PRICE OF FLOUR UP

Local Market Advances 20
Cents Barrel.

BUTTER ALSO IS SOARING

Increased Cost of Latter Commodity
Is Due to Heavy Drain on Port-
land Market to Fill Orders
for Alaska Trade.

Advances in food prices of general interest to consumers are being made in the flour and butter markets. Yesterday morning there was effective advance of 20 cents a barrel in all grades of domestic flour. This brings the wholesale price of patent flour up to \$5.25 a barrel, the highest price at which flour has been quoted in the local market in many years.

The advance is due not only to the high price of wheat, but to the fact that stocks of flour in the Northwest have run down to the danger point. The smaller mills have nearly all exhausted their surplus of flour and the larger mills are said to have barely enough to carry them through to the time when new-crop wheat will be available. A similar advance of 20 cents a barrel occurred in the Seattle market Friday. In the East flour prices are even higher than in the Pacific Coast.

Of last year's crop of wheat very little remains in the Northwest. The farmers have nothing and the total stock held by the merchants would not make up a good-sized cargo. What is left is held by the larger mills and to protect their supply they have raised the price of flour. The advance in the butter market to 28 cents a pound, wholesale, came as something of a surprise. At the time of year butter is supposed to be cheap, and it would be, with the production large, were it not for the demands of the Puget Sound cities and Alaska. Seattle dealers are engaged in filling Far Northern orders, which have taxed the supply in that city and, therefore, sent prices up. The Seattle market now being on a 2-cent basis. As Portland was much lower, the Alaska orders were sent here to be executed. The market here would also have been drained bare. A readjustment of values was therefore necessary to preserve the parity between the two markets.

The present Portland quotation of 28 cents compares with a market price of 24 cents at this time last year, 22 1/2 cents two years ago and 20 cents three years ago. In a general way, the higher prices of the present time can be attributed to the fact that the consumption of butter here and in markets dependent on Oregon has increased faster than the production.

The make of butter is not yet at the maximum for the season. June will see the greatest output, and as the Alaska demand will have been satisfied by that time, it is likely that prices will decline somewhat.

If this is not an accurate reproduction of the story it nevertheless faithfully sets forth the impression it made upon a 9-year-old child. As a story it fills any child's sensibility with indignation and disgust and I consider it an outrage to teach such rubbish to young minds. Better turn them loose to dogs’ tails and stone nesting robins, but at least allow children to continue to believe that the taking of human life is a serious and not a funny thing—and that if the awful necessities of war must be imposed upon their meaning, let the lesson be to grasp their meaning, let the lesson be to grasp the gravity which befalls the subject.

Meet at Beaverton May 21.

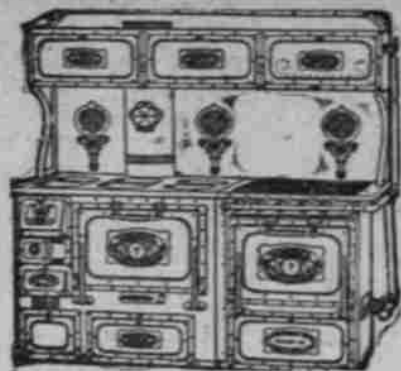

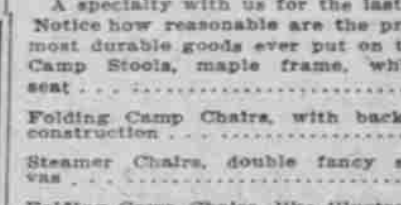

TELLS NEED OF BRIDGE
M. G. MUNLY EXPLAINS BROADWAY PROJECT.

Location Logical One, He Says, and Increasing Population Makes Construction Urgent.

Following is a summary of an address of Judge M. G. Munly on the bridge question at a recent meeting of the North East Side Improvement Association.

Nearly two years ago, the necessity of increased bridge facilities across the Willamette River became apparent to the members of the North East Side Improvement Association. The steady increase of traffic across the Burnside and Steel bridges, especially the latter, and similar increase of commerce on the river, requiring the frequent opening of the draw, convinced the members of the Association that the construction of a new bridge to be located north of the Steel bridge.

The precise location of such bridge was one of much importance and occasioned much debate. It was decided that some point between the Steel bridge and Hancock street, on the North East Side, was the most available and the best calculated to bridge the situation on the North East Side is the construction of such a bridge as that proposed at Broadway.
