italian City Ready to Greet Roosevelt Party Upon Arrival in Italy.

MONARCH SENDS MESSAGES

Ex-President Will Be Given Welcome Befitting a Sovereign During Brief Stay in Italian Metropolis En Route to Africa.

NAPLES. April 3.—Never before have the people of Naplex shown such an interest in the arrival of a foreigner as in the expected visit of ex-President Roosevelt. Unfortunately, however, the brevity of Mr. Roosevelt's stay here will compel the abandonment of many of the arrangements that have been made for his entertainment. He probably will be able to remain in Naples but a few hours, for the latest reports say that the Hamburg will not reach here until Monday afternoon or evening.

King Emmanuel has instructed the Duke of Aosta to welcome the ex-President to Italy in his name and to express to Mr. Roosevelt the King's wish to make his persenal acquaintance, which he would have taken steps to do had not Mr. Roosevelt traveled in the strictest incognite.

Greetings From Kaiser.

The German Emperor, besides sending reetings, has ordered the German Con-ul-General here to fill Mr. Roomevelt's abin on the steamship Admiral with carnations, red, white and black, the German colors, as a token of the Emperor's homage.

The Roosevelt quarters on the Admiral will be a perfect hower, for everybody of note is sending flowers as the only way in which fittingly to welcome the great

Present at the embarkation will be representatives of the Board of Aldermen to welcome Mr. Roosevelt in behalf of the city. The American Ambassador, attended by several members of the embassy, will greet him in the name of the Americans. Journalists are coming in from every quarter; and in anticipation of the royal welcome to be given the ex-President of their country. Americans, some of them having come long distances, are crowding the hotels. Many American yachts are anchored in the harbor, among them Anthony J. Drexel's Margarita and Mrs. Robert Goelet's Nahma.

It is probable that spectators on the yachts will see little, because the police precautions are very elaborate and service boats will keep back craft of all kinds. The Prefect of Naples has given orders that a special detachment of picked carbineers be on duty at the dock to protect Mr. Roosevelt, not only from any possible assault, but also from the importunities of the populace. Both the Hamburg and the steamer Admiral will be surrounded by police boats, and it is deemed that these precautions preclude any untoward occurrences.

PORTLAND HAS 255,000

NEW DIRECTORY COMMENTS ON WONDERFUL GROWTH.

ban East Side Districts Have Increased 25 to 150 Per Cent.

According to the new city directory just issued by R. L. Polk & Co., Portiand has a population of 255,000. The publishers announce that during the publishers announce that during the past year and a half, or since the last directory was published, the suburban districts on the East Side of the river have increased in population from 25 to 150 per cent.

In the introduction to the new directory reference is made to the fact

the introduction to the new di-rectory reference is made to the fact that in 1875 the city's population was approximately 20,006. Ten years pre-vious, 1869, the population was less than 9000. Following is the intro-duction in the directory just issued:

Population 255,000. "As a matter of public interest, it is very desirable that the exact population of the city, as near as the same can be done, should be ascertained. The city probably contains 20,000 inhabitants, and the number

The above paragraph is copied verhalim from the Portland City Directory of 1879, published exactly 30 years ago, and is part of a message from the Mayor. W. S. Newbury, to the Common Gouncil. This was probably a very fair estimate of the population, as the next year's Federal census gave 20,201 as the city's poplation. Ten years previously, 1869, the population had been 8928, and the growth, the jopulation having more than doubled in that time, was justly considered rapid, and indicative of great prospectionate increase and a new era in the building improvements and commerce of the city. At about this date (1859), the World's Fair for 1900 began to be actively discussed and street railroads were planned upon a much more broader and extensive basis than had ever been considered practicable heretofore.
