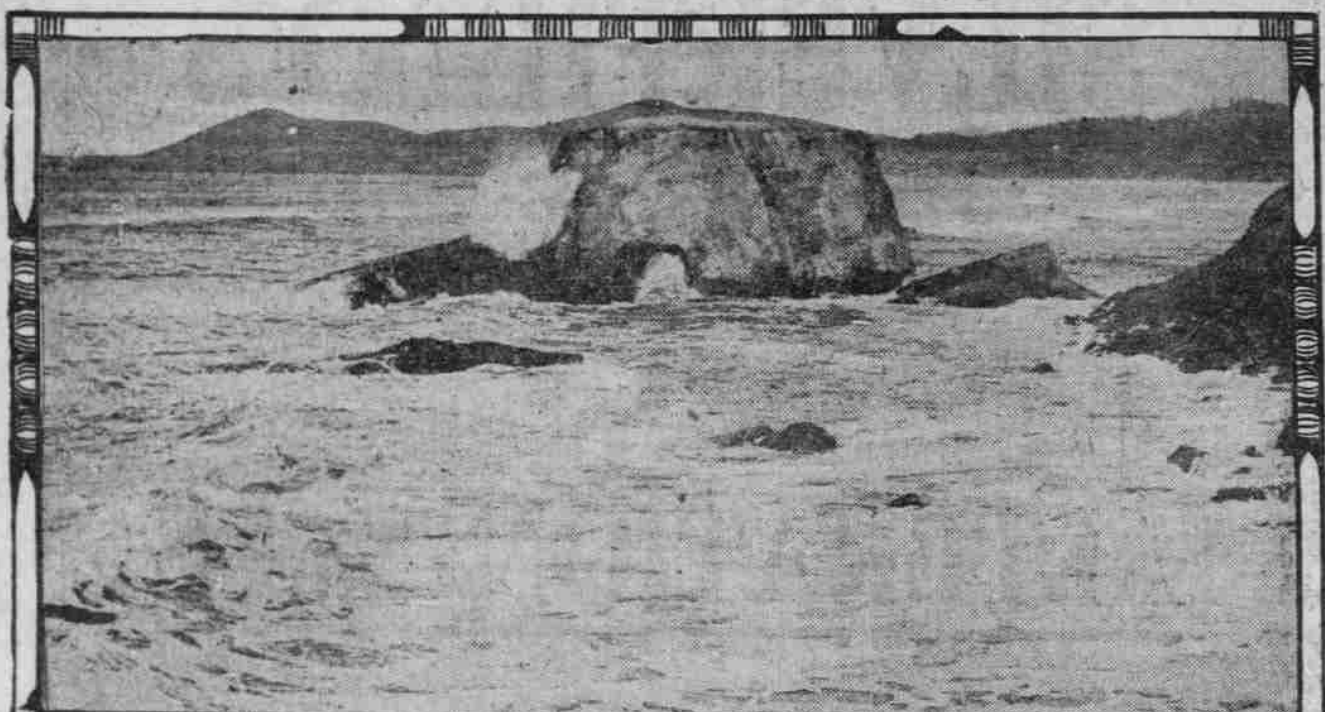


VISITORS AT YAQUINA BAY BEGIN TO ENJOY SEASIDE DIVERSIONS

NEWPORT, Ore., June 26.—(Special.)—The unusually low tides last week gave the many visitors a chance to dig for oysters and rock clams which are covered by the surf most of the time. Owing to the profusion of these sea delicacies, mussels and other less delicious foods are now looked for in buckets, far out on the slippery rocks, gathering substance for a feast, and the less adventuresome folks seen closely examining the pebbles on the beach, where are found Jasper, blood-stones, moonstones, and the treasured moss and water agates. The water agates are formed by petrified clams, bear claws, periwinkles, etc. In the Red Lands of the West are found peculiar iron stones containing water, but it is deadly poison, unlike the water in the beach agates.

Very often interesting articles wash in on the shore. I have seen a coconut tree covered with barnacles, that must have traveled many miles. A partially finished dugout canoe forming part of a large log lay for years on the beach near Waldport, and occasionally a large fish of some rare deep-sea species will be found on the sand. Such things fascinate the people who are ever being surprised by seeing things which, though they had often heard about, had never expected to see. Even such common things as starfish, sea urchins and sea anemones, and the various seaweeds, never seem to lose their hold on the interest of the strangers.

Emptying into the ocean on an average of a mile apart are streams which are full of trout. No fisherman need have the skill of Isiah Walker to catch fish in this country. If he want large trout, the Siletz River is the place, excepting during the salmon-fishing season in the bay. And the deep-sea fishing is invigorating and profitable for those who don't get sea-sick. Halibut, though scarce, are sometimes caught weighing over 100 pounds. Then rock and linn cod weighing 30 or 40 pounds, and sometimes less, come next in size; and last, grouper or red snapper, the ocean's goldfish, are found in abundance. Of freak fish are found skates, pinfish, and a fish that nobody here can properly name. It has a head like a dog, and body of a slim fish. A Corvallis gentleman described it as resembling the devil. But of course it is not the

octopus. In the bay, flounders, squaw-fish and crabs are caught, and other species in different seasons. The long-neck or mud clams are dug in the mud flats, and oysters are found up the Yaquina River.

When a person starts up a stream for trout he soon finds himself in a forest of spruce, fir, cedar and pine. The Douglas fir, which sometimes grows over 30,000 feet per tree, is the finest variety, and commands the respect of every lover of grandeur and nature. Already the woods are full of buyers representing large lumber concerns.

All the above-mentioned things interest the visitors to Newport, who come probably just expecting bathing and refreshing breezes, so that when the time for their departure arrives many are laden with curios and souvenirs to be shown to friends who have gone elsewhere on their vacations. The social side of Newport is not slighted, as a rink and two dance-halls, attended by all the people, as in other cosmopolitan places, are always busy. The summer girls and the young men arrive with a good feeling toward each other, and formally as much as possible is dispensed with in the free and easy manner which exists in no other place than a healthy pleasure resort.

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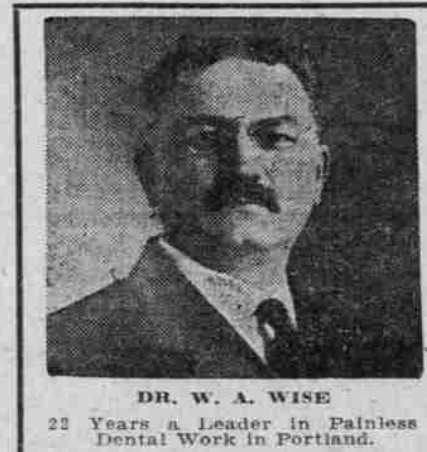
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
