ROSE Festival week, with its social and incidental entertaining, promises to be an active one. The opening night of the festival has been propitiously chosen for the large reception at the Hotel Portland which will be given by the Japanese Consul at Portland, Y. Numano, and Mrs. Numano, in honor of Rear-Admiral Nichol and the captains and officers of the H. I. J. M.'s cruisers Aso and Soya. The reception, for which 1200 cards have been issued, promises to be an elaborate affair. Almost the entire lower floor of the Portland is to be used for the occasion, the drawing-rooms and halls being metamorphosed into a Japanese bower. A banquet of 60 covers is to precede the reception, and will take place in the grillroom, where the decorations are also to be on a most elaborate scale. A miniature lake is to be arranged in the center of the great table, while wisteria and Japanese cherry blossoms in profusion are to be the flowing from Japanese censets and gaily colored lanterns by the hundreds are to be used, while the Sixth-street court is to be screened, as was done at the reception for Admiral Swinburne. The gallery and the upper stories of the hotel will be ablaze with electric lights, while an electric fountain of large dimensions is to play on the roof. Two bands will furnish the music. The court is to be arranged with divans, rugs and table-tops, where supper is to be served. Mrs. Numano, the hostess, whose picture appears on today's page, has made many friends since her arrival. Mrs. Numano was married at London. Soon after the wedding Mr. Numano was appointed Vice-Consul at London, and during that period Mrs. Numano attended the Sacred Heart convent at Tokyo, where she studied English and French. On her arrival in Portland to meet Mr. Numano on his return from London, Mrs. Numano wore the quaint and becoming Japanese kimono, which she has since relegated for American costumes. Mrs. Numano speaks excellent French and plays prettily on the Japanese harp.
