As a result of the conflagration, which lasted more than four hours, sensational developments are expected. A fire was discovered in the basement of the building two hours before the last alarm was turned in. Mattresses stored in a second-hand store were burning at that lime. The bluse was quenched, no sparks being left to start another fire, declares the fire chief. The last fire, which destroyed the building, started in the same pile of mattresses. An investigation is being made.

A fire in the residence district of Reno carly this morning almost totally destroyed one residence, badly scorched snother and burned three people so hadly that they are now in the hospital.
