April 9.

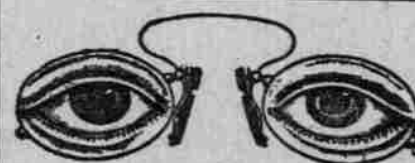
The concert announced in last Sun-

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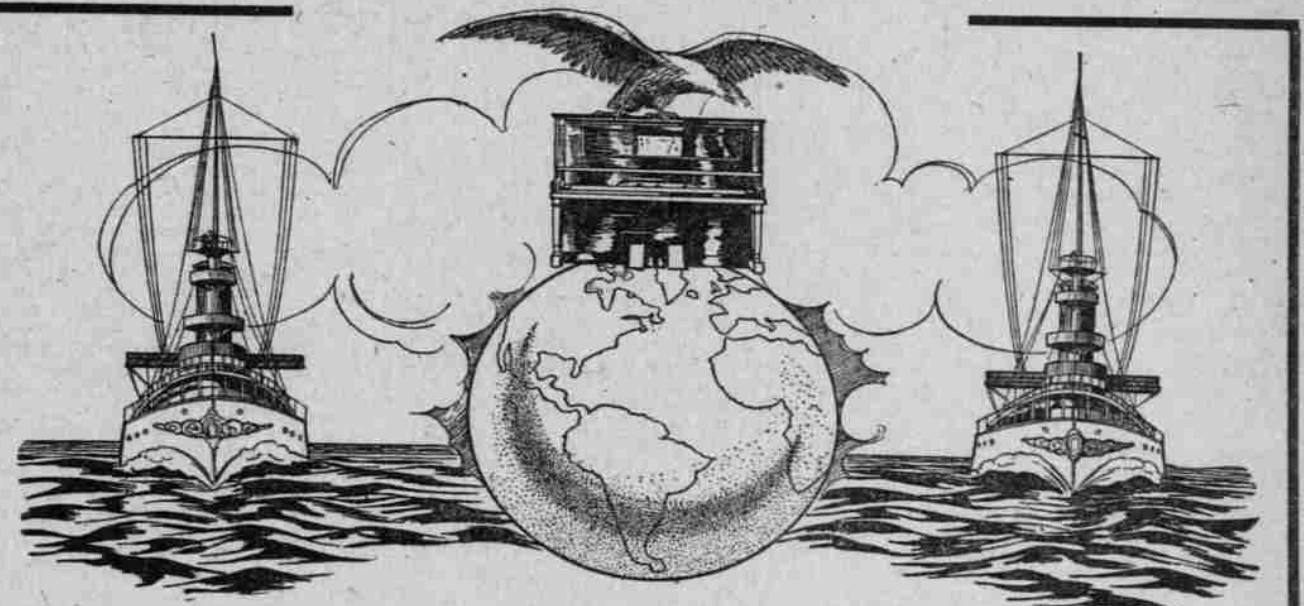

Twenty-six Pianola Pianos
