

BARCELONA REDS REPEL ASSAULT

Soldiers Suffer Reverse in Battle With Rebels in City of Chaos.

ATTACK MORE CONVENTS

Strikes Expected to Break Out in Madrid and Basque Provinces, and Troops Go Thither—Many Reds Have Been Executed.

PARIS, July 31.—A Barcelona dispatch to the Journal, dated July 31, says: "Yesterday afternoon new collisions occurred and the soldiers were repulsed. Assaults were directed against the convents of the Conceptionists and the daughter of Mary. Many were wounded in the lower quarters of the city."

ADVERSE NEWS SUPPRESSED

But Strikes Are Expected to Reach Madrid and Basque Provinces.

SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain, July 31.—By way of the French frontier—No news is allowed to be published from Barcelona except that favorable to the government, but reliable private reports say that the revolutionists still hold a large part of the city and that the artillery has not succeeded in driving them out. At the same time the revolutionary movement is spreading to the Basque provinces and is expected to burst into flame when the general strike begins on Monday. An army corps commanded by General Burgoa has arrived at Bilbao to suppress the strike.

FEROCIOUS DRAMA ENACTED

Fury of Barcelona Reds Aimed Mostly at Monks and Nuns.

PARIS, July 31.—Although all the censored dispatches from Madrid agree that General Brandes, the military commander at Barcelona, has ruthlessly crushed the revolution there, executing many ringleaders and that the government is now in control of the situation, reports filtering out at Cervera, on the French frontier, none of which, however, was later than noon on July 29, indicate that the mob still then had the upper hand and that nothing in history with the exception of the Commune approached the ferocious drama being enacted. All the reports agree that the movement was skillfully organized and broke like a bolt from a clear sky. Three facts stand out prominently.

ERIC ANDERSON IS DEAD

Old Resident of Portland Passes at Age of 67.

ERIC ANDERSON, resident of Portland for the past 35 years, died at his home, 38 East Ninth street, Friday morning, July 30, aged 67 years. Mr. Anderson was born in Sweden and came to America at the age of 25, settling in San Francisco. Later he removed to this city, which had since been his home. For the past 20 years he had been employed by the Oregon Furniture Company. Mr. Anderson is survived by his wife and three sons, Eric Jr., Arthur and Lloyd.

Refugees Keep Hendaye Awake.

HENDAYE, France, July 31.—Spanish refugees here made violent manifestations during the night. The Spanish Consul attempted to intervene, but he was bowled down. The crowds were dispersed here by French gendarmes.

Shell Moors at Alhucemas.

ALHUCEMAS, Morocco, July 31.—The resumption of fighting between the Moors and the Spanish forces here yesterday consisted of the shelling of tribesmen who returned to carry off their dead and wounded left on the field during the previous day's fighting.

LUMBER VESSEL SINKS

STEAM SCHOONER WINNEBAGO FOUNDERS ON COAST.

Built on Great Lakes, Ship Hits Rock Off Mendocino and Goes Down at Once.

PORT ARENA, Cal., July 31.—The steam schooner Winnebago, bound from Everett, Wash., to San Francisco, went ashore early today off the Mendocino coast, and will prove a total loss. Captain William A. Treanor, his wife and four children, and the 23 members of the crew reached shore unharmed in the schooner's two boats.

The Winnebago, laden with over 1,500,000 feet of lumber, was groping her way through a dense fog at 2:30 o'clock this morning when she struck. The vessel immediately began to settle at the stern, and orders were given to clear away the boats. The captain and his family succeeded in saving their more valuable effects, and the 23 persons on board were divided between the two small boats.

The Winnebago was a schooner of 1091 tons, built in 1903 at St. Clair, Mich. She was owned by the Coast Shipping Company, of San Francisco, and was valued at \$160,000.

Vessel Had Heavy Cargo.

SEATTLE, July 31.—The Winnebago left Everett July 27 with a cargo of lumber and coal for California ports. She carried about 200,000 feet of lumber from the Mukilteo mill consigned to its own order at San Pedro, also 100 poles for Hueneme, Cal., and 125 cedar poles for San Luis Obispo from Everett shippers. The remainder of her cargo was taken at Tacoma.

Owner Will Put Up Three-Story Structure Now, but Provision Will Be Made for More Floors Later.

Meaning the demolition of another ancient frame building of Portland and another important step in downtown improvement, a three-story brick building will be erected immediately on the southeast corner of Fourteenth and Washington streets. GERMANS BEGIN CHURCH

CORNERSTONE OF METHODIST EDIFICE LAID.

Bishop Smith Presides at Exercises and Other Ministers Speak. Cost to Be \$7000.

The cornerstone of the new German Methodist Church, now being erected on the southwest corner of Rodney avenue and Stanton street, was laid yesterday evening by Bishop Charles W. Smith, assisted by the pastor, Rev. E. Hartler, and District Superintendent J. Hepp. Rev. Mr. Hartler was in charge of the exercises. After singing and prayer, remarks were made by District Superintendent Hepp, who spoke in the German language, congratulating the members of the church on their enterprise in the erection of the new church. Bishop Smith followed in a short talk, in which he said:

"Every Christian church must have a home in which to do its work, and every home must have a house. Erection of this building is a good thing. It is evidence of the substantial character of the congregation. The Germans are among our best citizens, but they are fading away. Not that they are disappearing, but they are being absorbed and becoming American citizens, the same as the Swedes and Norwegians are being absorbed.
