

CITY NEWS IN BRIEF

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HISTORICAL SOCIETY BUSY.—The registration of visitors at the rooms of the Oregon Historical Society for the month of June was very large—3477 being the total and the daily average 132. Forty-five states outside of Oregon were represented by 1175 persons. Two hundred and one towns in Oregon outside of Portland and were represented by 1002 persons. Five foreign countries were represented by 27 persons. The remainder of the visitors—2386—were from this city. From Pacific Coast states, outside of Oregon, the registration was as follows: Washington, 287; Idaho, 56; California, 194. The registration from Iowa, 32; Minnesota, 48; Nebraska, 44; Ohio, 43; South Dakota, 40. The remainder from states outside of Oregon—745—were divided among 40 states. The work of the Oregon Historical Society is growing more important daily, and it is becoming a recognized fact that the historical collections in this room cannot be duplicated west of the Rocky Mountains.

NEW PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.—A new and more commodious church is being erected on the corner of East Fifty-fifth and Belmont streets, during the year. The cost will be between \$20,000 and \$25,000.
