fallen woman, and a devil-possessed girl, his kindness to the sick, the lame, the halt, and the blind and other of the myriad incidents of his work and teachings.

Sermons on How Jesus Would Act.

The evening sermons will embrace a consideration of what Jesus would do in this life, and applying that question to everyday conditions as we see them around us. What would he do as a pastor, or a member of a church? As a merchant, or a capitalist? As a laboring man, a member of fashionable society, or an editor? These evening sermons are intended to emphasize the value of keeping the Christ-Spirit before us in our daily living with our fellow-men, and not for one day in the week but for every day. We know as Christians that it is our duty to live as Christ would have us live, but this feeling is to a certain sense in danger of being slurred in the abstract. By bringing this question of "What would Jesus do?" into our lives, to bear daily and hourly on our actions and thoughts, we have before us inevitably the concrete possibilities of the application of such an example.

"It is the re-vitalizing, the quickening of the Christ-Spirit by a more intimate

blending of his teachings, not merely in the practical, but in the spiritual uplifting of mankind that is needed. By thus keeping the example of Jesus before us, we can, in imagination, see him with us in our troubles and sacrifices; and by modeling our conduct as nearly as may be according to his deep sympathies, his love, charity, forbearance, sense of justice, faith and kindness, we can experience in our slight human measure this Christ-Spirit.

Induce Bible Study.

"I believe this movement will result in a widespread renewal of a study of the life of Christ, and more especially of the Scriptures. As men grow to learn the fact that the example of Christ to the world has been the most vital of all influences to the cause of the highest Christianity, the deeply and truly spiritual and the advancement of humanity blended in beauty and truth, they will grow to the knowledge that his teachings have in them the solution of all problems that the world now holds. "I believe acting upon this question with faith and daily practice will bring more men and women into the church, and it will turn men's thoughts to prayer, for Jesus prayed constantly for guidance and light. There has been some criticism to the effect that this question shows a weakness, an admission that Christians are not now living as Christ would have them live. I take issue with any such criticism. This question is not intended, certainly, not by me, to be any such admission. Neither do I expect it to be coincided in by all of the members of my congregation. I shall lay the matter before them, and leave them to judge for themselves as to the wisdom of its application.

Question Is Inspiration.

"Take a motto in a copy-book. A child will begin by copying the motto in a hand that will more or less nearly resemble the original motto. Further down the page, after imitating at every line an imitation of the original, the child will end the page with an attempt at the motto which may be scarcely readable. It is the same with the idea of this question, 'What would Jesus do?' applied to every-day life and actions. We may be inclined to various sorts of infirmities, ranging all over the field of human frailty. We are tempted to do wrong, to fail in our duty. The constant question we ask ourselves then, 'What would Jesus do?' is an inspiration. "Naturally men and women will falter from time to time, and lose the influence of this inspiration, but the effect, if persevered in, will be to raise the standard of humanity vastly higher than before.

"My Sunday morning services will give the example of Jesus, my Sunday night services will endeavor to bring this example home to the people in concrete form, so that the layman and churchman, men, women and young people may see the value of it.

Christ-Spirit Essential.

"A layman will sometimes say, pointing to a church-member, 'I am a good man as he.' And so he may be, and yet not be possessed of the true Christ-Spirit, no more than the church-member. Consider what the adoption of even a rite of this spirit means as a spiritual leaving to the indifference to the churches complained of today in the cities. Men and women will not readily attempt to ignore a church which has this spirit, but to churchly gatherings. The vista is wide and beautiful."

Doctor Brougher hopes soon to enlist the aid and attention of Portland's ministers in the movement. He invites all who desire to hear a discussion of the subjects of his discourses to the White Temple at Twelfth and Taylor streets.

SAYS CRUELTY MUST STOP

CHIEF ORDERS OFFICERS TO PROTECT ANIMALS.

Inhumane Drivers Will Be Arrested, While Patrolmen Will Watch Out for Stray Cats.

It is the duty of Portland policemen to look after cats as well as human beings, that is, they must look after the condition of health of the feline population of Portland. It was so ordered by Chief Gritzmacher in a bulletin to police captains yesterday.

The order, however, takes no cognizance of cat maulers; it is only in the state of their health the patrolmen must become interested. Wandering Thomas and giddy Genevieve may continue their nightly prowls on the roof without fear of molestation on the part of policemen or

plain clothes men; it is only stray boots or an occasional brickbat they must dodge.

The order of Chief Gritzmacher has to do with the care of all dumb brutes, cats being especially designated as an object of solicitude on the part of the patrolmen. Certain officers have become negligent in looking after animals and preventing cruelty to them, the chief asserts. Hence, the following order:

Captains of Police: Instruct the officers of your respective commands to give better attention to the matter of preventing cruelty to animals. I am informed by persons taking an interest in such matters that some of the officers of this department give no heed whatever to offenders of this kind. Officers have been seen standing on street corners and teamsters going by driving lame and decrepit horses and no effort made by the officers whatever to interfere or even remonstrate with the drivers in behalf of the dumb animals.

If this be true, and I have no reason to doubt these statements, these officers are not doing their duty in this respect. It is every person's duty to protest and remonstrate against cruelty to dumb brutes and the officer who is paid for looking after such matters and fails to act when confronted with such a case is certainly neglecting his duty. The fact that some officer is detailed especially for this kind of work does not relieve any

one officer from looking after cases of cruelty to animals. You will further instruct officers that this order does not refer alone to horses, but to every animal. For instance, every once in a while I see some poor, sick and miserable cat which ought to be put out of misery and pleasure must do it. It is not only their duty but for humanity's sake they should do so.

High Price Paid for Timber.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Jan. 23.—(Special.)—The Grays Harbor Logging Company has purchased from George Feltz, of Detroit, a tract of timber on the Upper Wishkah for which \$250,000 was paid. The timber was originally bought for \$200,000 and subsequently for \$160,000. Feltz paid \$40,000 for it six or eight years ago.
