DEADLY HEAT IN EAST.

Table showing maximum temperature and deaths in New York, Philadelphia, Boston, and Portland, Or.

NEW YORK, June 26.—Increasing from 78 at 6 o'clock this morning to a maximum of 90 at 4 o'clock this afternoon, today's broiling heat resulted in at least 10 deaths in the greater city, sent scores of victims to the hospital and caused a wholesale exodus from the streets.

HOT WAVE HAS WIDE RANGE

Extends From Atlantic to Rockies and Southward to Gulf. WASHINGTON, June 26.—A warm wave with a wide field, leveling a large toll of preparations, some fatal, stretched across the country today. In Phoenix, Ariz., the official mark was 100, while Washington, Baltimore and Lynchburg, Va., scored highest in this direction in the East, each with a showing of 99.

CONDENSED NEWS BY WIRE

Junction City, Kan.—At Fort Riley Saturday two military convicts named Curry and Jeffries attacked a sentry, and in the struggle that ensued Jeffries was fatally wounded and the sentry was also seriously wounded.

New York—A vigorous campaign against the common housefly has been started by a special commission of the Merchants Association, the expense of which is being borne by Edward Hatch, Jr., a prominent merchant.

Atlanta, Ga.—President Taft has issued a pardon to Abra Rhoades, a Georgia boy, whose thirst for knowledge led him to look for the island of Cuba at Blue Ridge, Ga. It was a Greek text-book valued at 40 cents.

Chicago—A strike of more than 4000 actors playing on the American stage was threatened by Harry Mountford, secretary of the board of directors of the "White Rats," at a large meeting held Friday at midnight in the Colonial Theatre. It was declared that the actors have not been receiving a "square deal."

Chicago—"Babe Fourth" pamphlets were distributed to ministers, priests, Sunday school superintendents and others in a position to warn the public of independence day perils. The papers were distributed by "The Sage Fourth Association," which will hold a mass-meeting next Thursday.

Chicago—Hundreds of persons suffering from leprosy are allowed to wander unrestricted through the island of Cuba, according to a statement issued by Dr. Mattingly, secretary of Health and Charities of the island. Steps are to be taken at once for the suppression of leprosy and tuberculosis.

Kansas City—A jury in the Circuit Court here Saturday returned a verdict for \$2500 in favor of the Co-Operative Livestock Commission Company against 12 members of the Traders' Livestock Exchange under the anti-trust act, imposing a penalty for organizing pools or combinations.

Columbus, O.—The Supreme Council, United Commercial Travelers, Saturday elected the following officers: Supreme Councilmaster, Walter Olive Owsen, 19; Haute, Ind.; supreme conductor, Charles Griffith, Denver; supreme page, C.
