Married Fifty Years, Couple Holds Celebration of Golden Wedding Day

Mr. and Mrs. Philip D. Lang celebrated the 50th anniversary of their wedding last Sunday at their home in Montavilla, East Seventy-eighth and Ash streets. In all, 50 children and grandchildren were present at the anniversary. This was the first time all the children had been together.

Philip D. Lang was born January 13, 1841, in the Province of Nassau, Germany. At the age of 17 he sailed for New York, in March, 1858. Later he went to Belleville, Ill., and met Miss Wilhelmina Lehman, to whom he was married on July 11, 1859.

Miss Lehman was born April 8, 1839, in the Province of Saxony, Germany. When a girl of 15 she, with her parents, set sail for New Orleans, and landed there after a voyage of 30 days. They traveled up the Mississippi to reach Illinois, where at that time many immigrants had wandered from the Fatherland.

Five children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Lang while they were in Illinois.

Later they emigrated to Arkansas, and then to Coffeyville, Kan. Here the Western spirit called Mr. Lang, and in prairie schooners he embarked with his family for the western part of Oregon. After a delay in Wyoming they proceeded by mule team in the Spring of 1863, and on July 3 of the same year they made camp in a little forest at what is now East Eleventh and Division streets, Portland.

The first residence was taken up near the old Oregon & California car shops, where is now the residence of ex-Mayor Lane. In 1883 they moved to a farm purchased near Russellville, and after living there 20 years moved to Montavilla, where they now reside.

engineer with the Columbia Dredge Company; Herman Lang, superintendent of the printing firm of Bailey & Braden, San Francisco; Sam Lang, engineer with the Columbia Dredge Company; Mrs. W. J. Pauling, Pleasant Home, Or.; Mrs. Frank Lemming, Haines, Or.; David Lang, member of the United States Navy; Henry Lang, Government Camp, Mount Hood; Mrs. Walter Coles, Haines, Or.

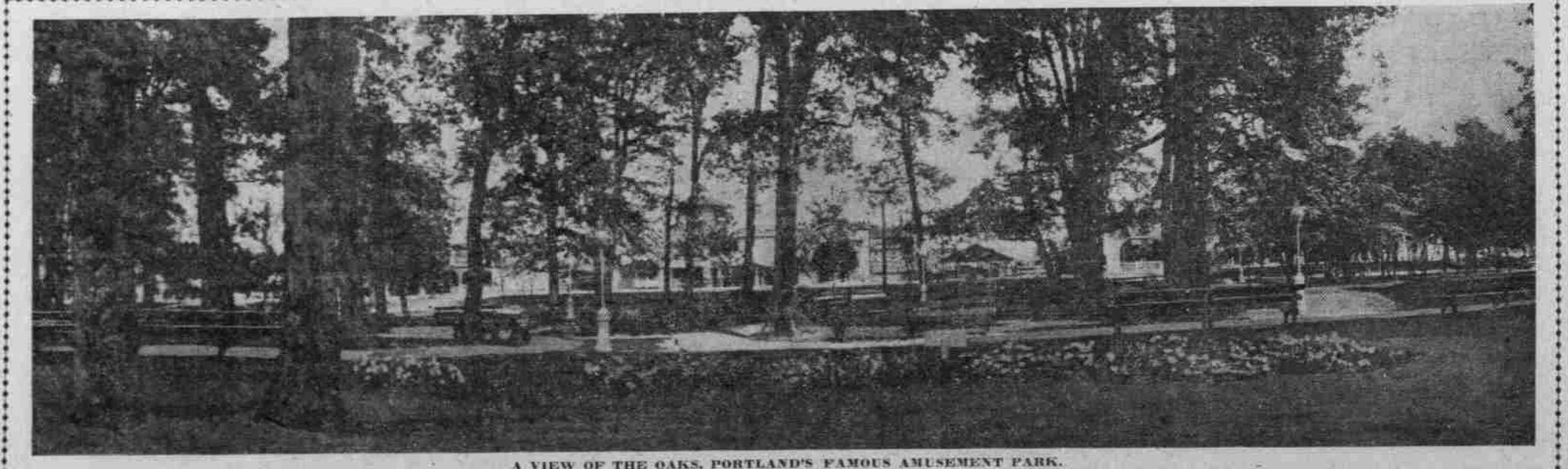

While en route to Honolulu, Judge Woodruff is closing up some forestry matters for the Interior Department, and spent most of yesterday at the forestry department offices in Portland, just before coming to Portland Judge Woodruff performed similar services for the Interior Department in Seattle and left last night for San Francisco, where he will remain for three days engaged in forestry work before sailing for the islands. His work just now on the Coast is confined principally to conservation matters.

WOMAN'S CAREER CHECKED

"Frenzied Finance Mary" Will Pass Next 12 Months in Jail.

Mrs. Mary Schiells, known in police circles as "Frenzied Finance Mary," will pass the next 12 months in the County Jail because of her penchant for passing bogus checks.
