Triumph of Camera Shown in Exhibition of Photo-Oils

Group of Pictures Made by Benjamin A. Gifford, Illustrating New Process, Bring Out Beauties of Oregon.

UNUSUALLY interesting and artistic was the impromptu exhibition of photo oils which Benjamin A. Gifford, of The Dalles, had on display for a few days of last week at the Hotel Cornwell. The pictures, by a new process of photography, have taken on the charm of an oil painting, with the additional force of detail and faithfulness to Nature. The dozen studies were all local in color treatment and subject matter. In size they are 30x45, taken on canvas and possess wonderful values in color and blending.

Made an Instant Hit.

Mr. Gifford, at the solicitation of friends, placed the pictures about the lobby of the Hotel Cornwell, where he was staying. In a short time the informal exhibition had assumed the proportions of a public and advertised affair, and the attractiveness and interest of the pictures became a general discussion. Some of the pictures were taken with a camera that makes a picture in feet long, one was printed from a negative six feet long, others were the reproduction of small prints. Some of Mr. Gifford's studies were obtained only after many weeks of travel, and patient waiting.

"Atmospheric conditions," said Mr. Gifford, "are an absolutely essential thing in true photography. I have traveled 1500 miles inland after a picture, only to be compelled to wait three or four weeks until the conditions were favorable for taking the picture. The actual work consumes much less than five minutes, but the waiting cannot be computed."

Asked regarding the photo oils, Mr. Gifford stated that the process is comparatively a new one, and that the wonderful

transparent effects gained by these oil paints is a feature hardly to be improved upon. The detail, attention to small and minute things, leaf, tree and wave ripple are faithfully caught and reproduced by the camera, and painted by the artist in a manner that no brush artist could ever attain.

Each a Distinct Study.

Of the dozen subjects in Mr. Gifford's sample collection each and every one is a distinct and separate appeal to one's love of beauty and Mother Nature. Oregon scenery has never before been so faithfully interpreted.

"Ashland Creek Canyon" is perhaps one of the best studies, showing the deeply cut road and beautiful stream winding into the purple distance. The vivid Autumnal coloring in this picture is particularly fine. "Mount Adams From Trout Lake" and "Mount Hood From Lost Lake" have each been given great prominence and attention because of their great beauty in detail. Both of these studies show the mirrored reflection of the mountain, and the sharply defined outlines make it almost a query as to which is mountain and which is reflection. Copies of the Mount Hood study have been sent to every country in the world, and it is considered to be the best picture ever made of the famous mountain. A Japanese missionary on a recent visit here remarked that "he knew Mr. Gifford intimately, although he had never met him personally, simply through the beautiful pictures that had made Mount Hood famous."

"In Oregon" is a study of the desert country in Eastern Oregon. What Childie Haasman accomplished with aid of vivid colors and a palette in his wonderful conceptions of the Harney county, Mr. Gifford has effected by the sole use of a camera. The haze and heat of the low hills is expressed in a marked degree. The study, too, has the appearance of an old-time oil painting.

"Mount McLoughlin from Lake of the Woods" is another beautiful picture in the collection. Mr. Gifford considers this lake, lying in between Ashland and Crater Lake, and a short distance from Pelican Bay, as one of the loveliest spots on earth. He never tired of photographing the picture, and the resulting study is a picture of the mountain, the flat land peninsula is washed gently by the quiet stream, against the sweeping background of dark, silent trees, from whose depth rises the crest and snow-covered glory of Mount McLoughlin. The composition in this study is of noteworthy interest.

"Columbia Near Bonneville" is one of the most admired scenes in the collection. The sunset effect is beautifully rendered, the golden glow falling athwart the water as the sun, like a great red ball, sends its last rays across the sky, seen through a divide in the mountains. In the foreground the camp

of Indians and a large white-sailed fishing smack make a pleasing note.

"Thirteen-Mile Point on the Columbia" shows a remarkable study in perspective. The atmospheric effect, too, is wonderful; one seems to be looking along the river bank and back into a blue haze that overhangs the distant water and Autumnal woods. "Table Mountain on the Columbia" shows the northern abutment of the famed "Bridge of the Gods." The study is particularly strong and faithful in detail.

"Rogue River at Grants Pass" is almost pastoral in its simplicity. The beautiful stream, a bit of sky and overhanging trees, with two meek-eyed cows in the foreground, contribute to the general charm of the study.

Gifford's Finest Effort.

"Indian Rapids, Celilo Falls" is the title of what Mr. Gifford considers his best achievement in the collection. The picture has attracted attention from every source. The great rapids, booming with white, misty spray thrown high in air, are photographed distinctly and perfectly; the lone hills, dark, silent and immovable, stretch in masses across the background, and in the immediate foreground, standing on a huge rock, is the solitary figure of an Indian, his cloak wrapped about him, as he stands gazing into the foaming depths of the mighty waters. The study appeals to each beholder in as many different ways. The feeling and tenderness of the subject are paramount; one instinctively gazes with the Indian, and wonders of what he thinks.

Two other pictures of interest are "Sugar Pine," a large tree, situated between Medford and Crater Lake, and "Larch," another mammoth giant of the forest, photographed on the Divide, on the Tillamook road.

These pictures, which have been copied far and wide, have been one of the best advertising mediums Oregon has ever had sent out. The Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company recently sent 25 large studies, 30x45, in this photo-oil process, each one a triumph of artistic photography, to London to advertise the scenery in Oregon. As a matter of fact, copies of Mr. Gifford's studies of Oregon scenery have been sent broadcast, used in circulars, pamphlets, magazines and photographic form and the response as an advertising feature cannot be overestimated.

Mr. Gifford departed on Friday evening for his home at The Dalles, taking his collection with him. He contemplates giving an exhibition in Portland later, at which time he will bring down a great

number of his most famous studies. His collection is an interesting and extensive one, and will no doubt prove a great attraction.
