LIGHT OVER BRIDGE

Council Orders Condemnation of Madison Structure.

P. R., L. & P. CO. TO RESIST

Desires Viaduct Repaired and Reopened for O. W. P. Cars—County Commissioners Reiterate Promise to Keep Span Shut.

The City Executive Board, by the terms of an ordinance adopted by the City Council yesterday, is empowered and directed to condemn the Madison-street bridge and rights to operate railway lines and telegraph wires over the structure. Condemnation also includes other property and rights for the construction of the proposed new bridge.

President B. S. Joseph of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company, desires to have the bridge reopened for the passage of streetcars, agreeing to repair the structure and assume responsibility for possible accidents, provided he is permitted to operate cars of the O. W. P. division over it. The ordinance, however, declares that an emergency exists, and that the bridge should be condemned. The County Commissioners yesterday also repeated their promise that the bridge should not be reopened. A delegation of the United Southeast Side Improvement associations visited the bridge and with the request that they refuse to reopen the bridge. The Commissioners reiterated their promise of the day before.

After visiting the Commissioners the delegation went to the City Hall and conferred with President Joseph of the railway company. President Joseph's associates in this matter had reported that necessary repairs to the bridge would not cost more than \$1000. He also expressed his opinion that the company would refuse to pay \$5,000 annually for the right to use the new bridge, as specified in the amendment of the charter.

Efforts will be made at a meeting to be held soon to prepare an agreement which will be temporarily satisfactory to both the Commissioners and railway officials. Under the terms of the agreement, it is said, the company will not oppose the creation of a new bridge; the rights of the company on the old bridge will not be continued on the new bridge; the company may repair the old bridge at its own expense and operate cars over it at its own risk.

However, considerable opposition to such an agreement has already developed.

CONSULS TO GET TOGETHER

ROSE FESTIVAL COMMITTEE PLANS PAGEANT OF NATIONS.

Telegrams Sent to Luther Burbank and Joaquin Miller, Urging Attendance on "Planting Day."

A conference of consular representatives of all the nations of the civilized world which have stations in Portland will be called by the "Home Coming Day" committee within the next few weeks to prepare for a street parade on the initial day of the third annual festival which shall be designated as the "Pageant of the Nations." Commander Seneca Post, of Camp Scott, Young, United Spanish War Veterans, is preparing a circular letter to the official representatives of the following countries: Austria, Great Britain, China, Costa Rica, Denmark, France, Germany, Honduras, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Nicaragua, Norway, Peru, Russia, Sweden and Switzerland.

As soon as replies have been received a general meeting, the first one, by the way, that has ever been held in this city to bring the consuls of the countries together in a united working body, will be held and detailed arrangements will be taken care of.

Wires have been sent by the Rose Festival to Luther Burbank and Joaquin Miller, urging them to come here for Washington's birthday observance of "Rose Planting Day." Correspondence has been carried on with them for the past two months but the results have not been altogether satisfactory and it is not ascertained that these distinguished Californians will be present for the ceremonies.

Burbank has been asked to take the leading part in the celebration of the day—the planting of the official "Rose of Oregon" together with dedicating it in a fitting speech, while Joaquin Miller, who is a native Oregonian, has been asked to prepare an original poem or recite one of his many famous productions which will be in keeping with the occasion.

The most essential factor in the observance of "Rose Planting Day" on the Washington anniversary will be securing the participation of the school children of Portland. No formal programme can be outlined for the boys and girls of the public schools until the attitude of the Board of Education has been determined. Hermann Wittenberg, chairman of the Board of Oregon, is in charge of the committee in charge of "Rose Planting Day," and he has been conspicuously friendly to the plans of the festival for this occasion. Much therefore depend upon the recommendations that he may make at the meeting of the general committee next Tuesday night, at festival headquarters.

DEATH OF JOSEPH C. GEER

Oregon Pioneer of 1845 Passes Away at Modesto, Cal., Aged 84.

California papers bring the news of the death of Joseph Carey Geer at Modesto, in that state, on January 12, as the result of a complication of diseases incident to old age.

Mr. Geer was born in Madison County, Ohio, on the first of February, 1825, and with his parents moved to Knox County, Illinois, in 1840. In 1845, when a young man of 20, he surrendered to the "Oregon fever" and hired out to the late Samuel Barlow, who lived not far away in an adjoining county to drive one of his ox teams across the Cascades.

Mr. Geer worked at "logging" in the vicinity of Oregon City and such other occupations as offered themselves under the prevailing circumstances in those primitive days until the discovery of gold in California, when he joined the general ex-

odus and spent a year in search of the yellow metal. Returning to Oregon, he located in Salem and worked at carpentering for several years in partnership with Jonathan O'Donald, who yet lives in the capital city. There are buildings still standing in Salem which were constructed in the early '50's by these young contractors.

During the mining days in Eastern Oregon and Idaho Mr. Geer was a resident of that section, but in 1888 he went to Modesto, Cal., and at once entered extensively in the raising of olives and in the manufacture of olive oil, which business he pursued until his death.

Joseph C. Geer was the last of five brothers who came to Oregon in the early days to pass over the Great Divide. His father, Joseph Carey Geer, Sr., crossed the plains from Illinois in 1847, at the age of 22 years, bringing with him his wife and eight children, two others, Joseph C. having preceded them in 1845, and Fred W., in 1848. The sons of this pioneer family were Ralph C., Fred W., Joseph Cary, Isaiah and Herman J., and the daughters were Emilie, afterward Mrs. John W. Grim, of Aurora, Mary, afterward Mrs. Robert V. Short, of Portland; Juliet, who died at the age of 30; Elizabeth, afterward Mrs. Kent, of Portland, and Iantha, afterward Mrs. J. L. Kruse. Of this entire family, Mrs. Kent, whose home is 561 East Salmon street, Portland, is the only survivor.

"Carey" Geer, as he was always called by his acquaintances, was a man of rugged mold and his entire life was characterized by a marked independence in the formation and expression of his opinions on public questions. For many years he had been a citizen of California, but he had many old-time friends in Oregon, who will regret to hear of his death. He was also an uncle of Homer Davenport, the cartoonist, and of ex-Governor T. T. Geer. At the time of his death he lacked but 20 days of being 84 years of age.

Meetings will be held in the afternoon at 2:30, beginning Tuesday and ending Friday, led by Rev. George W. Armstrong, Rev. M. E. Emerich, Rev. George Soltan, the London evangelist, will continue with these meetings until the end of the coming week. Professor Coffin will conduct the music and sing solos every night.

APPEAL ON MITCHELL FINE

Government Tries Hard to Collect From Late Senator's Estate.

Even in death the late United States Senator John H. Mitchell cannot escape the far-reaching hand of the Government. When Senator Mitchell was found guilty a fine of \$1000 was also added. Now the Government wants to collect, and in order to obtain this, United States Attorney John McCourt has gone to California to argue before the United States Court of Appeals the appeal from Judge Wolcott's decision setting aside the judgment. The motion to set aside the judgment was made by Colonel David M. Dunne, administrator of the Mitchell estate. The authorities at Washington, however, thought Uncle Sam needed the money, and directed that the order be appealed.

According to reports of the Mitchell estate, made by Colonel Dunne, there is just about enough left to pay the fine. Thomas G. Greene is the attorney for the estate, and he also has gone to San Francisco.
