Wife Refuses to Appear Against George Sawyers at Roseburg.

ROSEBURG, Or., May 22.—(Special).—Trial of George Sawyers, whose actions caused such excitement in this section about the wedding of his wife, was indicated by the grand jury on a charge of bigamy, will not come up at this term of court, and will probably be dropped altogether, his wife having refused to appear against him.

Sawyers was former principal of the Oakland school and last December disappeared, turning up after two weeks, broken in health and seemingly crazed by sickness. It later developed that he had gone to meet his former wife, whom he alleged he had thought dead.

ROSEBURG, Or., May 22.—(Special).—J. H. Sommers and Jacob Haas, of Marshfield, have applied to the County Court for a franchise to construct an electric line in Douglas County. The proposed line to run from Cool Bay to Roseburg, taking in the various small towns and thickly settled valleys on the way, and from Roseburg to the Douglas County line at Diamond Lake, adjoining Clatsop County. The promoters are supplying the line with standard gauge.
