

Most liberal has been the response from Portland's owners of paintings for the loan exhibit, which is to continue through the Summer at the Museum of Art. At this time the canvasses, water colors and pastels, hung in three spacious exhibit halis, reach a total of close to 200, and further valuable donations are being made daily.

Notable in the list are paintings by Turner, Corot, Gainsborough, Duprey, Daubigny, Cuip, Giorgione and Monticelli, and of the Americans, Innes, Brush and Chase.

Modern Americans' works predominate in the collection. There are endless admirable canvasses in portraits, landscape and still-life. The paintings have been hung according to general effect and without any attempt at segregation of schools.
