A FEW HINTS AND DON'TS IN BUNGALOW BUILDING

Pointers Gathered From Long Experience and Study, by Henry Menken, 403 Chamber of Commerce, Los Angeles.

INSTEAD of an illustrated house and plan this week, I have decided to write a few suggestions calling attention to the mistakes which are so frequently made in house building, and give hints from my own experience which I trust will prove of much practical value to any prospective home builder. I am led to do this from the many inquiries which I receive from all parts of the country.

If you are planning your house with a view to economy, avoid as much as possible odd corners, bay windows, etc. These little nooks, and corners add much to the beauty of a house, but it is expensive building. There is no house so cheap as one which has a rectangular shape without recesses or projections, especially in the foundation wall.

Another economical method is to place your chimneys so that by carrying more than one flue, they will answer for two or more purposes. For instance, a kitchen chimney can also carry the flue from the furnace for the cellar. Then again, a chimney if located between the kitchen and dining-room can carry the flue for the kitchen as well as the one for the dining-room fireplace.

It is also a good plan to arrange your

chimneys so that they can be tapped for small stoves in bedrooms or other rooms in case of sickness or other emergency.

Windows and doors should be the subject of much study. Bedroom windows should give good light to the dressing table, the most satisfactory way being to have a window on either side. The location of large pieces of furniture should be considered so that they will not come in front of windows or doors. The question of ventilation is an important one, not only for the sake of coolness in summer, but for the entrance of fresh air. Windows can usually be arranged so that a room can be well aired from any direction.

An exceedingly welcome arrangement, especially if the gentleman of the house shaves himself, is to have instead of one window in the bathroom, two long narrow windows on either side of the mirror. The electric fixtures can also be placed in such a way that a good light can be had at night.

Do not economize on windows. From a sanitary standpoint, it is hardly possible to get too much light and air. The kitchen especially should be a light room, and the sink and drain-board and working table should not only be well lighted, but if possible, the windows should look out on an interesting view.

Many people are now building their front porches with cement floors and steps, a practice which it seems to me from a hygienic standpoint should be discouraged. Grown people are apt enough to contract muscular rheumatism from the use of these porches and children are almost certain to sow the seed for a crop of this almost incurable disease in after life.

Chimneys should be built-in wherever available space can be had, even at the expense of the size of the rooms. I believe no housekeeper ever had too many closets, although this is a point which most men and most builders fail to appreciate.

The roof of the house should be planned as simply as possible, as every break or valley means a weak place which is liable to leak.

A very common mistake is to build the cooling closet next to the outside wall of the house. I have seen them many times built next to the wall which receives the warmest sun of the day. It is almost always possible to locate the cooling closets away from the outer walls. A smoking fireplace is an abomination, but one that draws well and which is well located is really the social heart and soul of the whole house. It is well

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to remember that the area of the flue for a wood-burning fireplace should be 1-8 of the area of the opening of the fireplace; if for coal, the flue may be somewhat smaller, say 1-10 the area. I have seen them 1-12 of the size of the fireplace opening.

The bathroom is a part of the house which should be carefully planned. It should always be located so that it can have large outside windows. A seat in it with a hinged top and locker will be found a great convenience in many ways than one. The bathroom should be located so that it can be reached without going through a bedroom or kitchen even at the expense of a small hallway.

Except in the very large houses, kitchen pantries are almost entirely done away with today. The cabinet kitchens which are now built, are the very limit of convenience and are arranged so as to save every possible step, and the necessity for a pantry is entirely avoided.

Will Keep Breckons in Office.

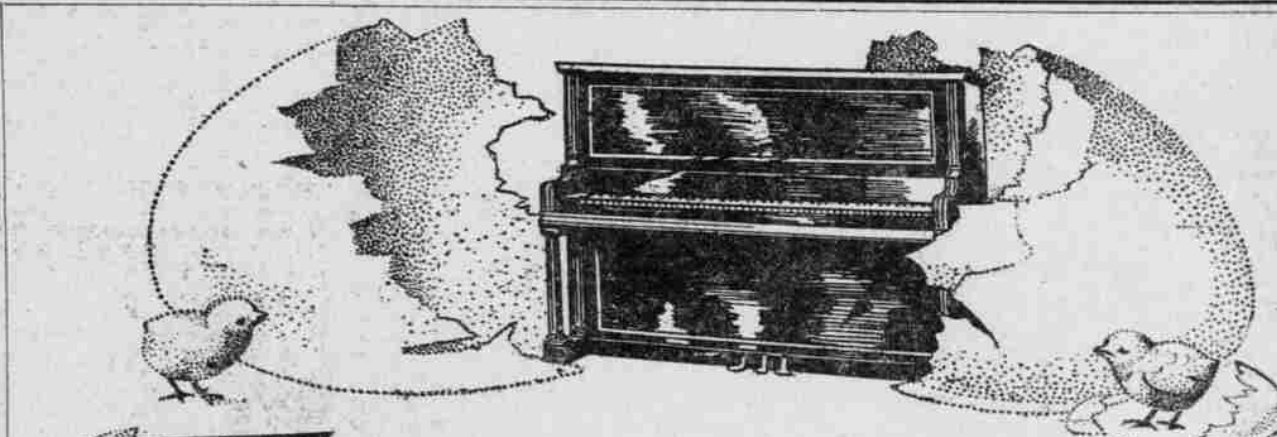
HONOLULU, April 10.—Advice received from Washington as to the effect that Attorney-General Wicker-
