PROPOSED ADANA MASSACRE

High Government Official Sent Dispatch to Governor.

AINTAB, Asiatic Turkey, May 15.—
It was learned here today that the local Governor received from Constantinople on the day following the outbreak of anti-Christian routing at Adang a message suggesting the killing of Armenfans as a precaution against insurrection.

The identity of the sender of the communication has not been disclosed, but he was closely connected with the official life of the party then in power.

REFUGEES FED BY THOUSANDS

Relief Measures Under Way at Adana, but Suffering Is Great.

ADANA, Asiatic Turkey, May 15.—
Twenty-two thousand refugees were fed in this city yesterday. Three hundred wounded persons are being cared for at the American and other hospitals in Adana. It is estimated that 4000 of the refugees are ill, 400 of them from measles, dysentery and typhoid fever.

On account of the under-feeding and exposure the mortality is great among the children.

HINDU'S BODY CREMATED

Oriental Funeral Conducted in All Its Horror at Cranbrook.

SPOKANE, Wash, May Is, -(Special) - A special from Cranbrook, B. C., says,

Sheai Singh, a Hindu, died at the St. Eugene Hospital this morning. The dead man was an employe of the Standard Lumber Company, whose mill is four miles north of Cranbrook. At noon today the body was taken by W. R. Beatty, a local undertaker, to the company's mill, where a large pile of wood and splinters had been raised. The box containing the shrouded body was placed on the pile and a match did the rest.

Presently the box fell to pieces on the pile and the body could be seen, the cooked flesh dropping from the bones until all that was left were the bomes of the hunds, feet, ribs and head. The ashes remaining were sent back to india to be thrown in the River Ganges.

Automobiles, rigs and saddle horses brought a crowd of Canadians to witness the scene. The clothing of the dead Hindu was burned. This is the first time the government agent has been asked for and granted a permit to cremate a body. Four Hindu friends of the dead foreigner attended the ceremoney with wailing and gnashing of teeth.
