

YOUNG CORBETT IS EASY FOR FRAYNE

Shadow of Former Self, He Is Knocked Out in Eighth Round of Tame Fight.

NO POWER IN HIS BLOWS

Right and Left on Jaw Send Him to Haunches—Another Pair of Smashes Topples Him Over and Sponge Goes Up.

ARENA, San Francisco, July 17.—Young Corbett, the one-time conqueror of Terry McGovern, proved an easy victim to young Jimmy Frayne, of San Francisco, who knocked him out today in the eighth round of a bout scheduled to run 25 rounds. Corbett palpably was in no condition to put up a hard battle and at no time did he appear to have a chance. The men fought at catch weights, weighing in at 115 pounds at 10 o'clock this morning. Corbett, however, failed to make the weight and it was announced that he was fully two pounds in excess of the requirements.

The Corbett today was a mere shadow of the once great lightweight, who but a few years ago electrified the sporting world with his wonderful battles. His famous "haymaker" was ill-timed and there was no power behind it.

Corbett Wobbles Under Smashes.

The contest was a tame and uninteresting affair up to the time of the knockout. In the eighth round Frayne shot out a right and left, catching Corbett flush on the jaw, and the one-time champion was sent to his haunches for the count of seven. He was dazed and wobbled about the ring unsteadily. Frayne promptly toppled him over with terrific right and left smashes to the jaw.

At this stage a merciful second threw the sponge into the ring as a token of defeat, and the Californian was awarded the verdict by Referee Tiv Kreling.

Two Lively Preliminaries.

Tommy McCarthy was given the decision over Charlie Kelly at the end of the 10th round, in a preliminary. Both are local boxers and fought at 120 pounds.

Terry Kelley and John O'Keefe, welterweights, battled 10 rounds to a draw. Freddie Brooks, the Seattle, Wash., crack, who was to have met Kellar, was injured in an automobile accident last night and O'Keefe was substituted.

OLSON TO MEET THE WINNER

Another Match Probable Outcome of Yousiff-Berg Contest.

Frank Templeton, Portland, is figuring on a match with Olson for winner of Berg-Yousiff contest.

The above telegram, received last night by Frank Templeton, Portland manager for Jack Curley, the wrestling promoter, who is staging a series of bouts on the Pacific coast this summer, brought much joy to the hearts of the wrestling fans, who are looking forward to the heavyweights for a possible relief to the monotony of the long summer months.

Now the question in the minds of the fans is, who will it be, Berg or Yousiff? Berg is confident that it will be he who goes into the ring with the big fellow, while the Turk, before he left here for Seattle, expressed himself as being confident that, allowed to wrestle as has been his custom, he would beat Berg. According to the articles of the new match, he has his wishes in this matter respected, and he will go into the ring minus his shoes. It is up to him to make good his assertions now or else drop out. Two successful defenses would make him worthless as a crowd-drawer anywhere.

In entering the ring with the Turk, Berg is giving probably 20 points to his weight. He will weigh close to 175, and the Turk will tip the scales at close to 190. Berg is putting in some hard stunts tonight, one of his big ones being tramping up and down the long flight of steps at the north entrance to the City Park.

The latter says that he has placed all his affairs in the hands of Levy, and will fight anybody he picks. Both Levy and Kaufman draw the line at Jack Johnson, for the present at least, but they say that after Kaufman has met and beaten some other good white man, Ketchel preferred, he will be ready to go against Johnson for the championship.

Power Boats in Race.

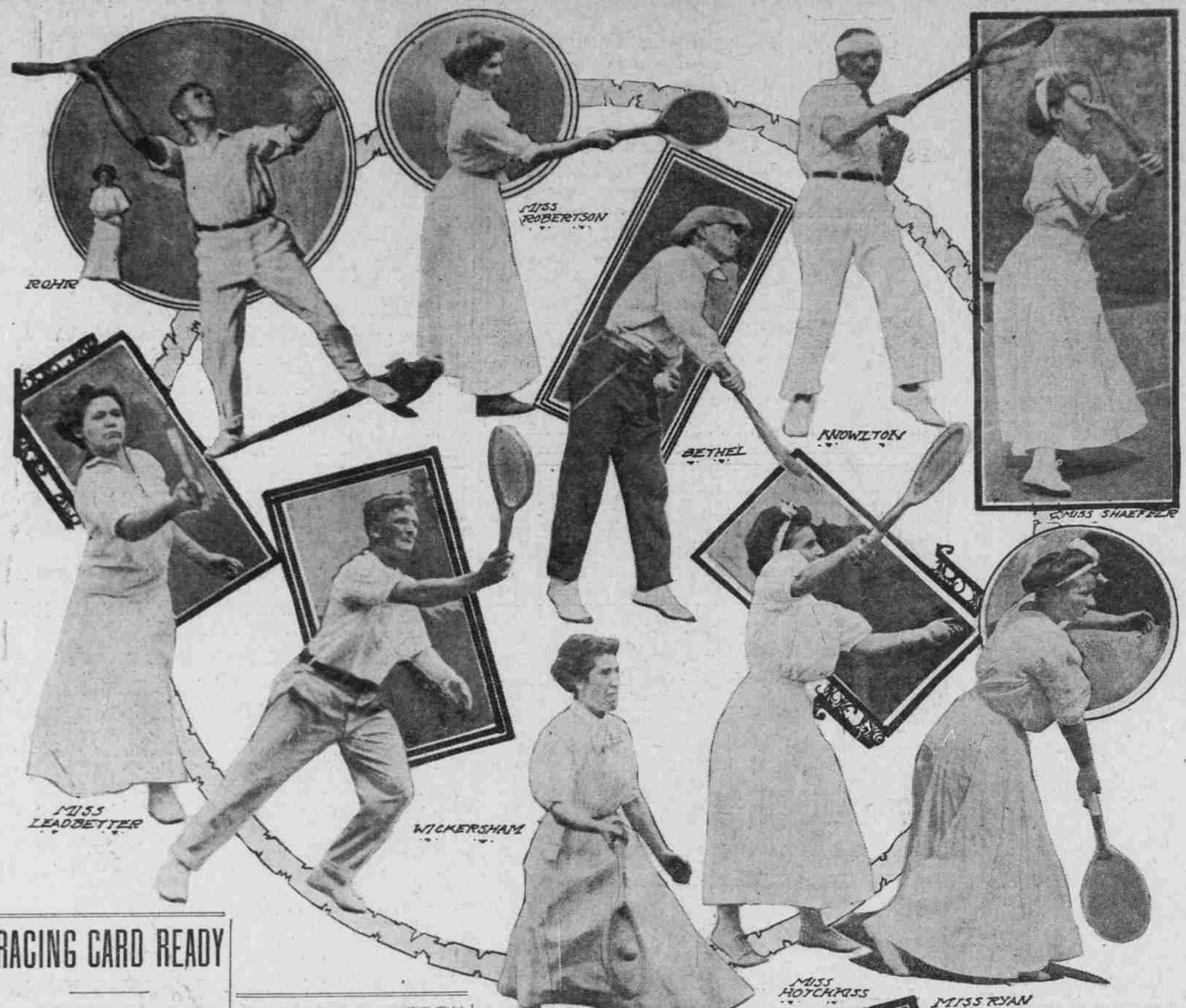

RACING CARD READY

Riverside Club Has Added to Postponed Events.

OUTSIDE HORSES ENTERED

Atlas and Zoe Will Meet for Side Bet—Contest Between Five Mules Will Provide Fun for Crowd Saturday.

Nothing but the misbehavior of the weather man on Saturday afternoon, July 17, can prevent the postponed mule races of the Riverside Driving Club from being a huge success. Those in charge of the racing programme have worked hard and earnestly in getting up the racing card for the afternoon's sport, and they have succeeded in bringing together not only Portland and outside performers, but several from the Willamette Valley. Paul S. Dick has entered his recent purchase, Roselle, the noted Los Angeles matinee performer, in the half-mile trotting handicap, and there is considerable speculation among the other owners as to whether Mr. Dick has picked up a winner or not.

All told there will be seven events carded for the day's sport, and aside from the feature events of the light harness brigade there will be a half-mile race for mules, which the mounts will be mules. This mule race has developed a lot of keen rivalry among the riders. A. L. Powell, J. S. Crane, Paul Dick, Henry Tullman and Joe M. Riege. The condition of the race is that each rider must secure his own mount, and there has been a heavy demand on the mule market of Portland for mules that can run a mile. No rider is supposed to tell his competitor what kind of mule he is to ride or where he secured his mount.

The whole thing will be kept a dark secret until the mules and riders face the starting judge. There have been five entries in the mule race, and if any one thinks they have not been carefully selected just read the names under which they will race—Flying Fox, Ormonde, Medlar, Hermis and Hamburg. Some of these noted speedsters, who have set their hearts on thousands of dollars as they flashed past the post winners at New York and other noted racetracks, have come to horse heaven, and it's hard to say if they have, for they might protest violently if they knew mules were raced under their names.

The special half-mile dash for horses owned by Portland Hunt Club members will bring together six very good horses. Sidney Lowenberg will ride Oregon Maid; Joe Cronin, of Portland, will ride William Albee; Lady Myrtle, E. Oppenheimer, Colt Bond; Harry Skuse, Oscar, and William Walter will send his timber-topper Frank after the silver cup. One of the most important events in the light harness class will be the match race for \$400 a side between Thomas Murphy's Atlas and G. K. Howitt's Zoe. There has been lots of goodnatured rivalry between these owners, and the final outcome of the race, which is for the two best heats in three, will be watched with interest by all of the mallee drivers.

NEW METHOD CURING HAY

Milton Farmers Place Green Alfalfa in Barn and Sprinkle in Salt.

MILTON, Or., July 17.—(Special).—A novel scheme for retaining the original color, strength and flavor of alfalfa has been discovered by growers of alfalfa in this vicinity. Instead of leaving the hay out in the sun after it has been cut and dried, as has been the custom, the hay is placed in the stack or barn after it has been exposed to the sun only a few hours.

To prevent heating, which would follow ordinarily where hay was put in large quantities before it was sufficiently cured, salt is liberally scattered through the stacks—about two pounds to the ton being used. Those farmers who have tried this plan say that splendid results are obtained and that much of the color and strength of the alfalfa, which has heretofore been lost in this way, is retained. There is no danger apparently from hay heating and burning up stacks and barns.

TRIO OF THIEVES HELD

FRENCH POLICE PUT CROOKS AWAY FOR MANY YEARS.

Long List of Crimes Fastened to Prisoners, and Heavy Sentences Are Imposed.

PARIS, July 17.—(Special).—Three remarkable swindlers appeared in the Tenth Correctional Tribunal yesterday. The main charge against them was preferred by a young woman who was a frequent visitor of the night restaurants of Montmartre.

The trio in question—Raoul Calvo, who described himself as an American; Jean Lalancie, alias the "Baron de Saint Amant"; and Paul Lausatz, known as the "Beau Leo"—made the acquaintance of Mlle. Mathilde de Cerdagne at the Palais de Glace. She accompanied them on a round of the Montmartre cafes, and invited them to wind up by drinking a glass of champagne in her flat in the Rue Fourcroy.

As events showed, Mlle. Cerdagne committed a grave error in inviting her newly-found friends to her rooms. They dragged her champagne, and when she fell asleep, relieved her of her jewels, which were worth \$10,000, and decamped. When she woke up next morning the spectacle of the ransacked room had such an effect upon her that she lost her reason, and she had to be removed to the Ville Evrard Asylum.

keepers arrived with the bills they learned that the "Baron" and his valet had gone to Mont Aurore, where they practiced blackmail.

At the magisterial inquiry Calvo, who, it seems, belongs to a good family, pretended that he had thieved in order to give Captain Marx, the officer now charged with trafficking in pardons, \$1000, which he had promised him. This statement, made on the morning of the captain's arrest, caused a great sensation, but it was not substantiated at the trial.

Mlle. Cerdagne was unable to appear against the thieves. She is still in the asylum. For robbing her of the jewels Calvo was sentenced to four years' imprisonment, fined \$500 and forbidden to reside in France for five years. A similar sentence was passed upon the spurious Baron. Lausatz, the "Beau Leo," was sentenced to three years' imprisonment. For swindling the shopkeepers Calvo and Lausatz to three years' imprisonment, the sentences to run concurrently.

After the arrest of the thieves, the police received numerous complaints against them. Shopkeepers identified the thieves as swindlers. In December the pseudo-baron rented a furnished flat in the Rue de la Pompe. Calvo assumed the role of valet to the Baron, and impudently afterwards goods of all kinds were delivered to the flat. When the shop-

lived happily until last year, when Mr. Averill went to Chicago to establish his business there, and Mrs. Averill remained in New York. The petition in the court reads that later Mrs. Averill was informed by her mother in Los Angeles that Jenkins had turned up there, after a trip around the world, and after conducting several large hotels in the Philippine Islands. Mr. Jenkins came East, met his wife, and the petition says they are now living together in Manila.

BOOTLEGGERS ARE FINED

Grants Pass Determined to Enforce Local Option Orders.

GRANTS PASS, Or., July 17.—(Special).—The vigorous campaign being waged in this city against the local drink establishments, since the Fourth of July celebration, by the anti-saloon league is still being kept up. August Fetisch, who was yesterday fined \$150 in the Police Court for violation of the local prohibition law, was rearrested again in the County Court, and his bond fixed at \$1000. Warrants are now in the hands of the officers for the arrest of Martin Brown, a night porter at Arlington Hotel, and a man named Rosecrans, who held a like position at Fetisch's place of business. It is rumored that Fetisch will quit his present business.

There has been a movement to check the persistent prosecution of liquor offenders, but so far no attention has been paid to such influence.

His Offer for Johnson-Kaufman Go Makes Fans Sit Up and Take Notice.

Hester is taking a chance by making the black \$100,000 offer, but it looks like good gambling, for the Coast fight followers would like to see the big smoke in action.

On dope Kaufman does not figure to have much of a chance. He is game, and has a punch, but he lacks the fighting spirit. When his opponent is groggy the big Californian does not seem to have sense enough to go after him and put him out. Kaufman will probably be cut to ribbons by the clever Johnson, just as he was by Philadelphia Jack O'Brien. By the way, Philadelphia Jack has been asking Coffroth to sign him with Kaufman, in San Francisco, but this is a match that would never go here. The burg is pretty sore on the "Confessor" and he would be as welcome as the small-pox.

Ketchel "Going Back?"

People here are forgetting about the Os Magnum which Ketchel was supposed to have broken in the fight with Faye, and are beginning to believe that the assassin is going back. The irrepressible Willus Britt, who discovered the ultra when his brother James Edward was made to look like a monkey by Gans, discovered the Os Magnum when Ketchel made his poor showing. He was attended by Dr. Menn, who later invited him to his home. Mrs. Menn and her daughter, it is declared, went to Europe two weeks ago.
