## CONGRESS SAVED FROM BIG SCANDAL

Taft Prevents Higher Glove  
Tariff in Payment for  
Higher Salaries.

REWARD FOR LITTAUER

He Put Through Salary Bill and  
Leaders Shamelessly Tried to  
Return Favor, but Taft and  
Senate Blocked the Way.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash-  
ington, Aug. 7.—In compelling Congress  
to abandon the excessive House rates on  
gloves, President Taft saved his party  
from one of the most dangerous political  
scandals ever attempted at the National  
capital. Seldom have special interests  
been so bold as the glove manufacturers,  
for rarely do they have men so peculiarly  
influential to lobby for them in Congress.  
Members of the House, especially new  
members, who voted for the original  
Payne rates on gloves, have been ac-  
counted to find that their party leader,  
backed by Speaker Cannon, would at-  
tempt anything quite so "raw" as the  
glove schedule in the tariff bill as it was  
reported to and originally adopted by the  
House.

The truth is that the Payne rate on  
gloves was fixed by Lucius N. Littauer,  
an ex-member of Congress from New  
York and one of the leading glove manu-  
facturers of the United States. Littauer  
brought with him to Washington creden-  
tials authorizing him to represent all the  
glove manufacturers of the United States.  
But it was not his credentials, nor the  
mere fact that he is an ex-member that  
enabled him to wield such power.

Littauer Got Salaries Raised.

Littauer was permitted to dictate the  
House rate on gloves because it was he  
who, when a member of the House and on  
the appropriations committee, led and  
carried the fight that raised the salaries  
of Senators and Representatives from  
\$500 to \$750 per annum. It is acknowl-  
edged that but for the part played by Lit-  
tauer, the salary increase would never  
have gone through. And the advance in  
the rate on gloves way beyond the rate  
fixed in the Dingley bill was purely and  
simply in the nature of payment to Lit-  
tauer for the work he did in getting an  
extra \$250 annually for members of Con-  
gress.

Among the older members of Congress,  
those who knew Littauer and knew that  
the salary raise was largely due to his  
personal fight, the reason for raising the  
rates on gloves was understood, but the  
new members, who knew nothing of Lit-  
tauer or the "magnificent work" he did in  
getting members an increase of 50 per  
cent in the pay, assumed that the ways  
and means committee, under the leader-  
ship of Chairman Payne, had actually  
found the glove industry of the United  
States was being injured under the Ding-  
ley law. With them it was a pure case  
of allowing themselves to be deceived.

No Excuse for Cannon and Payne.

But for the House leaders, Cannon,  
Payne and other Republican members of  
the ways and means committee, there is  
no excuse—no extenuating circumstance.  
They went into the deal for the avowed  
purpose of doing Littauer a favor and,  
so far as in their power lay, they did it.  
Even after President Taft demanded a  
reduction to the Senate rates, these old  
House members stood pat as long as they  
could, determined not to give in. The  
Senate, it should be said, gave Littauer  
less credit for the salary raise than did  
the House leaders. Littauer's influence  
was not necessary to get that measure  
through the upper branch of Congress.  
Hence, the Senate felt under no obliga-  
tion to this man.

In connection with Littauer and his  
marvelous influence over the House of  
Representatives, an old member recalled  
today the fact that when Littauer re-  
tired from Congress after the salary  
raise, he was tendered a gorgeous ban-  
quet by the House members. Those who  
were invited were assessed \$5 a plate.  
Many rebelled, saying no banquet was  
worth that amount. But the promoters  
came back with this retort:  
"Don't overlook the fact that Littauer  
got for you an extra \$250 a year. Now  
fork over your \$5." And almost invari-  
ably they "forked."

BALLOT FARCE IN CHINA

Reports of First Election at Amoy  
Are Not Encouraging.

PEKIN, Aug. 7.—(Special).—Constitu-  
tional government in China seems to be  
at last within sight. In one or two prov-  
inces the first elections for the local as-  
semblies have already taken place. Man-  
churia, for instance, has elected 60 rep-  
resentatives, who will form the provin-  
cial Parliament. Very little information  
is available as to these first encounters  
with the ballot-box. A brief account is,  
however, given in a Hong Kong journal  
of what happened at Amoy, which had  
to elect two of the 72 members of the As-  
sembly which is to meet at Foochow.  
The proclamation, previously issued by  
the authorities stated that all business  
men worth \$5000 and upwards, all those  
with any official rank, literary men,  
Christian preachers and most professional  
men of good standing would be entitled  
to exercise the franchise. On this basis  
the voters numbered 700, but only about  
200 persons availed themselves of the  
privilege.

The rest, Chinese-like, preferred to wait  
until they saw what they would be let in  
for if they voted. The number of candi-  
dates was not stated, but at the top of  
the poll was a wealthy and powerful local  
business man, who received 127 votes,  
while the second favorite received 30  
votes. It is added that the voting was by  
secret ballot, but that a lot of underhand  
tricks seem to have been resorted to,  
making the whole thing a farce.

SEASIDE, Or., Aug. 7.—(Special).—Est-  
tary A. O. N. G., arrived at Seaside yester-  
day, and was taken to Holiday Sta-  
tion. They are camped near Seaside  
House. The weather is delightful, and a  
successful encampment is expected.
