

# SCHOOL CHILDREN TO PLANT ROSES

Washington's Birthday Will Be Observed With Exercises at Forestry Building.

WILL DEDICATE NEW PLANT

"Rose of Oregon," Originated by Luther Burbank, Will Be Formally Turned Over to the City of Portland.

**ENTIRE CITY TO PARTICIPATE.**  
All fraternal, social, military organizations in Portland have given the right of way in celebration of Washington's birthday, to the Rose Festival. The only elaborate ceremonial that will take place in Portland will be held at the Forestry building by the Festival tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock. The programme of exercises is one of the most comprehensive that has ever been given in the City of Portland.

Portland will celebrate its second annual "Rose Planting Day," in honor of Washington's birthday, at the Forestry building, in the Lewis and Clark Fairgrounds, at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. The programme will be one of the most

comprehensive held in Portland, since the Exposition.

Not only will the two great cities of the Northwest—Portland and Seattle—join hands in making it a notable occasion, but the State of Oregon, the City of Portland, the Rose Festival, the Rose Society, the Peninsula Rose Association, the commercial organizations of the city, the public schools, all these will share in the tribute to the memory of America's first President.

In addition to this the occasion will be dignified by the dedication of one of the rarest roses that has ever been developed in this country—"The Rose of Oregon," a flower which Luther Burbank has been spending years to bring to its present state of perfection and which he has sent to Portland to become the parent stock of the choicest roses of the Northwest. Mr. Burbank hoped to be able to come here, but he found that his experimental work in connection with the work the Government is doing in floriculture would not permit him to leave California.

Similarly, Joaquin Miller, the famous son of Oregon and "poet of the Sierras," expressed a desire to be present and take some part in the ceremonies, but his publishers insisted that he "rush proof" on his latest volume of works. He wrote that the best he could do was to send souvenirs of his picturesque home down in California, and the 50 post cards with his own autograph and a view of his Summer home will be given to the little girls who will take part in the exercises tomorrow afternoon.

Attend for Seattle Fair.

F. V. Dunham, a former citizen of Portland and present acting director-general of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition will arrive here tonight with Director of Publicity Welford Boston, to take part as official representatives of the Seattle Fair in the big civic demonstration.

The Park Board has shown its interest in the affair by directing a gang of employees to prepare the ground in front of the Forestry building for the reception of the 100 rose bushes which the little boys and girls selected from all parts of the city will plant during the ceremonies. The Park Board will have plenty of men on hand to see that all the roses brought there will be set out.

The roses will be planted by a voluntary corps of more than a hundred boys and girls. The boys have already begun the work of rooting the rose bushes, and 50 or more little girls, in white pinafores, will hold the rose trees in place while an equal number of boys, wearing straw hats, will shove the earth into place about the roots, immediately after the ceremonies.

The privilege of helping to beautify the city made immediate and strong appeal to all the little folks who were notified of the need of their personal assistance in the rose-planting, and the Rose Festival Association is still receiving messages by telephone, letter and in person, from boys and girls eager to have a hand in the planting of the bushes which, by early Summer, will brighten the grounds about the great log cabin with thousands of blossoms.

Instead of the temporary planting, necessary because of the hurried arrangements for rose-planting day last year, the work done by the little volunteers will be permanent, and every rose bush will be left to grow and thrive and blossom through each season in the exact place where it is planted. The grounds about the Forestry building have long needed this touch of beauty, and when the bushes begin to bud and bloom in early Spring, the place will become one of the most attractive and beautiful of all the public grounds of the city.

Give Out Souvenir Post-cards.

As a souvenir of the day each of the little girls who assist in the planting will be given a post-card picture of the home of Joaquin Miller, with his name and a pretty sentiment written upon it by the poet himself, who dearly loves both children and roses.

there will be no school, and all the school children of the city are invited to attend the rose-planting ceremonies and witness the planting. As long as the shovels and straw hats hold out, all the schoolboys who desire to help in the planting will be allowed to do so, and each little girl will have an opportunity to hold the bushes upright for the planting, so long as there are bushes left to plant.

Portland has the distinction of being the only city which has a regular annual rose-planting day, and all who are interested in helping to make this day a success and a credit to the Rose City are urged by the Rose Festival Association to attend the ceremonies and bring along as many of the little folks in their neighborhood as can be rounded up.

For the purpose of jogging up every one's memory the greatest massed band ever assembled in Portland, consisting of the musical organizations of the Peninsula, St. John and North Albina, will parade the streets of the city during the morning hours and will advertise the "Rose-Planting Day" with dancing banners. The Peninsula Rose Association, composed of nine district improvement clubs, will attend the big celebration at the Forestry building in the afternoon after their exercises at Columbia Park in the morning.

The following is the official programme of the afternoon celebration: Music, Professor Brown's Rose City Band; rose planting, direction Mrs. J. W. Minto, president Rose Society; program, Charles Sading; presentation to Portland of Luther Burbank's new rose offering, Mr. Ernest Dreyer; presentation to Seattle of Burbank offering, Mayor Harry Lane; cementing friendly relations between the two tropics of the Northwest, F. V. Dunham, acting director-general Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition; presentation of Joaquin Miller souvenirs to the human rosebuds assisting in the rose planting, president Ralph W. Hoyt; benediction, Hymn Reading.

The Rose Festival Association will be represented at the Peninsula celebration in the morning by President Ralph W. Hoyt, and W. W. Johnson, who is scheduled to deliver the chief address of the day on behalf of the association. Mr. Johnson will also represent the Rose Society, of which he is a prominent member.

### Will Hold Special Meetings.

The opening service in the series of special meetings to be held in Central Baptist Church by Rev. John M. Dean, of Taborville Baptist Church, Seattle, will be given tomorrow night. The title of the opening address will be "Get Out of the Wine Press." These meetings will be conducted nightly, excepting Saturday. The subjects of the addresses to follow are: Tuesday night, "Three Deaths in One Life"; Wednesday, "On the Callow for the Commonwealth"; Thursday, "A Strange Church Social"; Friday, "The Devil's Phrase Book." Rev. Mr. Dean will also speak at both services on Sunday, February 22.

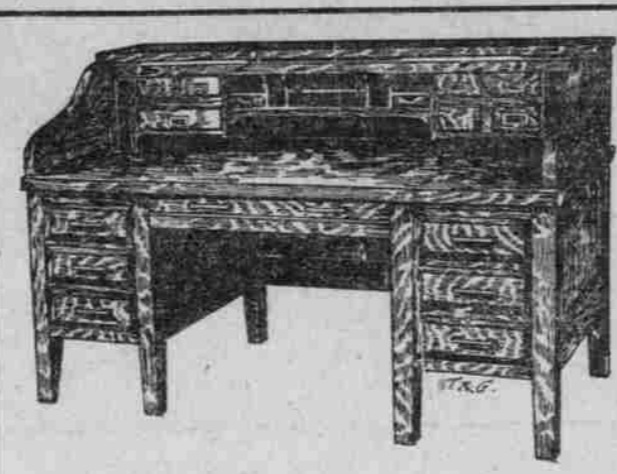
