IRISH CONTINUE TO FIGHT LANDLORDS

Cattle Drives, Boycotts and Riots Mark Land Agitation.

TAXPAYERS PAY DAMAGE

Maiming of Cattle and Horses, Firing of Haystacks, Smashing of Implements Are Frequent Events in Ireland.

DUBLIN, Feb. 6.—(Special.)—Since the big cattle drive in County Tipperary two more drives are reported there. On Thursday morning 25 head of cattle were driven off the land of Clondra and across the Shannon into Roscommon. In the evening some of the animals were found near Roskeel, eight miles away. From Longford also comes news of a savage attack on a granger named Martin, as he was driving from Lismore. He was accompanied by six policemen, but they were practically helpless against the crowd. Martin drew his revolver, but hesitated to fire, although his hands were cut and bleeding from blows struck with sticks. Eventually he got away.

Some indication of what has been happening in the Western counties is furnished by the considerable sums which during the last few days have been granted as compensation for malicious injury. At Naas Quarter Sessions \$1500 was awarded for the burning of a farm filled with hay which was set alight in five places. In Limerick sums of \$500 and \$502 were granted for similar outrages. At Tullamore Sessions \$400 was awarded for the destruction by fire of a house and furniture. These amounts, of course, will have to come out of the pockets of the ratepayers. In Roscommon and Galway other claims are pending. The offenses include the smashing of agricultural implements, the burning of hay and turf, malicious injury to a thoroughbred filly and a brood mare, from the effects of which the latter died, damage to the interior of a dwelling house through stone-throwing, and the driving of cattle and sheep. Evidently the advice lately given by certain Nationalist leaders that, in view of the Chief Secretary's land proposals, cattle-driving should for the present cease has not been generally accepted.

Smash Evictor's Windows.

On Wednesday last a woman was evicted from a small house in the town of Roscrea by the landlord, Mr. Ridd. On the same night a band and torch-bearers, followed by a big crowd, paraded the streets, and halting outside Mr. Ridd's door smashed his windows with stones, and cried, "Down with the evictor!" The police had much difficulty in compelling the crowd to leave, and there was great excitement in the town. Meanwhile, another tenant had been evicted, and before the arrival of the police they had smashed the windows and otherwise injured the building.

At the Hurlingham Quarter Sessions, Judge Curran refused a liquor license to Thomas Carbery, of Rathasplee, Westmeath, on account of his refusing to supply goods to Harry Dodd, a local magistrate and agent, who, with his servants, is rigorously boycotted and obliged to obtain the necessities of life from a distance.

Rioting at Thurles.

Rioting again broke out in Thurles, County Tipperary, this week and considerable damage was done to property before the police succeeded in restoring order. The dispute is stated to have arisen in connection with a grazing farm. While returning from mass two men named Campion and Scully were attacked and stoned. The police were called out and a strong force was placed on duty in Cathedral street, where some of the parties live. After nightfall the street lamps were extinguished and the house of a man named Walsh was attacked and all the glass in front was broken. The police charged the crowd, who retreated but continued to throw stones at windows, and some of the policemen were injured. Several shots were fired by the crowd. One man was arrested. The next night a crowd entered upon the farm of Denis Walsh, at Corbally, and drove off 50 cattle.

BACKWARD ABOUT VOTING

Only Nine Votes Out of Possible 1000 Cast in Entire Day.

JOHANNESBURG, Feb. 6.—(Special.)—Municipal elections in this country have often been charged with apathy in the matter of exercising the rights of citizenship, but it is doubtful if the record recently established at Rondebosch has ever been equaled anywhere in the civilized world. A poll was taken on the question whether the Town Council should be empowered to contribute to hospitals and other charitable institutions. So small an interest did the ratepayers take in the matter that up to 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon only seven, out of a total of 1000 on the register, had recorded their votes.

It happened that a meeting of the Council was held on the following day, and the Mayor commented sorrowfully on this extraordinary exhibition of apathy. "If we were putting something extra on the rates," he remarked, "they would come forward fast enough, but as it is a matter of charity, they take little or no interest in the poll. I don't expect there will be more than a dozen by 6 o'clock." As a matter of fact, the total number of votes cast during the whole day was nine.

New Bullet for Austria.

VIENNA, Feb. 6.—(Special.)—It is stated that the Austro-Hungarian rifle, which is the Mannlicher 95, will in the future be provided with new ammunition. The new cartridges is provided with a sharp-pointed, steel-capped bullet 28 millimeters long. Its muzzle velocity is 900 meters a second more than the German bullet. Its penetrating power is remarkable, and at 100 meters it has pierced all infantry shields in use.
