Most Attractive Los Angeles Bungalow

BY THE BUNGALOW CRAFT CO., 402 CHAMBER OF COMMERCE, LOS ANGELES, CAL.

The bungalow illustrated above is one of the most attractive small houses in this city of bungalows. Its lines are well-proportioned in every direction, producing an artistic effect without any fancy work, and the house is one of the "show places" of the town. The exterior is a weatherboarded with shingled gables, the porch work and chimney are of hard blue burnt brick, pointed with black mortar, and the caps and coping are of cement colored a reddish slate color to match the front steps and cement walks.

There is a commodious porch, 8 feet wide by 26 feet long, about 18 inches of which is covered, and the remainder is open terrace.

The house is 32 feet front by about 36 feet deep, including porch, and it should be built complete for about \$9000.

It has oak floors in living-room, den and dining-room, and high-oak oak floors in living-room, den and dining-room, built-in buffet, seats and book-cases and a fine fireplace with mantel in living-room. It will be seen that the rooms are all of good size, well proportioned and excellently arranged. The arrangement of the bathroom, with separate toilet, which also opens to the screen porch, is good. The closets are all large and there is a fine linen closet with drawers.

The inside trim is all of shagreen Oregon pine, stained and varnished and rubbed down to a dull gloss. The walls are tinted and there is a smooth enameled wall in imitation of tile, below the chair rail in the kitchen and bathroom. The ceiling is nine feet high and the living-room ceiling is beamed. The kitchen is in full buffet cabinet style, with every convenience in the way of cupboards, drawers, bins, cooler, etc.

Cream Puffs That Will Stay Puffed Minutely Described

Lillian Tingle Also Tells in Answer to Queries How to Make Candy Bucket, Fireless Cooker, Sauce Tartare and Fruit Cocktails With Sherry in It.

NEWBERG, Or., May 17.—I have been so interested in your articles on cake-making I took for your paper the first thing upon opening The Oregonian, and I have so wished for your help in making cream puffs, which I have so much trouble with. I wonder if you would tell in the paper just how to construct this candy-bucket fireless cooker. I should so much like to know how to make one.

MRS. N. F.
I am very glad indeed if I can be of help to you, either in regard to cream puffs or anything else. With the following mixture: One-half cup butter, 1 cup boiling water, 4 eggs, 1 cup flour. Heat the water and butter together in a pan. When the mixture boils, add the sifted flour, all at once, and beat vigorously. When a smooth rather stiff paste is formed, remove from the fire and beat until somewhat cooled. Then add the eggs, unbeaten, one at a time, and beat vigorously between each egg. Drop by spoonfuls on a buttered baking sheet, make the cakes circular and high as possible and place about one and one-half inches apart. Or put on the mixture in long, oval shapes, with the aid of a frosting tube or paper cone. Bake about 20 minutes in a medium oven, with heat strongest at the bottom. Open at the side with a sharp knife to admit the cream filling—either whipped cream or rich custard. Sift a little powdered sugar over on serving if the eggs are very large, three will be enough.

Failure with these puffs is usually due to one of the following mistakes: (1). Cooking the flour paste so long that it becomes greasy and tough and the butter oozes out. The flour paste should tend to leave the sides of the pan, but should not have lost its elasticity. (2). Adding the eggs while the paste is still hot enough to cook them, so that all their elasticity and leavening power is destroyed before they reach the oven. (3). Too great haste in removing the cakes from the oven. "Always bake them a little longer than seems necessary." is a good rule with pop-overs and cream puffs. The sides must be firm enough not to collapse when the air inside cools. They may

pers and parsley. For a small quantity beat the yolk of an egg with one-fourth teaspoonful salt and a few drops vinegar, using a Dover egg beater. Add gradually about a tablespoon of vinegar, or half tarragon vinegar and half lemon juice, and by degrees 1 cup olive oil. Keep it very cold and of a thick creamy consistency. Add 2 tablespoons each of pickles, stoned olives, capers, and parsley, chopped fine enough to pass through a sieve. This may also be used as a dressing for potato or tomato salad.

I hope the following may be the kind of thing you want: many variations are of course possible: Mix grape fruit pulp, shredded pineapple (fresh), sliced banana and strawberries. Add about 1 cup grape fruit to half a cup each of the other fruits, or other proportions as you may prefer. Pour on a dressing made of one-third cup sherry, 2 tablespoons apricot brandy, half a cup sugar syrup (heavy) and the tiniest pinch of salt. Chill thoroughly. Serve in double cocktail glasses and garnish with a candied or maraschino cherry. Instead of the sherry and brandy a little orange syrup could be used.

GRAFTER CONFESSES ALL

Oklahoma Who Blackmailed Bootleggers Accuses Others.

SHAWNEE, Okl., May 22.—Confessing his own guilt and implicating others in a charge of grafting in the protection of "bootleggers" and "joint keepers," Virgil Biggers, recently suspended as County Attorney of the county, testified here yesterday in a bribery case in which William Mabey, a district judge, is defendant. Biggers declared that Judge Mabey himself and others met the bootleggers in conference, agreed upon terms and later accepted money brought to them by County Commissioner Hager. Biggers said that considerable sums had been delivered to Hager in an envelope by Oat Johnson and L. E. Howell, jointkeepers. Johnson then took the stand and reiterated the story of the conference and the passage of money. Mabey and Biggers were indicted several weeks ago following charges by the Rev. Mr. Bulgin, an evangelist, who charged county officials with accepting bribes from bootleggers and gamblers of Shawnee. Mr. Bulgin charged that, in the last year \$125,000 had been paid for protection.

NEW HIGH RECORDS

Grain Prices Soar in Chicago Market.

MAY WHEAT UP TO \$1.32 3-4

Shorts Uneasy Because of Brief Time in Which to Deliver.

Oats at Top Price of Season.

CHICAGO, May 22.—New high record marks for the season were made today in the price of wheat and oats. May wheat advancing to \$1.32 3-4, and May oats to \$1.15. Corn was also firm, but provisions were only steady.

The wheat market was "an erratic affair, with the strength of May a prominent feature. Shorts on that day were more uneasy on account of the short remaining time in which to deliver. With the exception of the current month, the market in general at the start displayed considerable weakness. Later, however, prices advanced sharply, July rallying 1 1/2¢ from the low point.

One of the principal bullish factors was a report, credited to an official of one of the Western railroads, which estimated the wheat crop of Kansas at the low figure of 40,000,000 bushels. Another strengthening influence was the improved demand for cash wheat here and in the Northwest. The market was nervous during the final hour, but bullish sentiment predominated and a firm tone prevailed at the close. The range on May was between \$1.11 and \$1.12 1/2, and on July between \$1.14 1/2 and \$1.17 1/2. The close showed gains of 1/4¢ to 3/4¢, May being at \$1.32 3-4 and July at \$1.17 1/2.

60¢. The close was firm with prices up 1/4¢ to 1/2¢. July being at 60¢. All deliveries of oats rose to new high levels for the season as a result of renewed demand by livestock shorthorns. There was no change in the general situation. The top for May was reached at 51¢ and for July at 54¢. The market closed strong at almost the highest point, at net gains of 1/4¢ to 1/2¢ with May at 51¢ and July 54¢.

Trade in provisions was quiet. The closing prices were the lower to 2¢ to 5¢ higher.
