

LAKE GALE TAKES TOLL OF VESSELS

Many Deaths on Inland Seas, Where Storm Overcomes Powers of Steam.

42 MISSING ON STEAMER

Wake of Storm Dotted With Derelict Hulks of Craft From Which Crews Have Been Swept to Their Death.

DETROIT, May 1.—Death and shipwrecks, such as have been unknown in recent years, resulted from storms and ice on the Great Lakes within the last few days.

On the bleak shores of Huron Island the schooner George Nestor, of Detroit, was torn to pieces last night by the furious gale that swept over Lake Superior, and her crew of seven were lost.

Somewhere in Lake Superior the passenger steamer Moore is either crippled or foundered, and 20 of her passengers are missing.

Escape in Small Boats.
On Lake Huron, lashed by a gale, the freighter Russia, of Port Huron, succumbed to the waves, after her cargo had shifted, and went to the bottom. The Russia's crew of 22 men escaped in their small boats.

On Lake Michigan the Ann Arbor railroad car ferry No. 1 picked up 15 miles south of Fox Island the big steel lighter Batavia, deserted by her crew, and with no positive evidence as to whether they had perished or been taken off by the steamer which is believed to have been towing her.

Perilous Trip on Ice.
With the arrival at Sault Ste. Marie of the crew of the steamer Aurenita, the first story was obtained of how she was crushed by the ice and sank and how the members of her crew made a perilous way over nearly four miles of ice to the steamer J. H. Barstow.

The sides of the ship were crushed in by the tremendous ice pressure. The crew crossed the gaps in the ice field and started for the steamer J. H. Barstow, also fast in the ice three miles away. The perilous trip was made in safety.

FIVE-MASTER GOES ASHORE

Schooner Wrecked on Long Island in Fierce Gale on Sound.

NEW YORK, May 1.—The five-master schooner William C. Carnegie, of Portland, Me., went ashore near the Merie's life-saving station, on the south coast of Long Island, in a north-east gale early today. Captain Reed and his crew of nine men, unable to reach the shore, boarded their yawl, and rowing seaward, anchored to await the coming of help.

The Carnegie was bound from Norfolk to Portland. Crews from the life-saving station were unable to get through the tremendous surf. One boat was overturned, and two of the life-savers were caught underneath it and nearly drowned before their comrades could rescue them.

BIG LAKE STEAMER FOUNDERS

Sinks 12 Miles Off Shore on First Trip of Season—No Lives Lost.

PORT HURON, Mich., May 1.—The passenger steamer Russia, owned by C. O. Duncan, was sunk in Lake Superior last night. All the crew were saved. The Russia, plied between Port Huron and Duluth, and was on her first trip of the season. She was a wooden boat of the Anchor Line and was of 1500 tons displacement.

The Russia had no passengers. Captain John McLean, of this city, was in command of the steamer. His message to the owners here stated merely that his ship had foundered 12 miles off Detroit and that all of the crew of 22 men were safe.

FORTY-TWO MISSING ON BOAT

Lake Superior Passenger Steamer Overdue 50 Hours in Storm.

DULUTH, Minn., May 2.—The steamer Moore of the Booth Transportation Company, which left Port Arthur last Thursday afternoon and is now 50 hours overdue at Duluth, has not been heard from and grave fears are entertained that she went ashore in a gale.

The crew comprises 12 men and there were 20 passengers.
At 12:30 this (Sunday) morning the steamer had not been sighted at Two Harbors, which is 24 miles up the north shore of Lake Superior.

BARGE ABANDONED ON LAKE

Fearful That Crew Lost in Storm Off Michigan Coast.

TRAVERSE CITY, Mich., May 1.—Ann Arbor car ferry No. 1 last night picked up the steel barge Batavia, floating 10 miles south of Fox Island without a crew. The barge was set for dinner. The barge was towed to Northport. It is feared the crew is lost.

STUDENTS BURN EFFIGY

Deposed Principal at Walla Walla Is Insulted by Pupils.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., May 1.—(Special.)—As a result of the meeting of the School Board yesterday, which refused to condemn the burning of effigies offered in favor of E. J. Klemme, principal of the high school, and deposed him, pupils attending this institution last night burned him in effigy on the principal street of the city.

The trouble between the principal and the students had been brewing for months, and, owing to influence which they brought to bear on the Board, his post record was ignored and without further warning he was discharged.

ALBANY WORKMEN STRIKE

Ditch-Diggers Demand \$2.50 a Day. Men Discharged, Others Ordered.

ALBANY, Or., May 1.—(Special.)—The crew of the Willamette Valley Company, which has been laying water mains on

First street in this city, went on a strike this morning when demands for higher wages were refused.

The company had been paying workmen \$2.25 a day. \$2.50 a day was demanded. The demand was refused and a strike was declared. All but three of the workmen threw down their tools and quit at once.

Within two hours Foreman Tyler had recruited a new crew of workmen, composed principally of hobos, but work had hardly begun when the strikers appeared. Learning that a strike was on the new workmen also quit.
Manager Welch, of the local office of the Willamette Valley Company, announced tonight that he will pay \$2.50 for work on the water mains hereafter, but that he will not permit any of the strikers to return to work on any terms. He asserted he will have a new crew of workmen Monday morning.

This is the first strike of any consequence which ever occurred in this city. It caused considerable excitement and big crowds congregated on First street to talk with the strikers and watch developments in the affair.

SUICIDE AFTER READING

IBSEN'S "MASTER BUILDER" IS TOO MUCH FOR NURSE.

Sits Up at Night With Book and Is Found Hanging to Door Late Next Morning.

NEW YORK, May 1.—(Special.)—Miss Ally Weidstrand, a handsome and accomplished woman of 33 years, a graduate of a college in Sweden and a nurse by occupation, hanged herself by a bed sheet to the door of her room in the home of a friend, Mrs. Jane Hanson, today, and was dead when found by Mrs. Hanson.

Miss Weidstrand had been in New York about five years, and had been planning a trip to Sweden to visit her mother. She was fond of literature and recently began to read some of Ibsen's works. She was depressed often by what she read. Last night she picked up a copy of "The Master Builder," read steadily for a couple of hours, and finally fell asleep in the chair.

Mrs. Hanson did not get up until about 10 o'clock today, and then went to the young nurse's room. She pushed open the door and almost fainted at the sight that confronted her. Her guest had hanged herself to the top of the door, tying the bed sheet around her neck. Miss Weidstrand's book was open on the chair, marking the scene in which the "Master Builder" threw himself from the tower.

FALLS INTO LONG SLEEP

Third Time in Two Years Malady Overtakes Beulah Hawkins.

LOS ANGELES, May 1.—Mrs. Beulah Hawkins for the third time in the last two years has passed into a state of complete coma and her strange case is again puzzling physicians. She was stricken yesterday, after feeling for several days that she was again about to go into a long sleep. She fought the strange malady, but at last it overcame her and she now lies at her home, as though dead, save for a faint breathing and an occasional fluttering of the eyelids.

Two years ago Mrs. Hawkins was overcome and for several weeks remained in a trance. Exactly one year ago she was stricken for the second time and for 85 days lay unconscious. Physicians say she has a rare form of catalepsy. After her recovery from former attacks she recovered her health and mental faculties quickly and seemed to be none the worse.

Two Forgers Sentenced.

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 1.—(Special.)—G. M. Kerr pleaded guilty this morning to forging a \$5 check and was sentenced by Judge McCredie to from six months to two and a half years in the penitentiary. W. P. Forbes pleaded guilty to forging a check for \$9 and was sentenced to from one to 14 years in the state's prison.

BLACK HAND GIVES CLEW BY ASSAULT

Attempt to Kill Longobardi May Reveal Assassins of Petrosino.

THREE MEN WERE DOOMED

Sicilians Attack Chicago Detective in Alley, but Fail to Kill—Suspect Tells Story of Conspiracy to Murder.

CHICAGO, May 1.—A Sicilian captured by the police here tonight in the search for the assassins of Detective Gabriel Longobardi, head of the "Black Hand" squad, who narrowly escaped death last night, told a story that may throw some light upon the murder of Lieutenant Joseph Petrosino, of the New York police, and also may prevent a similar attempt upon the life of a new Orleans city detective named Dantonio.

The detectives, Petrosino, Longobardi and Dantonio, according to the Sicilian's story, were marked for death by the Black Hand society in the East months ago. Petrosino was killed in Italy after a most careful plot had been laid for him.

Longobardi has been watched for weeks. Two New York Italians, whose identity is known to the police, came here several weeks ago and opened a little grocery store in the Italian quarter of the West Side. From here the Sicilians engineered their plot against Longobardi. They learned his habits and his fearless nature and decided that the best way to "get" him was to trap him into a combat when he was unarmed.

Last night the detective noticed the men prowling in the alley and went out unarmed to ask them what they wanted. For answer he was attacked with a silencer. One man hit the detective in the head. The other stabbed at his throat but missed and cut the arteries in the detective's left wrist. The men then left, thinking they had mortally wounded their man.

DEFICIT IS STILL GROWING

Revenue Smaller in April—Expenses \$92,465 Over Receipts.

WASHINGTON, May 1.—The statement of the government receipts and expenditures for April shows unsatisfactory results both as to receipts from customs and internal revenue. The receipts from customs for the month were \$25,031,659 and from internal revenue \$18,923,896. This is a falling off of about \$600,000 in the receipts from customs, as compared with March, and a decrease of \$1,000,000 in the receipts from internal revenue. The deficit for the month is about \$3,000,000.

The expenditures for the month were \$25,950,620, which is nearly \$1,500,000 less than for the previous month. This decrease is principally shown in the war, Navy, pension and public works items. For the 30 months of the present fiscal year the disbursements exceeded the receipts by \$2,165,900. The deficit one year ago was nearly \$52,000,000.

BUGGY STRIKES OLD MAN

Careless Driving on Part of Two Women Said to Have Caused It.

John Copeland, 55 years old, living at 180 Lancaster avenue, is in the North Pacific Sanatorium as the result of an accident at 20-cent and Burnside streets last night because of the careless driving of two women in a buggy. Copeland was struck by the buggy and the wheels came along at a fast gait, and, according to witnesses, the shaft struck the old man, knocking him down, and the wheels ran over him. The women got away without their identity becoming known.
