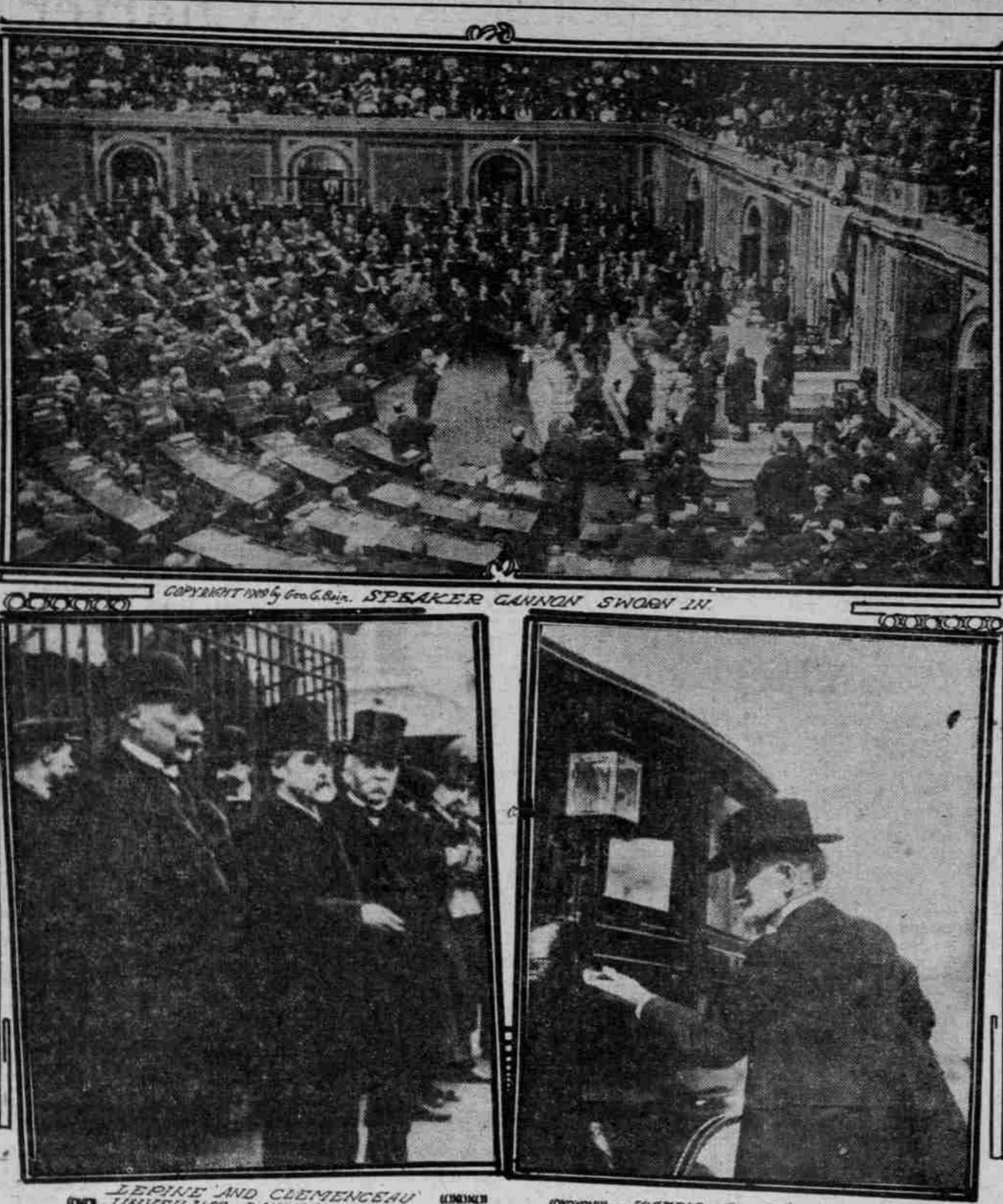


PROMINENT FIGURES IN THE NEWS OF THE DAY AT HOME AND ABROAD



NEW YORK, March 27.—(Special.)—This is the first picture made of the House of Representatives of the Sixty-first Congress. It was made by H. F. Ransom at the opening session, March 15, when the fight on the organization of the House was made and the battle half lost by the insurgents. The victory of the insurgents is of doubtful value.
