NEW YORK, May 15.—(Special.)—Through the combined efforts of the Kentucky Society of New York and Henrietta Crozman, a fitting memorial to the genius of the late Stephen Foster, author of "Way Down Upon the Suwannee River" and other famous Southern songs, is to be erected in Louisville in the near future. It will take the shape of a white marble shaft, topped by a sculptured bust of Foster. It will stand in one of the public parks. The unveiling ceremonies will be impressive. While Foster was a native of Florida, he traveled much and spent a great deal of his life in Louisville and the people of that city regard him as one of their own. Miss Crozman was a grandniece of Foster. She was recently a guest of honor at the meeting of the Kentucky Society and recited stanzas from his best known poems. Miss Crozman believes in going after woman's suffrage with a gun. She told a meeting of the suffragettes recently that she had been working since she was 14 and supporting men most of that time, and it made her blood boil to think that the law regarded man as her superior.

Madame Lillian Nordica sailed last week for London. She will sing there and throughout England. In the fall she is to return to New York and join the Metropolitan Opera Company for a series of Wagner performances. This it is thought may be her last appearance on the operatic stage. It is reported that she is to marry George W. Young, a New York banker, and she does not deny it. Mme. Nordica's voice has shown this season the strain of overwork, but her friends hope she may return in the fall with her vocal powers wholly restored. Her reappearance at the Metropolitan will be welcome to the subscribers to the season, for she is socially, as well as professionally, a great favorite among them.

Dorothy Kincel is, so far as is known, the only professional girl jockey in the world. She lives at Letcher, S. D., and is only 14 years old. Her earnings in the saddle pay for her schooling. She weighs 107 pounds and is strong. She trains as well as rides horses. Of course, her riding is confined to the small Western meetings, for she could not get a license to ride on the big Eastern tracks.

Rose Lambert is the central figure among the Americans in danger from Moslem fanatics at Hadjin. She is the

Clock Painter Dodges 30-Foot Minute Hand While on Job.

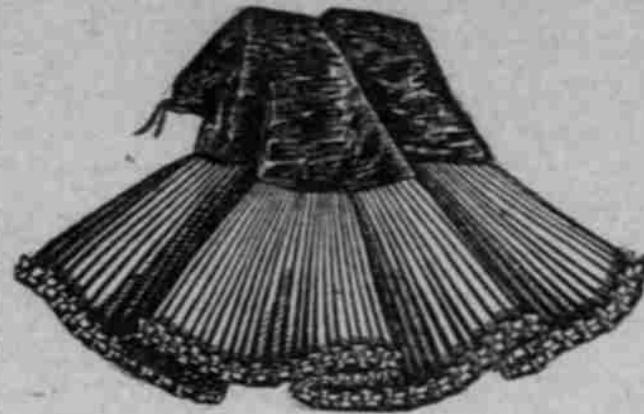

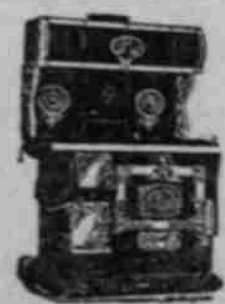
