ANARCHISM HAS REACHED TO INDIA

Hindu Rebels Teach Gospel of
Murder as Imported
From Russia.

MORE DETECTIVES NEEDED

Stern Measures Proposed to Kill An-
archism Clubs—Secret Revo-
lutionary Societies—Moslems
Are Jealous of Hindus.

CALCUTTA, March 27.—(Special.)—
A remarkable feature of the latest
archivist disclosures is a slavish imi-
tation of Russian methods. The Indian
Anarchists make a close study of the
Russian manual of revolution and other Rus-
sian Anarchist literature. In Russia the
moving spirits frequently select young
and hysterical girls as their instruments;
in India the secret organizers invariably
choose excitable and underfed youths,
who are, carefully drilled and warned
never to reveal anything.

The assassin of Babu Astuch Blawas,
the Public Prosecutor at Alipur, is a
stunted, deformed youth, who resolutely
refuses to incriminate the instigators of
the deed. He practiced revolver shooting
for a month before the murder, and he
now repeats like a parrot certain sen-
tences which, it is evident, he has been
taught by others. He declares that he
has fulfilled his mission and that he
would like to be hanged at once. Astu-
ch Blawas was the only man who had
all the threads of the case of the Alipur
Anarchists in his hands, hence his murder,
but the further and larger motive of
the propagandists is to deter natives
from assisting in the government of the
country.

May Be Terrible Menace.

The introduction of Anarchism into
India is a new factor in the situation
which is of enormous import and is not
likely to dissipate. At present the prop-
aganda is in its infancy, but the tem-
ptation to wield so potent and terrible a
menace will probably be too strong to
be resisted. It is feared that the move-
ment will grow in spite of all precautions.
Even now the Indian Anarchists are in
touch with Continental groups, but un-
questionably the violent political agita-
tion, particularly that of the extremists,
has provided a suitable soil for Anarch-
ism. The time must come when Great
Britain will have to reconsider her
whole attitude toward Anarchist re-
gimes. The same considerations apply to
the apostles of sedition, and people are
already asking why the men who are not
allowed to preach sedition in India may
do so with impunity in Great Britain.

Bengal is in need not of more troops,
but of a large increase in the police force,
particularly in native detectives. If
there should be further outrages, the
frontier crimes act may be introduced in
Calcutta. Under this act persons who
commit murderous assaults upon gov-
ernment officials may be tried on the
same day and executed on the next.

Secret Revolutionary Societies.

A dispatch from Dacca says that in-
quiries that reveal many proofs that the
Anarchist organization in Calcutta is in
close touch with the revolutionary so-
cieties in Eastern Bengal. Under the new
act for the suppression of seditious or-
ganizations, four important societies of
"national volunteers" in Eastern Bengal
were recently proclaimed illegal. The
principal society had its headquarters in
Dacca. The result of the proclamation
has been to convert the organizations into
secret societies. Their ramifications have
spread far and wide; the Dacca society
alone numbers several thousand mem-
bers, consisting almost entirely of Brah-
mins and other high-caste Hindus. There
are no Mohammedans. There is ample
documentary evidence of connection with
the Calcutta Anarchists, from whom in-
spiration is drawn. The societies are
modeled on approved Russian methods,
having their own inner circle which is
really active, furnishing material
whence anarchists are drawn. Lists have
been found showing a man in each vil-
lage capable of rendering active assis-
tance. Some of these societies were
formed six years ago, before the partici-
pation of Bengal.

Beyond occasionally terrorizing villages,
committing acts of dacoity to obtain
funds, and generally obstructing the
work of administration, these societies
give no visible sign of activity. It is
unquestionable, however, that they en-
joy the sympathy of the bulk of high-caste
Hindus, and few people are found ready
to assist the government in the work of
suppression. Their sources of intelli-
gence are admittedly far better than
those of the police. It is urged that the
chief want is not more native detective
but a large increase in the number of
European police officers.

In Calcutta there is a practically unan-
imous tendency among the Bengali Hin-
dus to resent the granting of separate
representation to Mohammedans. Some
of the leaders indignantly protest against
any special concession to Mohammedans,
and insist that they must leave their in-
terests in the hands of the Hindu ma-
jority. The creation of a separate Mo-
hammedan electorate would be likely to
cause bitter Hindu feelings, at any rate
in this province. In some influential
Bengali quarters signs of reaction from
the first jubilation over the reforms are
noted and a disposition to maintain that
they are too limited in scope.

The All-India Moslem League has sent
a memorial to the Viceroy against mixed
electoral colleges as tending to the elec-
tion of men who would not really rep-
resent the Moslems. It asks for truly Mo-
hammedan representatives, though satis-
fied to be associated as much as possible
with non-Moslems.

Krupps Make Aerial Torpedoes.

STOCKHOLM, March 27.—(Special.)—
Flying torpedoes invented by Lieutenant-
Colonel Unger are being manufactured in
a factory here. These torpedoes are
meant to arm aerial vessels. The appar-
atus used in launching a torpedo of 100
millimeters either only weighs a little
over 10 pounds and can therefore be
easily carried by airships or motor cars.
The torpedo contains nearly four pounds
of explosive and can be launched about
three miles.

The license for manufacturing these
torpedoes has been in possession of the
Krupp firm at Essen since the beginning
of the war.
