Fast Steeds Will Compete in Harness Events to Be Held in September.

LISTS ARE NOW COMPLETE

California and Other Outside Breeders Will Send Stables to Portland to Try for Valuable Purses Hung.

Early closing entries for the big harness caces to be conducted by the Portland Country Club and Livestock Association at the fine track built last year, indicate that a better class and larger number of the best trotters and pacers in the West will participate in that meet. The early entries closed on June 15 and the list of animals entered gives promise of keen competition among the harness horse kings at the meet which is scheduled for Portland September 20 to 25, inclusive. Portland horse lovers will remember with keen delight the performances of Joe McGuire's Day Break, and the listing of that handsome bay gelding for the Fall meet lends added interest. While Day Break is a consistent performer and one of the very best frotters exhibited on the Northwestern circuit, there are so many more good steppers entered that the racing fans can expect to see the Denver horse given a contest each time he is sent away for the distance. Day Break Again Entered. Day Break is entered in what is styled the free-for-all trot, and in this event the Denver entry will be in competition against the cream of the California harness animais. Fred E. Ward, of Los Angeles, one of the best-known turfmen of Southern California, will be on hand with two entries. Emily W. and Escoboda, each of which has won honors in the Golden State. James Thompson, of Pleasanton, Cal., has entered his bay gelding, John Caldwell, which won not a few laurels on the circuit last year. Another Pleasanton entry is D. L. Bachant's Athasham, a bay stallion by Athadon, one of the best-known California trotters of a few years ago. These entries are to compete for the Rural Spirit 1000 purse, and the race is scheduled for the last day of the meet, Saturday, September 25. In the 2:06 pacing class for the Rapid Transit purse, also of \$1000, a better list of entries has been secured than for any stake for several years. Among the most notable performers listed in this event are Homer Rutherford's Josephine, Frank Childs Sherlock Homes; James Thompson's Charley D.; S. S. Bailey's Tidal Wave; L. H. Todhunter's Hymettes; W. L. Vance's Sir John S. and Bartram & Dawson's famous gray gelding Whitehall. 

SIGNAL CORPS OF UNITED STATES ARMY IS NOW EQUIPPED WITH WIRELESS TELEGRAPH.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—(Special.)—The use of the wireless telegraph has been extended to the Signal Corps in the field, and it is possible now in twenty minutes for one branch of the Signal Corps to get into quick communication with another at long range without stretching of wires. The entire outfit for the wireless in the field is carried on the backs of three mules. On one is strapped the mast, which is in jointed sections of the antennae; on another the storage batteries and on the third the chest in which are the receiving and sending instruments. To establish a station the three men who compose the working corps dismount the mule packs and pile the chest on top of the two storage batteries, thus bringing the instrument to the proper height to be operated by the man standing. The top of the chest is thrown open and the wircs are laid from it to the generating apparatus, which is set up opposite the chest and to the pole, which is then jointed together and set in place. The operator straps the receiving instrument to his ear, and while the other two men work the generator, he sends and receives messages.

AT LIVING COST

Leaders of Thought Protest That New Taxes Will Not Solve Financial Problem.

TOO MUCH LUXURY NOTED

Price of Breadstuffs Also Is Soaring Greatly, and Thinkers Believe Too Great a Burden Is Being Put on People.

BERLIN. June 25.—(Special.)—While numerous meetings of protest are being organized by most of the various interests which the new Parliamentary majority has so cheerfully proposed to raid, it is improbable that there can be any very definite development of the situation until the government has decided to which of the new taxes shall be given official sanction and such economic justification as can be devised. Some of the Conservative proposals are obviously intended only as material for eventual bargaining. The tax on dealings in stocks and shares not improbably belongs to this category; but, Bourse, banking, and other business interests took the precaution of holding an impressive meeting at which the proposal was unanimously condemned. Loubet had once told hint that Germany's social legislation would revolutionize conditions all over the world, pointed out that while over the world, pointed out that while imperial revenue and expenditure for the current financial year balanced with a total of \$716.250,000 the total estimates for the imperial system of insurance amounted only to \$13.250,000. Those who supposed that enough had been done in the social sphere totally misrend the situation, which was forcing fresh tasks upon the government.

Rise in Grains.

An abundant harvest in 1908 brought down the price of rye to \$42.76, but this year the quotations for the July crop are \$49.25, and the tendency is still upwards.

Turning to wheat, the price, which was \$34.75 per ton in 1906, rose to \$44.50 in 1905, to \$44.75 in the following year, and to \$56 in 1907. A few days ago \$88.75 was quoted on the Berlin Exchange for May wheat, or ever 70 per cept higher than in 1906.
