

WASHINGTON HIGH
WINS TRACK MEETColumbia and Portland Acad-
emy Tie for Second Place
With 20 Points Each.

GOOD RECORDS ARE MADE

School Athletes Show Collegiate
Form, 100-Yard Dash Being
Run in 10 2-5
Seconds.

With a total of 44 points, Washington came out winner of the fourth annual track and field meet held at the University of Oregon yesterday afternoon. Columbia University and Portland Academy tied for second place with 25 points each. Lincoln High School took 28 points and Allen Preparatory School was last in the list with one second place, counting three points.

Washington was weak in the dashes but its strength lay in the long distance runs and the hurdles. The weights were also part of the events taken. Washington won all three 120-yard high hurdles, first in the 440-yard dash, first at second place in the 220-yard hurdles, first in the mile run, first in the discus throw, second in the shotput and pole vault, and third place in the broad jump. The team was awarded the handsome cup offered by the league.

The victory was conceded to Washington after the first five events, and a struggle ensued between the Lincoln and Columbia University and Portland Academy for second place. Up to the last two events, Columbia and Portland Academy were tied with 19 points each, with Columbia second behind Washington. The mile relay which was won by Portland Academy with Columbia second and the pole vault which was won by Columbia, Portland Academy taking third, advanced these two schools to 25 points each, leaving Lincoln out of the running. By winning the relay Portland Academy won a special cup offered by the league for that event.

Miller Takes Half-Mile. Some remarkably good records were made by the contestants in a number of them came close to intercollegiate time. The 100-yard dash was made in 10 2-5 seconds, which equals the record in Portland interscholastic competition. The 440-yard run was made in 2:03 3-5, the race being won by Miller, of Washington High School. The local record was broken in this event. The mile was made in 4:55 1-5. The 220-yard dash, won by Billedeon, was one of the fastest events in the meet, the time being 23 1-5 seconds. This is considered remarkably good.

There were no particular stars of the afternoon. The honors being about evenly distributed. Norris, of Portland Academy, led in individual points, scoring two firsts and one third. He also finished winner in the relay. Miller, of Washington, was second with two thirds. Euster, for Washington, was third with one first, one second, and one third.

The spirit shown was commendable and Trainer Hayward, of the University of Oregon, who was present, remarked on the enthusiasm the athletes took in the meet.

Hayward Praises Athletes.

"There is some very good material in the schools for first-class athletes," said Hayward. "They show the right spirit and in many instances, the right form. Their work is some of the best I have seen. The reason the Eastern schools surpass the Western schools in athletics is on account of the greater number of meets held in a year. If when the track season opens, the schools would hold the meets at least once or twice a month, there would be greater development among the athletes. However, I think the lads made a good showing and the way the meet was hastened through without the usual drag, was praiseworthy."

Still, the Vernontes rattled Harkness for enough good hits to entitle them to two runs and that was enough to win.

In addition to the trio of runs collected in the first, Vernon scored another in the fifth. Stovall had hit safely and Ryan, in coming in on Haley's short fly, fell down and the clout went for three bases, scoring Stovall. Portland's lone run came in the third on errors by Mott and Haley, which allowed Olson to travel the route.

The game was a slow affair and was anything but interesting, simply because Mr. McGreedy permitted more talkbacks than even Jack McCarthy ever did. After seven innings of almost continual ragging on the part of Brackenridge, the ump finally mustered enough courage to can the belligerent twirler, although he allowed some others on both teams to remain through the session. 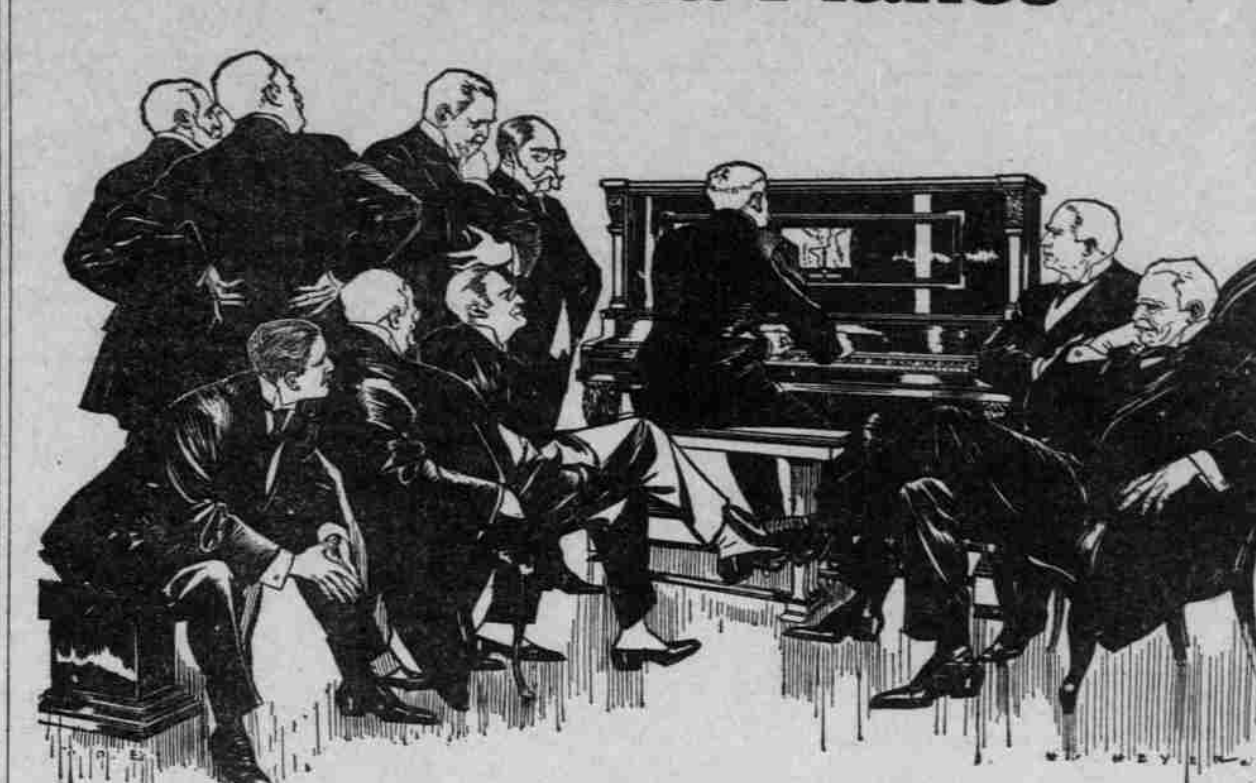
