BIG RUSH TO NEWPORT ON

Arrivals for the Last Week Have Averaged 275 Daily.

NEWPORT, Or., Aug. 7.—(Special).—Fifteen hundred and eighty-one passengers came across the bay on the ferry during the week, an average of 275 a day, so it is little wonder that the beach and every nook and corner is well taken up. Choice of recreation places depends on the temperament of the visitors, some preferring the water and others the shady corners on the land, and there is enough of both to satisfy the most particular people that visit Newport. A glance through the telescope from the life-saving lookout gives assurance that many people are supremely happy.

Card playing on the beach has been an important form of amusement lately, and parties of four or five using a coat for a table on the sand may be seen playing harmless games each afternoon unless a heavy wind prevails.

Of great interest to the more adventurous lovers of nature is following the hidden trails through the evergreens. These trails were originally made by cattle when the brush was young and small, and now that the shrubs have grown tall and spread out hundreds of tunneled paths extending in every direction are to be found within the city limits where one may wander without stooping and yet be unable to see the sky except in occasional spots. The rhododendrons, huckleberries, small manzanita bushes and spruce trees of stunted growth are among the most common flora in this section.

A favorite place for children to play on windy days is on the banks of a lily pond lying on the crest of the hill between the Yaquina Bay and Pacific Ocean, surrounded by small elevations and therefore protected from all winds. A flat-bottom boat is poled over the surface of lily pads, the water itself only showing in a few places owing to the number of these beautiful green marine plants.

The city band has increased considerably in size and meets the arrival of the evening boat and continues to play in concert until the mail has been distributed and the crowd begins to fall away. Each day the number of bathers increases, and each night an extra beacon

is added to the beach bonfires made of driftwood and surrounded by a circle of young people who enjoy having a good time regardless of hours.

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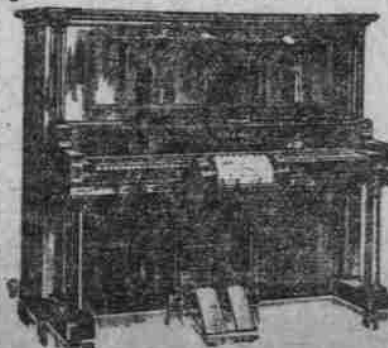
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
