FORT STEVENS, Or., March 13.—
(Special.)—Captain Vedder, United
States medical department, arrived at

been used occasionally but will not be
followed here. Another plan sometimes
followed is to insert a ball of yarn or
wine and secure the end, whereupon a
blast of compressed air rolls the ball
along clear through the conduit.

A plan no less ingenious is to be fol-
lowed here. A great number of jointed
rods, three feet long, have been brought
here by the contractors, W. S. Barstow
& Co., engineers, of New York City, and
these rods are now being used in the
conduit one at a time and jointed until
finally a long continuous rod is pushed
into the conduit until it reaches to the
next manhole. This leads through a
wire and is called "roding the ducts."

The wire, once through, is attached to
a brush that is drawn through and clears
out dirt that may have lodged in the con-
duit. The wire next pulls through what
is called a mandril. This is a short
round piece of iron that is a trifle larger
than the cable to occupy that space. This
is threaded through to see there are no
obstructions in the way of the cable and
a steel rope attached to the mandril pulls
through the cable.

Work will be started tomorrow in
threading the conduit on Front street
from Yamhill to Oak. The work is under
the direction of S. Ring, an engineer from
New York in the employ of W. S. Barstow
& Co., who has had extended experience
in this sort of work in the East.

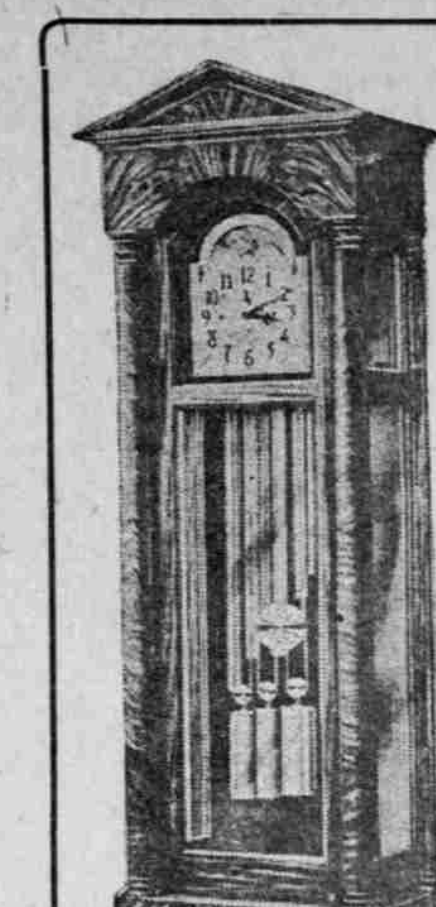

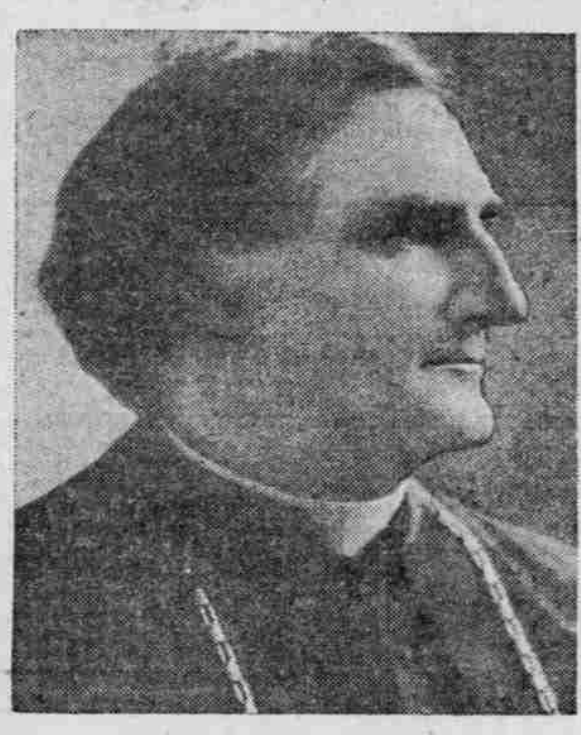

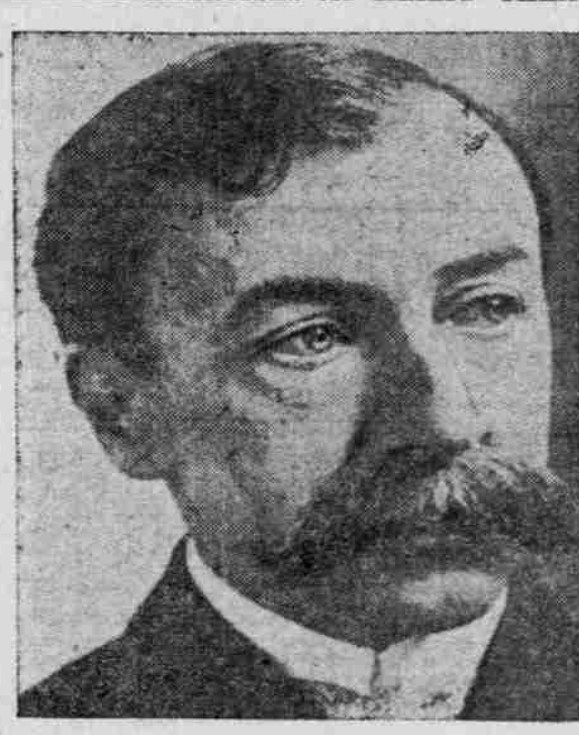

CRITICALLY ILL IN HAWAII

MRS. JOHN GILL STRICKEN
WITH APPENDICITIS.

Recovery of Portland Woman, Win-
tering in Islands With Hus-
band, Despaired Of.

Word was received yesterday, from
John Gill, who is wintering with his
family in the Hawaiian Islands, that
his wife is dangerously ill, and that for
some time past her recovery has been
despaired of. Mr. and Mrs. Gill left
Portland about six weeks ago and anti-
cipating a few months' restful sojourn
among the tropical isles of the Mid-
Pacific group. They remained in San
Francisco for a short time and then
continued their journey to Hawaii in
order to arrive there in time for the
observance of the annual Mid-Winter
Floral Festival which is held on Wash-
ington's Birthday.

Mrs. Gill complained of feeling badly
before the islands were reached and
within a few days after arriving at
Honolulu she was forced to go to a
hospital where an operation for appen-
dicitis became necessary. On account
of her delicate health, Mrs. Gill passed
through the severe ordeal only through
exercise of her indomitable will. She
is still confined to the hospital and in
the care of trained nurses and special-
ists, but, according to Mrs. Gill, there
is good chance that she will be able to
be up and around in the course of a
few weeks.

First news of Mrs. Gill's serious ill-
ness came in a letter to Ralph W. Hoyt,
head of the Rose Festival, in which
Mr. Gill said that it would be impos-
sible for him to carry on the negotiations
for sending a special delegation of Ha-
waiian business men to Portland for
the June celebration as he had hoped to
do. Mr. Gill declared, however, that
he had placed the matter in the hands
of J. A. Woods, secretary of the Hono-
lulu Chamber of Commerce and that
the latter, who was a visitor in Port-
land less than two years ago, would
see to it that the matter was properly

mercial interests of the Hawaiian metropo-
lis.

tradicted by Patrolman Simms, who was
the first officer to seize admission to that
particular room. Simms said that both
Stuart and the woman had on but little
clothing at that time. Stuart assured
Simms, the latter said, "It is all right.
I'm an officer," and slammed the door
shut.

Sergeants Keller and Kienlen and Pa-
trolman Blue, who participated in the
raid, testified that they knew Stuart was
in the room with a woman, but neither
of them could give much evidence as to
what the exact situation was with regard
to the clothing worn by either. Both
Keller and Kienlen admitted, in answer
to questions by John F. Logan, Stuart's
attorney, that they had no warrants, and
that they raided the house without due
authority from any court, on orders from
Captain Slover, in charge of their relief.

Captain Slover came to the rescue of
the administration chiefs, and shouldered
the responsibility for the whole affair.
He said he received information that
Policeman Stuart was in the Quelle. In
some room, with a woman, and deter-

Stuart, and that he had warned the offi-
cer to be careful, but that it had seemed
to be of no avail.

Mr. Logan sarcastically referred to the
"purifying" brigade, and said that Mayor

sensational raid. He denounced the affair

Ingenious Ways to Draw Wires Into Conduits

Jointed Rods Will Be Used in Port-
land, But Many Other Systems
Have Been Tried Elsewhere.

MANY thousands of people have pun-
zled over the method to be used in
drawing electric cables through the busi-
ness district for the Portland Railway,
Light & Power Company. The cable
ducts are laid entirely empty under the
street and covered with concrete so that
access to them, once laid, is impossible
without tearing up the street a second
time. Connection with the buried con-
duits is had only at the manholes in the
street, built when the underground
system is installed. Many have asked
how the wires are run through these
