MOORE IS GUILTY

Jury Deliberates 40 Minutes
Over Wife-Beater.

LENIENCY IS RECOMMENDED

Testimony Offered by Druggist Is
Wholly at Variance With That of
Wife and Jury Is Left to
Decide as to Truth.

"Guilty as charged" was the finding of a Circuit Court jury early yesterday afternoon, at the conclusion of 40 minutes' deliberation on the charge of wife-beating against Jess C. Moore, a young druggist.

"We recommend the defendant to the extreme leniency of the court," was the way the jury embellished its report, thus indicating that the young man probably was not fully to blame for the episode in which he was shot and painfully wounded a month ago while engaged in abusing his wife.

The jury retired at 12:30 and was back in the courtroom shortly after 1 P. M. The forenoon had been taken up by rebuttal testimony and cross-examination of Moore. He stuck to his story of having been entirely sober when the trouble occurred. When he returned to his flat, his wife surprised him by a display of affection, he said. She had been distant towards him for so long that he didn't know what to make of her conduct, but supposed she must have relented, and accordingly responded to her caresses. Then her wrath broke and he was the subject of a tirade in which his mother-in-law, Mrs. Amelia R. Wood, shot him.

This story was entirely at variance with the one told by his wife, and left the jury to decide for itself who was telling the truth. She said he arrived home drunk and proceeded to make her the object of his drunken and revolting caresses. She objected and he threatened to kill her. It was after he had created a reign of terror in the house and knocked Mrs. Wood down that the shot was fired which ended the turmoil.

Moore will be sentenced on Tuesday. The jury's recommendation of leniency may or may not have weight with Judge Brown, for the function of the jury is to determine solely as to the guilt or innocence of an accused person.

CURE SAID TO HAVE KILLED

Gresham Man Sues J. L. Bohannon
for Money Advanced.

Instead of curing his wife of cancer, according to agreement, C. L. Gresham, of Gresham, alleges that J. L. Bohannon killed her by an absurd course of treatment. The bereaved husband filed suit in Circuit Court yesterday to collect \$350, the sum he paid Bohannon to cure his wife, plus what it cost to bury her after that practitioner had finished.

According to the complaint, Bohannon represented he could cure cancer. If he couldn't the course of treatment wouldn't cost a cent. It was represented. Gresham advanced the sum

of \$200 and at Bohannon's instance sent her to an establishment conducted by the practitioner in California. Mrs. Gresham was not in a serious condition when the treatment was taken up, but after six weeks in Bohannon's care she died. It is alleged.

Gresham wants the \$300 back, together with \$150 it cost him to ship his wife's body from California to Gresham for interment.

MISS X. F. PALING TO APPEAL
Wealthy Woman Refuses to Support
Invalid Relative.

Miss X. F. Paling, a wealthy Portland woman who on June 3 was ordered by the County Court to contribute \$50 a month toward the support of Cornelius W. Barrett, her pauper half brother, gave notice of appeal in the Circuit Court yesterday. It is said to be her purpose to carry the matter to the highest court, as she doesn't feel she ought to provide for Barrett. She protested at first that she didn't believe they were related, but Barrett established clearly their relationship when a hearing was had before County Judge Webster.

Pending a settlement of the matter of support money Barrett is partaking of the bounty of a front street liverman, who permits him to occupy a section of the hayloft. These quarters are in striking contrast with the luxurious home of his half sister. Barrett has been an object of charity for some time, being old, decrepit and unfit for hard work. He has spent several brief periods at the Poorfarm, but it is the view of the authorities that no man should become a public charge who is a sister or half sister worth in the neighborhood of \$50,000.

AMATEUR THUG IS SENTENCED

Tony Patricio to Serve 12 Years in
Penitentiary.

Twelve years is the period Tony Patricio will serve behind the bars at Salem as a result of having set out to be an amateur hold-up man. He was sentenced by Circuit Judge Brown, yesterday forenoon, and took it with a serenity that indicated he wasn't altogether displeased at the prospect of getting three meals a day hereafter.

Patricio, tiring of work, bought a cheap revolver recently and set out on the highways. The first man he met was J. P. Dow, a Southern Pacific engineer. He induced Dow to elevate his hands and then abstracted \$2.50 and a watch from the engineer's pockets. But being a coward, he permitted himself to fall into the hands of the police without delay.

R. T. Dickerson Arraigned.

R. T. Dickerson, a contractor who shot and killed Harry Garrett, an employee of whom he was jealous, several days ago, was arraigned in the Circuit Court, yesterday, on a charge of murder in the first degree. He pleaded not guilty. The case will be set for trial at a later date. Dickerson, it is understood, will plead insanity and the so-called unwritten law. The woman in the case was his wife.

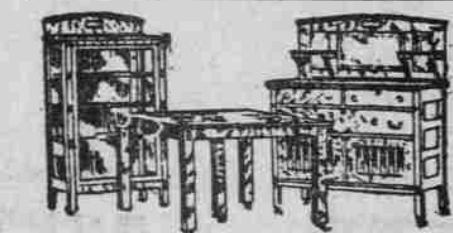

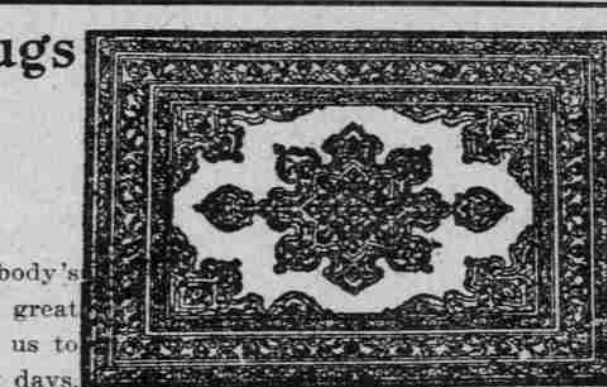
Portland Chorus of 350 Voices Will Be Heard—Lawn Fete to Follow Reception.

As to permitting young women to serve as settlement workers and teachers among the races from the Orient, the danger of the practice is emphasized in

the Sigel case. Our race is moral; we have certain standards of right and of wrong, of morality and decency. The Asiatic, burdened by ages of tradition of another sort, bred in a different atmosphere, is un-moral. To allow untrained and emotional girls to venture into such

associations, then, is something that ought to be censured, and on this Coast where the Asiatic is best known, few Christian denominations can be found to allow their daughters in such company.

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
