EAST LOOKS POOR TO MRS. WOODCOCK

Gumption Is Lacking Among
Its Denizens, According to
"Rosenfelt" Partisan.

TAFT NOW ON HER FLAG

Teddy Occupies but One Side of Her
Banner — "Sell and Come
West" Was the Gospel She
Preached on Trip.

"What is the good of being a proprietor of landed interests in the East if you can't get rid of the stuff?" That is the question Mrs. M. L. Woodcock propounds. She has rented up after her long trip to the East and has settled down to a consideration of hard business problems, real estate, for example.

Before formal consideration of the subject, Mrs. Woodcock held out her Teddy flag for careful observation. In place of "Rosenfelt" reigning supreme on the banner, he is only the lord of half of it. While he may occupy the obverse, on the reverse the genial smiling countenance of one "Bill" Taft radiates good cheer. On the one side the grin of a war-lord, on the other the grin of an all-round good fellow.

And that is Mrs. Woodcock's banner for the future, she says. With campaign days over, she proposes giving up the work for Teddy. She does not say she is not grateful, but she has decided to visit George H. Himes, of the Oregon Historical Society, and present to him the banner that an Oregon woman carried all over the country. "I am campaigning for Teddy," has been her cry. Incidentally, she advertised her home state. The reason she intends donating the banner is that she believes she has been selfish with it. "It ought to be in the possession of the state," she says. Today she will take the necessary steps, but before, she would be quite sure she can lay her hand on another Teddy banner, in case of need for a future campaign. "I think I know where I can get one," she said.

Mrs. Woodcock enjoyed her trip because she has not to "cajole" hubby to get the money to go.

"Why if I had to get money from him to go on my campaign trips I would never go," she said.

"When do you decide to go?" she was asked.

"I go when things do not suit me. When I think I want to see how the people like the Administration, then I travel to find out the people's sentiment. The public has treated me right. I realize I am under obligations to people and that is why I travel to see them. Besides, they want to see the Teddy flag."

Rents are cheap, interest is low and the real estate man is without a spunk to make a likelihood. That is the Eastern situation as outlined by the woman traveler.

"Why, in Ogdensburg I only found one real estate man and he was not doing much. I wanted to tell him to live up and make some business," said Mrs. Woodcock, "but he did not do it. I told people to sell out their real estate, holdings and come West. They said they would if they could, but no one would buy their holdings. People with money ought to come out here to make more. Poor people ought to come, too, for they can buy lots on time and even small lots have been known to double in value in quite a short time."

In parentheses it may be said Mrs. Woodcock is quite a real estate specialist. From small beginnings she declares she now owns houses bringing a monthly rental of \$50, while also owning in common with her husband \$500 more of real estate. She is quite well known to real estate men and often turns over her property. She purposes visiting the A-Y-P with the Portland Realty Board.

"When I arrived in Portland the other day," she continued, "I had to ask a boy my way. All the other landmarks are disappearing and big buildings are going up. In the East things are no cheaper than they are here. Some are dearer. Shingles which cost \$2.50 here cost \$6 and \$7 in the East, while rustic boards are only one-half an inch thick. "People don't bring things out with them. Shopping costs just the same here. When people asked me if there was work here, I said there was lots out of work but plenty not desiring of work. My husband is never out of work. Why, in the East I saw people burning shavings for fires in their cook stoves, when we use gas here. They have to drink water from muddy wells and dirty rivers where we have pure snow water. We have a good car service, too. We are away ahead of other places."

Then Mrs. Woodcock considered the railroad situation. "Too much red tape," she declared, stood in the way of proper Governmental treatment.

"We need railroads, we can't ship without them," she declared. "With high schools and churches we have all that is coming to us, and we don't have to can fruit. In the East people only get flowers when they are dead; we have them all the time."

In talking of her success in life, Mrs. Woodcock averred people misjudged her because she dressed poorly. "The only people who trust me are real estate men," she said, "and they have to, but I pay everything else spot cash and have the money all the time."

LOTTERIES MAY BE CLOSED

Premier Clemenceau Introduces
Bill Against Gambling.

PARIS, July 17.—(Special.)—M. Clemenceau is no friend to lotteries or to gambling in any shape or form. He has just submitted to the Chamber of Deputies a bill framed with a view to the abolition of lotteries, and in the meantime to a general liquidation of those which have been authorized. The method which he suggests for this liquidation is somewhat complicated. If the suppression of lotteries is voted, the public will be deprived of a mild form of excitement, but little else, as we do not hear of people ruining themselves over lottery tickets, the average price of which is no more than 20 cents.
