"GERMAN PERIL" IS ALARMING BRITAIN

Entire Country Demands Eight Battleships to Keep Navy Above Next Nearest.

EXPECT PREMIER TO YIELD

Populace Panic-Stricken and if Appeal Should Be Made to People Present Radical Party Would Lose Out.

LONDON, March 20.—The dramatic confession from the Cabinet Ministers in the recent debate in the House of Commons that Germany had caught the British Admiralty napping and stolen a march on this country by expediting the construction of Dreadnoughts, and that Great Britain would have little, if any, margin in the number of new ships in 1911-12, has been followed by something like a panic throughout the United Kingdom.

Demand Eight Ships.

The direct vote of censure which A. J. Balfour, leader of the opposition, will lead against the government on Monday will bring the issue as to whether four or eight Dreadnoughts should be definitely included in this year's naval programme squarely before Parliament, although there is a chance that the National outcry will cause Premier Asquith to yield and give definite assurances that the four "phantom" Dreadnoughts will be constructed this year in addition to the four provided for in the estimate.

HADLEY SEEKS NOT OFFICE

Missouri Governor Not Candidate for Oregon Judgeship.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, March 20.—A statement was published here today that President Taft intended appointing Governor Hadley of Missouri to a Federal Judgeship in the Northwest in accordance with a promise made by the President to Hadley when he was Governor of Missouri, and it was intimated that he would go to Oregon. Sena-

tor Warner stated tonight that Mr. Hadley was not an aspirant for any Federal Judgeship, preferring his present office.

Senator Heyburn today urged the President to appoint Mr. Fulton. The President has let it be known he will defer to the wishes of Senators in making local Federal appointments. This may have an important bearing on the Oregon Judgeship appointment, as the candidacy of Mr. Fulton has not the support of either Senator Bourne or Chamberlain.

Speak Good Word for Spokane.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, March 20.—Senators Piles and Jones today called on the Postmaster General and urged that Spokane be designated as headquarters of the new mail district recently created in the Northwest. No action has been taken.

NEW JAP CRISIS IN SOUTH

County Officials in California Try to Collect Polltax; Strike Snag.

OKNARD, Cal., March 20.—Serious labor trouble is threatened in the beet fields here over the situation created by the attempt to collect a county poll tax from the 450 Japanese living in Oknard and employed in the beet fields. This attempt, after they had paid the city tax in this city, caused great resentment. The sheriff and Deputy Sheriff in many instances seized horses and goods owned by the Japanese and later forced them to pay under threats of selling their property.

JAP SHIPS PLAN VOYAGE

Two Cruisers Will Visit Important Pacific Ports This Summer.

TOKIO, Monday, Feb. 22.—Two ships of the Japanese training squadron, leaving Yokosuka on March 14, will visit various points on the Pacific Coast during the Spring and Summer. The vessels are the cruisers Aso and Soya. Their itinerary includes the following: Honolulu, April 1 to April 10; Hilo, April 11 to April 14; San Francisco, April 15 to May 3; Esquimalt, May 12 to May 15; Vancouver, May 15 to May 22; Tacoma, May 22 to May 27; Seattle, May 27 to June 10.

Furniture Shippers Make Gain.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 20.—The fourth day of the hearing before Interstate Commerce Commissioner C. A. Prouty was given over to the defense, furnished by railroads charged with establishing minimum weights upon carloads of furniture and other bulky commodities that cannot be loaded by the regulation size cars. Commissioner Prouty declared himself satisfied that the minimum weights should be reduced to the established minimum, and directed that the evidence be applied directly to the number of short-weight carloads.

Wright's Pupils Learn to Fly.

PAU, France, March 20.—Successful flights on the Wright aeroplane were made here today by Count de Lambert and Paul Tissandier, Mr. Wright's pupils. Each man went up alone and remained in the air 30 minutes.

SLEUTHS IN LEASH

Government Will Not Press for Indictments.

UNLESS LAND FRAUD CLEAR

Dismisses Charge Against Men Indicted With Borah and Will Be Cautious Not to Attack Men on Slight Pretext.

WASHINGTON, March 20.—(Special.)—Attorney-General Wickham has directed the dismissal as to persons against whom it is still pending of the indictment in Idaho against Senator Borah, members of the Barber Lumber Company and others for conspiracy to defraud the United States of timber lands in Boise County, Idaho. Mr. Borah stood trial and was acquitted. John I. Wells and Patrick Downs, two of the other defendants, filed pleas in abatement to the indictment based upon the alleged improper conduct of District Attorney Rutik before the grand jury in urging the return of the indictment. Their pleas were sustained by Judge Whitson in the United States District Court.

Today's action of the Department of Justice is believed to mark the beginning of a more careful policy regarding land fraud by congressmen in the West. The former Administration is commensurate, are convinced that in many instances the men have been unjustly accused. Scores of special agents and secret service men had been employed to collect evidence, and as a result indictments were obtained in cases where there was little or no promise of obtaining a conviction in the courts. In several cases the reputations of law-abiding citizens were damaged because their indictments was secured on the basis of flimsy testimony.

CHILD DEAD IN CELLAR

Baby Boy Carries News of Sister's Sudden Demise.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 20.—With a pale blue strip of cloth, such as might have been used for the tail of a child's kite, tied so tightly around her neck that it left a great red mark, the body of 7-year-old Lena Muzio was found today in the cellar of a vacant house at 709 Cambridge street.

The finding of the body at first led to the belief that the little girl had been the victim of a serious assault and was strangled, but a coroner's autopsy showed that her death probably was due to bronchial pneumonia.

Lena was the daughter of Amil M. Muzio, a vegetable gardener, who lives at 709 Cambridge street. She left home early today with her small brother Herbert, who a few hours later returned to the house and babbed incoherently that some harm had befallen his sister. The child's mother and Jaquimo Salvia, a lodger, at once started in search of the missing child, each in opposite directions. The body was found by Salvia.

UNTIL LETTER IS FOUND

Authorized Publication of Article and Photograph in "Fads and Fancies"—Help Town Topics Defeat Photographer.

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., March 20.—Ex-President Roosevelt's testimony in the suit of a photographer who seeks to recover \$5000 from the Town Topics Publishing Company for the publication of three photographs of the ex-President in the book, "Fads and Fancies," was taken by deposition here today.

Mr. Roosevelt said that, when public attention was first attracted to the publication in question, he did not recall that he had ever given permission for the use of pictures. He thereupon discussed the matter with Secretary Loeb, and as the latter also had no recollection that permission had been granted, he allowed a statement to this effect to be published. Some time afterward, however, the ex-President said, Mr. Loeb came across the letter in which he had authorized the publication of the pictures.
