Local loggers say the apparent difference in price is caused by the fact that on the Sound the logs are graded systematically, while here they are not They say that even if the reduction as announced on Friday has been made by the found loggers, which they doubt, the prices are still as high, as are those prevailing here. For instance, the fir logs are graded as red, No. 2, merchantable and flooring, the last-named three grades lesing all yellow fir. Under the prices named on Friday, No. 2 logs are quoted at 5.50 per thousand feet, merchantable named on Friday, No. 2 logs are quoted at \$5.50 per thousand feet, merchantable at \$3 and flooring at \$1. In the Columbia River district the only grades of fir logs are red, bastard, which in reality is young reliew fir, and yellow. The rates per thousand feet for these prevailing at the present time are \$5 for red, \$7.50 for lastard and \$19 for yellow, fully as low and for the higher grades lower than the prices on the Sound.

BERLIN, May Z.—Berlin was the scene lase today of the Best special contest of dirigible balloons, ever a course of about 12 miles, which resulted in a dead heat. The semi-rigid Gross II, commanded by Major Sperling, competed against the flexible Parseval II, commanded by Captallo George.

The start was from the Tegel airship practice grounds, Gross II getting away first. The Panerval quickly followed and both made directly across the center of Berlin teward the turning point, three bigh factory chimneys at the edge of Templehof.

The Gross II maintained, but did not increase, its lead, and as the airships turned the goal under excellent centrel, the motors of both were put at top speed. Neither, however, gained or lost any advantage, and the balloons findly returned to the starting point without having changed their positions. The recorded time of the flight was exactly 20 militates.

Virtually the whole population of Ber-lin was able to watch the maneuvers of the airships from start to finish, as they kept about 300 feet above the earth.
