

MANY WILLING TO TAKE LANE'S JOB

If New Charter Passes, Fight for Rich Plum Will Be Unusually Spirited.

SELLING URGED TO ENTER

Other Prominent Republicans Have Eyes on Mayoralty, Which They Expect to Wrest From the Democrats.

Who will be the Republican nominee for Mayor against Mayor Lane in the municipal election next June? It is denied by the incumbent of the Mayor's office that he will be a candidate for re-election for the third term but there is a strong impression that when it comes to a show down Mayor Lane will be found in the running. The persistence with which the present Mayor denies that he is a candidate for re-election only adds to the seriousness with which his possible candidacy for the office is regarded.

Of the many aspirants for the Mayoralty, none will admit that Mayor Lane has them "buffaloed." Of the abundance of candidates for the nomination at the hands of the Republicans, none will concede that Lane has the advantage. At the same time, Lane is known to be a politician of more than average ability and while they will not admit it, the various Republican nominees for the job realize that the incumbent of the office is a factor to be reckoned with when it comes to getting votes.

Lane Will Probably Run.

There is but little question but that Lane, if he wishes it, will receive the nomination at the hands of the Democrats. In the primary, he would be opposed by R. D. Finnan and possibly other members of his own party but despite all opposition it is generally regarded that there is a strong probability that he would win out.

Among the Republicans, the situation has resolved itself into a question of who can beat Lane? There are several members of the dominant party that think they are capable of landing the job. During the last few days Senator Ben Selling has been urged as the most promising of Republican candidates to go up against Mayor Lane or any other Democrat or nonpartisan candidate for the office. Senator Selling, however, is reticent about discussing the situation and will give inquirers little satisfaction as to whether or not he will consent to become a candidate for the Republican nomination.

Aside from Senator Selling, there are at least two other members of the charter revision committee who might accept the Republican nomination, should the revised charter be approved by the people. It is reported that either Theodore B. Wilcox or F. E. Beach would take chances on the job if the charter as revised by the commission should be adopted.

Others Who Have Hope.

There are others who, it is understood, would consent to take chances regardless of what disposition may be made of the charter as it may be amended by the revision commission. Among them are ex-Councilman and State Senator Dan Kellisher, who feels that his fight against the alleged paving trust should commend him to the voters; Councilman A. G. Rushlight, close friend of the Mayor and late defeated candidate for the Republican nomination for County Assessor; Colonel D. M. Dunne, Collector of Internal Revenue; State Senator A. A. Bailey, whose support of Chamberlain for Senator is said to have been backed by promises that he should become either Mayor or Postmaster of Portland; and H. C. McAllister, Master Fish Warden of the state, whose acquaintance throughout the city and his personal popularity constitute a valuable asset should he decide seriously to enter the race.

Aside from those whose names have been enumerated, there are others who would like to take the \$200 per annum job that is provided in the amended charter as it has been revised by the commission. Included in that list are Councilmen Baker and McAllister. Friends of these gentlemen are not idle but are organizing considerable strength in their support.

RETINUE IS LARGE

Large Corps of Assistants Comes With Sunday.

USES HIS OWN METHODS

Exhorter Who Will Speak at White Temple Does Not Follow Usual Procedure, but Has Record for Getting Results.

When "Billy" Sunday comes to town it will not be the spectacle of a meek and lowly follower, unattended by pomp and circumstance. Mr. Sunday will appear at the White Temple Tuesday night with a full company of his own which has been drilled to a state of perfection by himself. When Sunday saves a sinner, he makes arrangements for the repentant one to keep on in the good way. If the lost sheep needs work, and is unable to provide for himself until he finds something to do, "Billy" believes in "grub-staking" him until he can have a chance to get something to do.

Hence it is that "Billy" Sunday's plan of salvation means both spiritual and physical redemption, and includes establishing "rescue" headquarters for the unfortunate until they can be made self-supporting. In this work he has a corps of assistants who precede him in his travels, looking over the ground and preparing for the worst.

Converted Barber to Speak.

Among the most conspicuous of his aids in this line might be mentioned the celebrated "Mel" Trotter, himself an evangelist of no small caliber. Trotter is a speaker on Sunday's order and was at one time a drunken barber. He was converted at the same meeting at which Sunday was brought into the fold, some 11 years ago.

Ever since that time Trotter has devoted his life to the work of reclaiming the slaves of the liquor habit who have drifted into the gutters. The fund now raised for a rescue "home," and amounting to \$40,000, has been devoted to the establishment of a permanent home in Grand Rapids, Mich. Trotter speaks at the White Temple Tuesday at 3 P. M. and his subject will be rescue work among men.

Sunday will certainly have a few curves to use on the unregenerate Tuesday night. His "wing" was never in better shape, and in condition, as he now is, and there was never a warmer artist in "the box." People who have never seen the "game" as Sunday plays it, will be amazed at his versatility and vocabulary.

Gets Results in Own Way.

He may be a trifle crude in his expression, a little lax in his method of denunciation, possibly subject to criticism for the red-hot manner of his laying on the lash, but he gets results. Other evangelists have been more flowery in their language, or more possessed of the

quality of personal pulchritude, but they do not pass "Billy" in the sum total of souls saved.

He does not claim to be a Phillips Brooks or a Henry Ward Beecher as to pulpit eloquence, but he can show you the figures as to what he has done in the way of "landing" sinners.

John E. Gough, an "some of the other" temperance lecturers declaimed against whiskey. "Billy" Sunday goes after the manufacturers and dealers, and his remarks sizzle like a pork-chop on a hot griddle.

They do say that the recent crusade in Washington was due in a great measure to "Billy" fighting the liquor traffic. When "Billy" begins to "line 'em out," he has the opposition "indefatigable" falling all over itself trying to handle the swift ones.

With the afternoon "game" beginning at 3 o'clock Tuesday Trotter to bat, Sunday "on deck," it can readily be imagined that the White Temple will be a scene of excitement which will easily beggar description. There won't be a minute of pellucid calm, but from start to finish the two evangelists will give the spectators something to think about.

It looks as though many hundreds will be turned away from the evening service at which Sunday appears, and already there have been many requests for him to give at least one more night to Portland. As it is almost certain that he will not be able to return to the Pacific Northwest for some time, his admirers are endeavoring to persuade him to make a second address in the City of Roses.

Come to the White Temple Tuesday to the "rescue" meeting, head by "Mel" Trotter, and get "rescued." Come the same night and hear "Billy" Sunday shoot the hot shot into the "rum-and-gum" cohorts. Don't forget the date, Tuesday next, Twelfth and Taylor, 3 P. M.

BALLPLAYING ON STREET

Correspondent Takes Exception to Curtailment of Sport.

PORTLAND, Or., Jan. 22.—(To the Editor.)—Will you kindly give information as to the authority which denies boys the privilege of tossing a ball, one to the other on the sidewalk? In this locality boys are always liable to be interrupted by policeman.

It is absolutely impossible to prevent boys from playing ball in any sort of form, and it ought to be recognized not only as his right and privilege, but his need, ranking in importance to food and clothes. If he can't play ball in the street and on the sidewalk—and it is the rarest thing to find yard room or room for a playground, his only alternative is to watch his chance and defy the authorities, compelling him to grow up with the idea, when he can do so, he is the winner, thus teaching him to disregard law and authority.

It seems to me all my life at some time I have been accustomed to pass boys on the sidewalk tossing ball, but, through a silent courtesy and judgment on the part of the boys, never felt the fear of being struck. If there is a city ordinance to this effect, will The Oregonian give a suggestion as to how our boys should occupy their spare moments of playtime, without advising South Portland boys to play in the park blocks in North Portland?
