

TOURISTS HAVING TICKET TROUBLES

Passengers From East Forced to Pay Extra for Portland-Seattle Trip.

MAKE DEMAND ON O. R. & N.

Visitors Say They Were Told Local Railroad Would Furnish Transportation to Sound—Mistake of Eastern Ticket Sellers.

As a result of mistakes made by the agents of Eastern railroads, scores of tourists bound for the Seattle Exposition via the Portland gateway with return tickets to California points are having troubles.

A large number of tickets have been sold by the Eastern roads providing for transportation over the Harriman lines to Portland direct and thence by the Southern Pacific through California and the East. These tickets do not carry a coupon for the trip to Seattle and return, and the Eastern agents gave the tourists holding them, in many instances, the assurance that the O. R. & N. Co., in Portland, would without further cost transportation from Portland to Seattle and return. It is said that some of the Eastern railroads have issued folders representing that such transportation would be provided. When the travelers holding these tickets call at the O. R. & N. downtown ticket offices or the general offices in the Wells-Fargo building it is only to learn that they have been misled and that if they wish to visit Seattle they will have to purchase tickets over the Northern Pacific.

At the O. R. & N. general offices the number of errors thus made is minimized but in other sources it is asserted that ten or a dozen tourists are arriving in Portland daily who have been misled as to the character of the transportation they have purchased.

At the O. R. & N. general offices it is said that assurance given with the issuance of such tickets that additional transportation to Seattle will be provided here is wholly without authority. The published tariffs of the company must be strictly complied with and if additional transportation were issued the O. R. & N. Co. would have to pay for it out of its own funds. Passengers holding these tickets who make demand for tickets to Seattle and return are advised by the company to prepare a description of their original tickets, take receipts for the additional round trip fare to Seattle and then make demand for the return of the excess cost upon the company that originally sold the transportation. The cost for the side trip depends on the kind of ticket purchased. A ticket limited to a few days can be purchased for about \$7 but one giving more time in Seattle costs \$11.

Eastern railroads can sell tickets via Seattle and California points at the rate via Portland and California but would have to route the holders over one of the northern roads running into Seattle direct.

When asked about the matter yesterday, J. M. Scott, assistant general passenger agent of the O. R. & N., said that there had been a number of such mistakes made without any fault whatever on the part of the O. R. & N.

"Mistakes are bound to be made when so many tickets are sold," said Mr. Scott. "When called to our attention we attempt to adjust the matter by telegraphing to the railroad that issued the transportation but if the holders cannot wait we advise them to take receipts for the cost of the ticket to Seattle and return and then make demand on the Eastern road for a refund of the amount."

INCREASED TRAFFIC SHOWN

Number of Passengers to Heights Grows 37 Per Cent in Year.

Traffic on the Portland Heights cars for June, 1909, shows an increase of 37 per cent over the corresponding month of last year, according to B. S. Joeselyn, president of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company.

For June the observation cars did a business 77 per cent greater than during June of 1908, and according to present indications the current month will show a corresponding increase over the corresponding month of last year, according to B. This increase in traffic is due largely to the presence of large number of tourists in the city. For the first time in the history of the heights and the observation trips are the most attractive.

SERVICE IN EFFECT TODAY

New Train Service on Oregon Electric Starts This Morning.

The official time card, issued yesterday, shows some changes from the schedule given with the original announcement. The Salem trains will leave Portland as follows: A. M.—6:30, 7:40, 8:50, 9:55, 11:30. P. M.—2:30, 3:40, 4:50, 5:55, 7:10. Trains will leave Salem for Portland as follows: A. M.—7:00, 8:10, 9:15, 10:15, P. M.—1:30, 2:35, 3:40, 4:45.

Forest Grove trains will leave Portland as follows: A. M.—6:40, 8:30, 10:10, P. M.—12:15, 2:15, 3:30, 5:15, 6:35, 11:15. Trains will leave Forest Grove for Portland as follows: A. M.—6:45, 8:45, 10:15, P. M.—12:20, 1:45, 3:15, 4:45, 7:30, 9:30.

In addition there is a Wilsonville local leaving Portland at 5:15 P. M.

Power Plant Site Inspected.

The site for the new power plant on the Clackamas under construction by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company was inspected Friday by R. S. Joeselyn, president, and George L. Eastabrook, of Philadelphia, secretary of the company. A large force of men, says Mr. Joeselyn, is now engaged in making test drillings for the foundation of the big dam. This dam, which is to have a height of 100 feet, must have the most solid of foundations and the workmen are now drilling for bedrock. This power plant, which is to be located two and a half miles above the present plant on the Clackamas, will represent an initial cost of \$2,000,000.

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CHILD'S PLEA SWAYS

Girl Evangelist Stirs Up Audience at Campmeeting.

BROUGHT UP ON RELIGION

Talks Fervently to Hearers Wrought Up by Spirit of Revival and Cloud of Mosquitoes in Tent on Mount Scott Carline.

Standing before a campmeeting audience 1000 strong at Trenton Station, on the Mount Scott carline last night, Inez Bower, a 12-year-old child, delivered a sermon that brought a middle-aged man to hysterics and a woman to shrieking agony. Assisting her were several evangelists of the typical campmeeting type, a chorus of young girls in their "teens," and a vicious, biting horde of mosquitoes. The meeting opened in the usual style of the Oregon Holiness Association, which is conducting the series of meetings, and then little Inez Bower was introduced. She was on her way to Seattle, when, learning of the fame that had preceded her, the Holiness Association induced the mother of the precocious girl to permit her to address the campmeeting.

She was dressed in a short white frock. Her hair was braided and tied with two enormous white silk bows; she was, in fact, the typical child of her age. When spoken to at close quarters, there was a peculiar, dilated appearance about the pupils of her eyes that was not particularly noticeable until she was asked to speak. A member of the audience was so forcibly struck by her appearance he said he believed she was hypnotized. With little prelude she announced her text. It was from the gospel of St. John and dealt with the question of unbelief. Quoting from advanced religious authorities that seemed inexplicable till her mother and a friend later explained she had been brought up on a "religious diet" that started with "Pilgrim's Progress" and ended—well, it has not ended yet.

Manner of Childish Elocutionist. With a Bible in her hand, the child opened a violent tirade on different phases of religious unbelief. Her elocution was that of some child forced by admiring relatives to deliver a "Drake's Apostrophe to the Flag," or similar composition in vogue with the young on recital occasions. But as she worked up to her subject, that changed. An unusual earnestness took its place. Finally she began to turn on the "forced draught." All over the tented assembly cries broke out, "O. God," or "yes," while a moment later another appealed to the infernal regions.

Then the child jumped into her element. She wrought with the sinners; she pled for them. In phrases made common all over the world by Grassy Smith, by Torrey and other leading evangelists, which she slipped in between her sometimes childish utterances, she began to sway the audience. It responded. Prayer started in different sections. People broke out weeping. A man shouted, "A little girl subdued. Crowds of three and four gathered around isolated members of the audience and pleaded with them, while the little prodigy wailed, "Oh, come, dear

people. Oh, come dear brethren, come to the altar and be saved!"

As she sat down after reciting a simple, honest prayer that it was impossible to believe could be the child's own composition, so beautifully phrased and chosen were the expressions, an evangelist took her place on the floor.

Four Childish Converts Made.

Four people answered her appeal, two of them children not over 7 years of age. At the instance of the girl, the hymn "Almost Persuaded" was sung, in a haunting way, that brought others to the rude four-inch plank suspended across the front of the platform and designated as the altar. But they were mostly children. Children plead with one another. "Don't let the devil hold you back," cried one child of 8 to another older child. Dragged and unwilling, the child went to the platform.

When every appeal had been exhausted, possibly a score was gathered there. Some concluded on the floor in an agony of remorse, others were weeping. An unearthly shriek rang out and echoed time and time again. "Don't desert me, Christ," cried a girl of 18, well-dressed and apparently well-bred, "having Jesus," she repeated with a horrible yell of agony.

Then a man took up the lead. His contribution was a hysterical laugh. The laugh got louder. He shook hands with those around him. "I'm happy," he shouted. Then in an eerie manner he began to laugh violently. The laughter continued to hysteria and the piercing strains of that laugh echoed around and in the tall pines which screened off the meeting place.

In the midst of the turmoil, Inez threw herself on the floor. "Dear Lord," she prayed, "save these wicked ones. Make them pay the price tonight."

If hysteria, he seemed, piercing shrieks were what she meant, she obtained them from those cast at the altar.

Talks About Her Work. In the midst of a prayerful appeal, a message was sent to her that she leave for a moment the weeping children, the laughing man and the shrieking woman, to speak to a reporter. She came at once.

With every possible fluency she spoke of her work. On other questions she would look to her mother for prompting. "I first got the message when I was 8, I wasn't that mother!" The mother, a tall woman in black, nodded.

"I was in Stockton, Cal., when I heard some people giving their testimonies. One asked me to give mine, but I got up and spoke for a quarter of an hour. I have been preaching ever since."

"No, dear," corrected a Mr. Thomas, who is traveling with the mother and daughter, "only since last year." In explanation he said that every day—every housekeeper in Portland will be familiar with the principles for which the league stands. The occasion for so much enthusiasm just at this time is the coming of Mrs. Florence Kelly, of New York City, general secretary of the National Consumers' League, who arrived in the city last Friday. 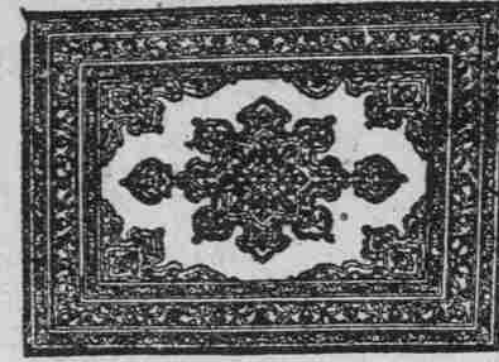

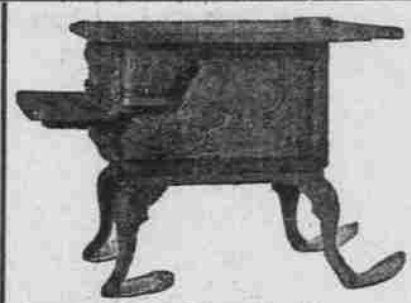

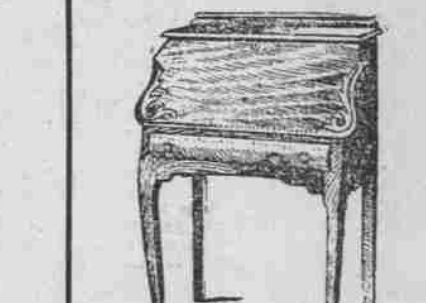

MOTHER CAN'T HOLD BOY

Oral Snover Given 90 Days for Stealing From Employer.

Oral Snover, 19 years old, residing with his widowed mother at 180 Milwaukee avenue, was sentenced to 90 days at Kelly Butte in Justice Olson's court yesterday afternoon on the specific charge of larceny by embezzlement. Several months ago Snover was employed as a clerk in a grocery store conducted by Junius Wright, 375 East Morrison street. While in that capacity he annexed \$30 of his employer's money. He was subsequently arrested on a warrant charging him with the theft. He was severely arraigned and allowed his freedom at that time by Justice Olson on his promise that he would make good the theft. He failed to keep his promise or comply to the conditions of his parole. He was accordingly arrested yesterday by Constable Lou Wagner and again arraigned and sentenced by Justice Olson. In court the lady's mother told a pitiful story of his conduct toward her and her utter helplessness toward her son's redemption.

PRICE IS CUT IN TWO

PETERSON'S LOT MAY BE USED AS JAIL SITE.

City Can Now Purchase Property Adjoining Present Building for \$30,000.

After reducing his price on a strip of ground 25x95 feet just north of the present police headquarters and City Jail at Second and Oak streets from \$60,000 to \$30,000, because he was shown that the city could build a new station-house elsewhere for less money, J. H. (Lucky Jack) Peterson now stands some chance of selling the property. Information that he had decided to make an offer of just half what he first asked, was conveyed to Mayor Simon yesterday, and the offer will be taken up and considered tomorrow morning by the Mayor and members of the committee on health and police of the City Council. They will inspect this and other, proposed sites and decide upon one for recommendation to the Council for purchase. It seems that Peterson had information which led him to believe that the city would erect a new City Jail and Municipal building on the present site, and that it would be necessary for him to purchase the strip owned by him just north of the old building on Second street. This would enable the construction of a building of considerably greater proportion than could be put up on the present location without the strip. However, when Peterson saw in The Oregonian that Mayor Simon had taken a great fancy to a quarter block across from the City Hall, on Fourth and Jefferson streets, which is offered for \$45,000, he decided that the Mayor did not intend to pay \$60,000 for the little strip north of the old building, and made up his mind to reduce the price. Mayor Simon stated yesterday that he still favors very much the site mentioned at Fourth and Jefferson streets, but that he will go over the city and view the various pieces of property that have been tendered and see if the committee and himself can agree upon one for the new city building. If it is decided to take the strip offered by Peterson and build on the same corner as now occupied by the old building, it will be necessary to secure a temporary building in which to operate the police department and

Municipal Court meanwhile. This would work a great inconvenience, and it may still be decided to select a new site, so that this difficulty could easily be obviated.
