

## ROSE PLANTING IS WELL UNDER WAY

Portlanders Set Out Bushes Now That Will Bloom in Time for Festival.

### BIG DEMAND ON NURSERIES

Over 450,000 Rose Plants Set Out in Last Twelve Months—Festival Association Prepares List of Varieties.

Portland's rose planting season is now on, full and in earnest. Although the season is several weeks late and was seriously retarded by the severe weather in January, there is abundant opportunity to set out bushes from now on so that they will be in full bloom for the Rose Festival of the week of June 7-12.

Because of the numerous requests which have been made of the Rose Festival Association, as to the varieties of roses which thrive best in this climate and soil, the management has secured from expert rosemen what they consider the best possible advice on the matter of setting out this particular flower.

While it is almost beyond belief, local nurserymen who have been asked to assist in planting rose culture, declare that within the past year—counting both Fall and Spring seasons—more than 450,000 rose bushes have been planted in the yards and lawns of Portland homes, attributable solely to the advertising advantage of the festival. The supply of roses, 2 and 3 years old, which are suitable for planting, with a view of blooming early in the season, is greater than it has ever been heretofore, but the demand is such that there will be a shortage in supply before the season is half over. This is admitted by some of the leading nurserymen.

The roses were badly nipped by the extremely cold weather of several weeks ago and this unusual condition had a bad effect on the market. At the same time, the Rose Festival has gone to considerable trouble to prepare a list of varieties which may now be planted with every assurance of bloom when the big civic demonstration is held next June.

The Rose Festival has prepared the following list of roses which are peculiarly adaptable to this climate and the Portland soil, taking into consideration not only the hardiness, prolific bearing, but also their fragrance and color:

**Best.**—The new Irish rose, yellow. **Compass.**—Of George's New, ever-blooming English; blue pink.

**Dean Hole.**—Amine pink, similar to American Beauty.

**Dr. Clark.**—One of the best of the new varieties; intense deep scarlet.

**Madame Melant.**—Souper—Exquisite form; large new rose; sunny yellow.

**Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt.**—New upright grower; large, fragrant blossoms, creamy white.

**Admiral Dewey.**—"A sport" of that peer of roses.

**Caroline Testout.**—Flash pink, with a rosy blush in center.

**Baby Rambler.**—Dwarf crimson-rambler; hardy and blooms phenomenally; indoor perpetual and free bloomer.

**Etiole de France.**—New crimson; vigorous, rampant, with cupped petals; deeply crimsoned, without doubt the finest crimson ever-blooming rose in existence.

**The Enchantress.**—Vigorous, fine foliage, large creamy blossoms in immense clusters.

**Very.**—Exactly like well-known "Golden Gate"; free bloomer; clear ivory white.

**Lady Battersea.**—Red, Niphetos; bright cherry crimson; showy variety.

**Mrs. B. R. Cant.**—Remarkably robust and great bloomer; shaded tints of rose blush.

**Madame Abel.**—Charming variety; splendid garden variety; free bloomer; large blossoms.

**Madame Jules Groles.**—Rampant grower; full, full flowers of rich satin rose color.

**Saint de France.**—Notting—Seedling of M. Nell and Maman Cochet; sturdy grower; beautiful close foliage; sunny bloom; orange yellow, with carmine border.

**Killarney Collection.**

**Florence Penikese.**—Large bloom, creamy white, suffused pink.

**Frau Karl Druschel.**—One of the best and hardiest pure white roses ever produced; fragrant, beautiful buds; immense bloom.

**General Deagan.**—Great garden rose; unusual buds; large, full, double.

**General MacArthur.**—Brilliant scarlet; very fragrant; buds and flowers; bright pink and pure gold.

**Killarney.**—New Irish tea Killarney; robust grower; abundant bloomer; buds and flowers unusually large, brilliant, sparkling pink and of rich fragrance.

**La Detroit.**—New variety, shell pink shaded to soft rose; prolific bloomer.

**Richmond.**—Splendid new American rose; strong grower, splendid foliage, rich scarlet crimson; one of the most vivid of ever-bloomers.

**"Jack" Collection Hardy Roses.**

**Ulrich Brunner.**—Magnificent species; extra large bold flowers of good substance; rich, glowing crimson.

**Camille de Rohan.**—Dark, rich, velvety; best of crimson, shading to maroon.

**"American Beauty" Collection.**

**Belle Siebrecht.**—Solid pink, rich shade.

**Kalstein Aug. Victoria.**—Large full double flowers, creamy white, delicious fragrance.

**Madame Caroline Testout.**—Portland's official rose. Beautiful soft-toned pink, rich fragrance; no gameness.

**Maman Cochet.**—Fine new tea rose; deep rosy pink and porcelain white.

Among the beauty roses, Perle des Dardes, Papa Gontier and the Folkestone are three of the best varieties.

While it is entirely foreign to the purposes and objects of the Rose Festival, the officers of the association announce that they will be very glad to give any information at their command pertaining to the planting and cultivation of roses.

**ROOMS FOR YOUNG WOMEN**

**Catholic Women's League Provides Place for Rest.**

The Catholic Women's League of Portland has fitted up a suite of rooms in the Columbia building, corner Park and Washington streets, for the use of young women employed in stores and offices. The rooms will be opened to the public tomorrow. The intention has been to provide a place where young women may rest and read during the noon hour, or at other times through the day. A lunch room has been installed where those who bring lunches may procure tea and coffee. The plan of the organization is similar to that of the Y. W. C. A. There will be an information and travelers' aid department to assist strangers and young women away from home or in search of employment.

There will also be a department in which dressmaking and millinery will be taught. The league is supported by donations and membership fees. Active membership will be \$5 yearly. Dues for associate members, with privileges of the rooms will be \$1 yearly. Miss Margaret Flaherty will be in charge as superintendent.

HANDSOME STRUCTURE SOON TO BE UNDER WAY AT FOURTH AND OAK STREETS.



LEWIS ESTATE BUILDING AS IT WILL APPEAR COMPLETED.

Work in the basement for the Lewis Estate building, at the northeast corner of Fourth and Oak streets, is progressing rapidly. The building, as seen by the drawing reproduced, is to be ten stories in height and constructed of reinforced concrete. On the first floor will be located stores on both fronts and the upper floors are to be arranged for offices. The wall facings of the two first stories are to be treated with glazed tiling, tinted in green. The upper stories will have a coating of cement on the concrete and be painted buff. Window balconies are to be of copper finish and in the treatment of these an effect will be produced different from any other office building in the city. The architect, David C. Lewis, expects to have the building under roof in the coming Fall, and ready for occupancy early in 1910.

## EAST SIDE HAS PETITIONS READY

Will Begin Campaign Tomorrow for Names on Capital Removal Issue.

### ALSO AFTER COURTHOUSE

Kellaher, Who Launched Movement, Declares Plan to Bring State House to Portland Meets With General Support.

Removal of the state capital from Salem to Portland, on the east side of the Willamette River, before January 1, 1915, is proposed in a constitutional amendment that will be submitted to the voters of the state at the general election in November, 1910. Petitions for this amendment already are being circulated in different sections of the state. They were initiated by State Senator Kellaher, who is receiving the co-operation of the East Side commercial organizations in the plan to have the seat of government established in this city. Should the amendment be adopted by the people, it provides that the Legislature of 1911 shall make provision for the purchase of a site and the erection of suitable buildings, that the state government may be transferred to this city four years later.

The amendment relating to changing the location of the capital proposes changing section 1 of article 14 of the state constitution to read as follows:

"The seat of government and the capital of the state shall be removed from Salem to the city of Portland, on the east side of the Willamette River, within the limits of the city of Portland. At the regular session of the Legislature of 1911, the Legislature shall make all necessary provisions for the purchase of a suitable site within such limits and the erection of the necessary buildings thereon, and for the complete removal of the seat of government thereto on or before January 1, 1915."

**Initiative Bill for Courthouse.**

But the East Side people will not be satisfied with securing the permanent location of the state capital. At the same election, November, 1910, there also will be submitted to the voters of the state a bill by initiative providing for the removal of the county courthouse to the East Side. The bill proposes that the present courthouse, which is situated on the corner of the city of Portland and erect a new courthouse, to be completed and ready for occupancy December 31, 1912. A similar bill, leaving to the voters the question as to which side of the river the new courthouse should be constructed, failed to pass the recent session of the State Legislature.

The text of the initiative bill on the location of the courthouse follows:

"That we, the people of Multnomah County, hereby enact for the County Judge and County Commissioners, sitting as a County Court for the transaction of public business, to purchase a suitable site on the east side of the Willamette River within the limits of the city of Portland, and erect a new courthouse thereon; to use so much as may be necessary of the funds derived from the special tax levied already made for the addition of the present Courthouse; to levy no further tax for work on the present Court-

house site; to make no additions to the present Courthouse nor incur any expense in enlarging the same; to provide for the public auction of the present Courthouse and the site thereof; to use the proceeds of such sale in the erection of a new Courthouse; to complete said work on or before the 31st day of December, 1912."

### East Side in Earnest.

The East Side people are intensely in earnest in their determination to effect the removal of the Capitol to this city. Active circulation of the petitions will begin tomorrow under the organized direction of the official heads of the different push clubs on that side of the river. Associated with Senator Kellaher in this preliminary work are: C. A. McGeary, president of the East Side Business Men's Club, an organization with a membership of over 100 of the leading business men of the East Side; H. A. Caley, W. B. Mayall and George Dilworth, all prominent merchants.

Those behind the proposed amendment are satisfied that they will have no trouble in obtaining the necessary number of signatures to the petitions to insure the submission of the amendment to the voters in 1910. This having been accomplished, they are just as sanguine that the amendment will be adopted by a majority of the voters. It is figured that the amendment will be supported very generally by the voters of this city, while the people of Eastern Oregon are relied on to vote solidly for it. This following, the amendment is expected naturally to receive from other sections of the state, it is believed will insure its adoption.

"Our purpose is to have the State Capitol removed from Salem to Portland in no sense a joke," said Senator Kellaher yesterday. "The old Capitol building at Salem has outlived its usefulness and there is urgent need for a new building. For that reason, the present is the time to consider the removal of the seat of government. Portland is the natural location from every consideration, geographically and in point of center of population. The practice of expending from \$25,000 to \$30,000 every two years in improvements to the dilapidated structure is throwing good money away. While the building is safe, for legislative purposes, it could be converted readily to other uses. It would prove a good home for the Oregon Historical Society, which could share the quarters with other organizations of the same character."

### Prepared Bill for Legislation.

"It was my intention during the recent session of the Legislature to propose the same constitutional amendment we are now submitting under the initiative, but Senator Bingham got a similar resolution in first. Fearing that any attempt to secure the favorable consideration of the resolution might antagonize those members that might oppose it, no serious effort was made to have it adopted. As a result two or three days before the Legislature adjourned the resolution was reported back by the committee on resolutions without recommendation. Following an hour's insincere debate the further consideration of the resolution was deferred indefinitely."

"We regard that our proposal is an entirely reasonable one and anticipate no great opposition. Already we have learned that the people of Eastern and Southern Oregon are enthusiastic over the proposed constitutional amendment and will vote very generally for it."

The movement to secure the courthouse for the East Side also has assumed definite shape. Different Granges throughout the County have obtained copies of the initiative petitions and will assist to obtain the required number of signatures to insure the submission of the question to the voters.

### Will Speak on Labrador.

Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell, widely known for his work among the fishermen of Labrador, will deliver two lectures here Tuesday in the interest of the Grenfell Association of America for aiding philanthropic work among deep-sea fishermen of Labrador. He will speak at a meeting at the First Congregational Church Tuesday afternoon, March 8, and Tuesday night at the First Presbyterian Church.

Through his efforts hospitals, orphanages, sawmills and workshops have been established among the fishermen of Labrador in the past 19 years. He has also opened night and day schools and brought much cheer to the inhabitants of that bleak land. While in Portland Dr. Grenfell will be the guest of T. A. MacRae of the Bank of British Columbia.

### Arrest Subway Smoker.

NEW YORK, March 6.—Louis Funke, a poultry dealer, was the first man arrested under the new health ordinance making it a misdemeanor to smoke or carry lighted cigars or pipes in the subway station. Funke was arrested after a tussle with a special policeman.

In the night court a Magistrate charged the prisoner with a reprimand. There has been a noticeable decrease in the smoking in the stations since the passage of the new law.

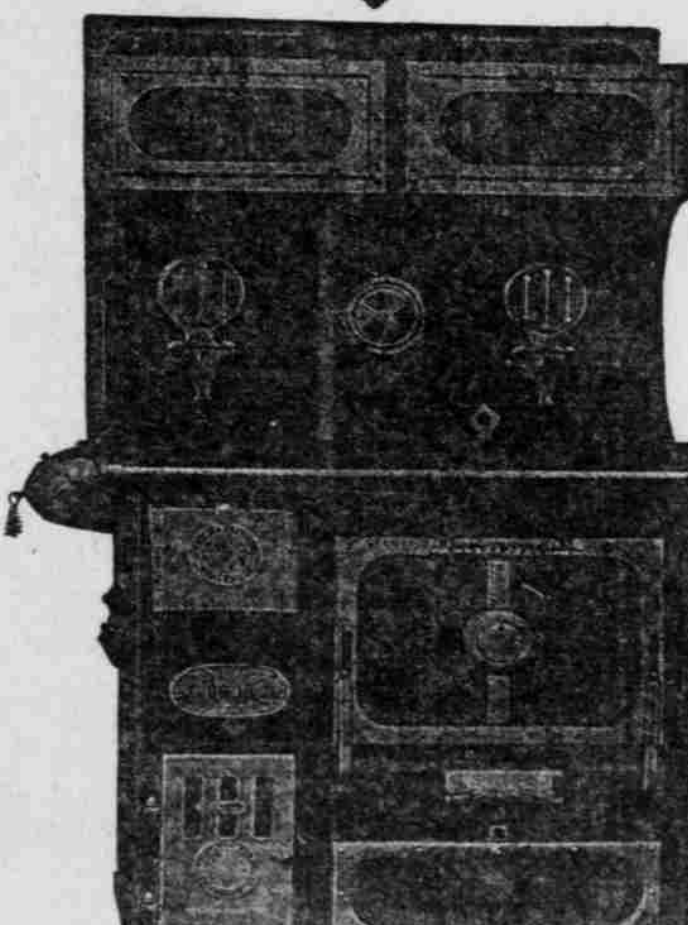
