OAKS PREPARES FOR OPENING

Outdoor Resort to Be Greater Attraction This Season Than Ever.

The Oaks will open May 29, next, for the season, according to announcement yesterday by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. There will be new attractions and novelties along the trail, but it is stated that the leading feature of the season's programme at the resort will be music by various imported bands of recognized merit. The grounds have been greatly improved by the seeding of lawns and planting of shrubs, among which are over 5000 roses. These latter—good weather siding—will be in full bloom by June and form a very charming feature which the Oaks management has named "The Rose Garden of Portland."

Over \$2000 has been expended during the past winter in "rip-rapping" with rock the river front at these grounds, greatly improving its appearance, and preventing possible loss by high water. Arrangements have been made with the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company by the Rose Festival committee whereby one of the important features of the carnival programme will be given at the Oaks. Details for this are not fully worked out, but it is understood that the plans include an immense fireworks display.

The railway company says that, as heretofore, the Oaks will be maintained strictly a clean, wholesome pleasure resort for all the people.

Did Not Make Logs Playground.

Mrs. Eva Jacobson, whose 8-year-old daughter Gladys was drowned in the Willamette on May 1, is slowly recovering from the shock and grief follow-

ing the accident. Through some error, publicity was given the statement that the scene of the little girl's death had for many years been the playground of the children, and that the family had fished there for several seasons. This has caused Mrs. Jacobson added grief since it carries with it the idea that she had been negligent in her duties

as a mother. The family has moved to 543 Lake street since the Christmas holidays, and the evening of the accident was the first time the children had ever been down to the river bank. On this evening they had asked to be allowed to go with Lindsey and Winkie, the borders on a catfishing expedition, the mother refusing them permission

until she could accompany them after the housework was finished. The accident occurred as a result of the little girl rocking the logs on which she stood, and she, with Lindsey, drowned. Mrs. Jacobson feels that the impression gained at the time of the accident should be cleared, since she is in no way to blame for any carelessness.

An Artistic Bungalow in Cobbles and Shingles

In response to many inquiries we illustrate this week the clever little bungalow which appears on the cover of "Bungalowcraft." It is not so very little either, having a front of 22 feet and a depth of 50 feet, exclusive of the front porch. The exterior design is most attractive, and one can readily imagine how charming it will be with the addition of a few vines, shrubs and rose bushes.

The large exposed chimney and the porch work are of medium-sized cobbles-stones, the walls are covered with cedar shingles and the roof with redwood shingles, while the outside trim is of rough (wire-brushed) pine, stained.

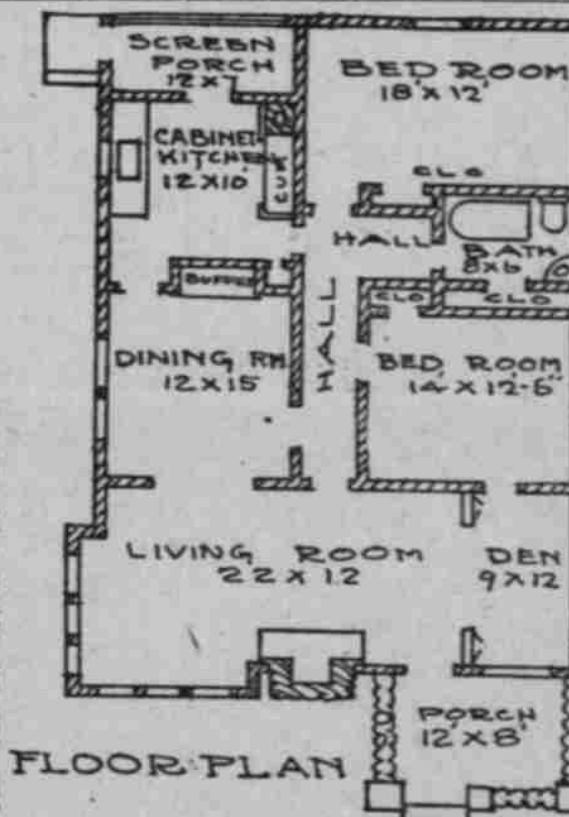
The windows are well arranged to give plenty of light and air and still be in keeping with the quaint rustic exterior. A wide front door of oak, with a plate-glass panel, opens into a large living-room with broad fireplace and mantel. A feature of the living-room is the large oriel window, taking in nearly the entire left end, with French windows along two sides.

A cozy den or library opens through a buttressed opening from the right end of the living-room. Bookcases are built in the library on either side of the opening.

The dining-room, with its high-paneled wainscot, plate rail and handsome buffet, is a most attractive room and is entered from the living-room through a handsome cased opening. For convenience it also connects with the short hall, which in fact connects every room in the house, including the bathroom. The house has a well-arranged full cabinet kitchen, excellent and ample closet, arrangement, a large linen and storage closet in the bathroom and good-sized rooms throughout.
