Heney Will Cause Bitter Contest

Candidacy for District Attorney Makes Graft Issue—Livermash's Gold-Plated Wedding—Combine of Big San Francisco Hotels Probable.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19.—(Special.)—The injection of Francis J. Heney into the municipal election this year promises to make that contest one of the bitterest that San Francisco has ever witnessed. While the Mayorality promises to be a hard-fought issue, Mr. Heney as a candidate for the District Attorneyship will have the spotlight mostly to himself. Mr. Heney has already been nominated for that office by the San Francisco Democratic Club. He is avowedly a candidate for the Republican nomination, and it begins to look very much as if he will be a bothersome question. San Francisco, which is not by any means ready to claim Mr. Heney as its own, was somewhat startled this morning by the announcement in a morning paper, which is admittedly a Heney organ, that the special prosecutor in the graft cases would seek the Republican nomination.

The interview with Mr. Heney in this particular paper reads as follows:

Heney States His Position.

"Yes, I will be a candidate for District Attorney if the right man is not brought out with something like more than reasonable assurance of his election. I will not see the work of the last three years thrown away. And I will not stand idly by and see a thief and a crook capture the District Attorney's office. I do not want to be a candidate and I do not want to be District Attorney. It is unfair that I should be forced to make the fight, but I will make it rather than see the office go by default to the crooks, as it now appears to be going."

"I do not propose to permit the people to think that I want to shirk any duty I owe them, and I certainly do not propose to permit the crooks and grafters to think that I am afraid of them or that they are to be permitted to nullify the work of three years. There is no question in my mind about how the people stand on this question. In any event, the question will be put up to them—in the person of another candidate, I hope—but it will be put up to them."

Livermash-Dumouriez Wedding.

California has been much interested and amused in the news from New York of the wedding of Edward James de Livermash, who was known here as Edward Livermash, to Mrs. Daisy Zilla Dumouriez, of France and California. Livermash was a Congressman, until he secured permission of the courts to change his title. Mr. Livermash was formerly a journalist in the employ of the San Francisco Examiner. He espoused the cause of labor and was elected to Congress, much to the surprise of the people at large. While in Congress he posed as a plain man of

the people. After losing that situation and subsequently losing his footing with William Randolph Hearst, Mr. Livermash joined the Bulletin as a special writer.

But the news of the New York wedding indicates that it was anything but an affair of the masses. Mr. de Livermash, in a uniform of blue and gold, held the bride's cloak during the ceremony. The bride, the daughter of the ex-Congressman, was a florist to see that the bride should not tread upon anything but rose petals from the time she entered until she left the little church.

\$1000 Talking Machine.

Even with that, it must have had a bizarre touch, for the dispatches say that one of the wedding presents from her husband to the bride was a talking machine that was made to order at a cost of nearly \$1000. All the metal mountings were gold plated, and the carved-wood case for records was decorated with gold leaf and gold decorations.

Big Hotels May Combine.

A holding company to control the three big caravansaries of San Francisco, the Palace, the St. Francis and the new Fairmont Hotel, may soon be a reality. These three hotels have in the aggregate \$15,000,000 of property and are expected soon to enjoy an aggregate income of more than \$1,200,000. The proposed company is simply to control the leases and not to buy the properties. Although the gigantic scheme has been discussed for some time, it has not taken tangible shape in that all the parties to the agreement are trying to reach some agreement on a sound business basis.

The tentative plan is to have a new company organized to lease the Palace and take over the leases of the St. Francis and the Fairmont. The latter hotel is leased by the Palace Hotel Company for 10 years at \$120,000 a year with an option of 10 years more. Herman Oelrichs, of New York, owns the Fairmont property, but owing to the lease in question is not concerned in the negotiations. The furnishings of the Palace are owned by the Palace Hotel Company and are valued at \$500,000.

Crocker's Own St. Francis.

The St. Francis is owned by the children of the late Fred Crocker. Miss Jennie Crocker and Templeton Crocker. It is not known what rent is paid for the St. Francis. After the fire, the hotel was refitted at a cost of \$1,200,000. The ground and the building, including the annex, are valued at more than \$1,500,000. The Palace, which is to open in November, has as a company already issued \$5,000,000 of stock and authorized a bond issue of \$3,000,000. Before the St. Francis was paying a net profit of \$500,000 annually, or 10 per cent on a valuation of \$5,000,000. The St. Francis, if reports are true, is showing a large net earning capacity. Mr. Wood, the present manager of the St. Francis, is said to be slated as

manager of the combined hotels, if the deal goes through.

Hero of Chimay Elopement.

Janeal Rigo, whose recorded romances include an elopement with the Princess Carman-Chimay, has arrived in San Francisco with 30 trunks, his most recent wife and eight gypsy musicians. The hero of the "Chimay" story, who was formerly the wife of Caspar Emerson, a New York artist, is a first cousin of the Princess Chimay and in this wild adventure she titled relative is still a wild adorer of the gypsy fiddler. Rigo is here to fill an engagement at a local cafe that is shortly to open. His escapades, however, have been of such world-wide notice that his coming attracted quite a flutter.

Upon his arrival, Rigo and his wife met the reporters of the various San Francisco dailies. He talked quite freely of his affairs with the Princess Chimay and when he apparently forgot various points in that interesting love history, his wife that is prompted him. She even urged him to give the whole story. It was Mrs. Rigo who gave out the information that the Princess Chimay is still violently in love with Rigo. The wife declared that her husband had received numerous letters from the Princess and that it was expected that titled lady would soon wed the San Francisco in order to win back the love that she once flouted.

Schwerin Is Really Angry.

R. P. Schwerin, vice-president and general manager of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, who returned from the East this week, unburdened his mind about San Francisco in general. Mr. Schwerin was in a mood to talk. There is one fine characteristic of San Francisco, he declared, with emphasis, "and that is that it never supports a local institution nor takes pride in the welfare of its own people's undertakings. I met William R. Wheeler in the East and when I told him the Pacific Mail would have to withdraw from the Panama service, he said: 'That's the best thing that could happen to San Francisco.'"

"I suppose that's the proper spirit but I can't understand it."

Here is the way he depicted the spirit he ascribed to San Francisco: "There's a Hurrah, boys! The Pacific Mail has spent a million and two millions a year here and been in business for the last 50 years. But hurrah, any day for they won't buy things of us any more. They are going to quit. That seems to be the sentiment. I can't understand it."

Miller's Home for Poets.

Joaquin Miller, the Poet of the Sierras, is planning a colony of muse workers. This fact was disclosed when a dispatch came the other day from San Jose stating that Henry Meade

View, a professor in the State Normal School of that city, and Herbert Bashford had been presented with an acre of land apiece by Mr. Miller and expect to build cottages near the poet's home in Fruitvale, which is a suburb of Alameda.

It is understood that Mr. Miller intends to establish a colony of poets about himself and at some time in the future to conduct a school of poetry. Mr. Miller is an honorary member, has been informed that a number of men prominent in the literary world on the Coast are to be given a plot of land and follow the example of Mr. Bashford and Mr. Brand.

Stanford Still Has Saloon.

The troublesome liquor question is to become an issue once more at Stanford University. It has made its appearance in the form of a resort opened on the county road between Mayfield and Mountain View by "Charlie" Myers. For years Myers has been a problem that the Stanford University faculty has been unable to solve. First he settled at Mayfield, then at Menlo, and once more he has defied the university authorities.

When Myers opened his place in Mayfield, he drew the college patronage. A large pine table was set aside for each class, the members of which were invited to carve their initials and class numerals on the same. The faculty objected so strongly to the student pilgrimages to Mayfield that the town went dry and Myers moved to Menlo. At Menlo, the Mayfield incident was repeated and a state law prohibiting the sale of liquor within a mile and a half of the college sent Myers dry. Now Myers has established himself on the road out of reach of the law, and within easy walking distance of the Stanford campus. So highly does he regard the university patronage that he paid \$20,000 for his new resort.

Sugar War in Prospect.

Plans for an extensive sugar war on the Pacific Coast are being laid in Wall Street, according to dispatches received from New York, which declare that the independent refining interests are getting ready to compete with the Western Sugar Refining Company and the California-Hawaiian Sugar Refining Company. The talked-of plans have not as yet taken definite shape, although the independent interests point out that unless the current high prices quoted for sugar in San Francisco are lowered to conform with those now prevailing in the East, arrangements to erect plants on the Pacific Coast will be speedily completed.

Jockey Keogh Elopes.

As a result of a romance which began when the bride was a nurse at the Oakland Provident Hospital and the bridegroom was a patient under her care, Miss Tillie Dibble, of Oakland, and Frank Keogh, once a jockey apprentice riding in the Northwest, and now a star rider, eloped to San Rafael last week and were married. Until after the wedding ceremony had been performed, the parents of the bride were not even aware there was such a young man as Frank Keogh.

CELEBRATE POLTAVA FIGHT

Czar Will Unveil Monument on Two Hundredth Anniversary.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 19.—(Special.)—The whole country is watching with interest the preparations for the Poltava bicentenary celebrations, which will extend over four days and be in the nature of a great patriotic military pageant. M. Mazurovsky, the battle painter, and Count Mouraviev, also an artist historian, will prepare the scenes of Kotchubei's picture, which hangs in the Winter palace here, showing the captured standards being laid at the feet of Peter the Great. The Czar will dedicate a monument to the dead of both sides. Two historic regiments, the Preobrajensky and the Semenovsky Foot Guards, who won glory on that day, will go to Poltava, which is 1000 miles from their St. Petersburg quarters, to take a leading part in the pageant.

Burglar Gets Damages.

BERLIN, June 19.—(Special.)—A burglar who had entered a house in a small Prussian town by a ladder which was at hand, fell and broke his leg when making off with his booty. The burglar was taken to the hospital, where an inquiry as to the cause of the accident revealed that, contrary to the by-laws of the town, the house-owner's ladder was not provided with strong iron spikes at its base. The house-owner was therefore fined for infraction of the by-laws, ordered to pay all the hospital costs, and further to indemnify the burglar with a substantial sum, as damages.
