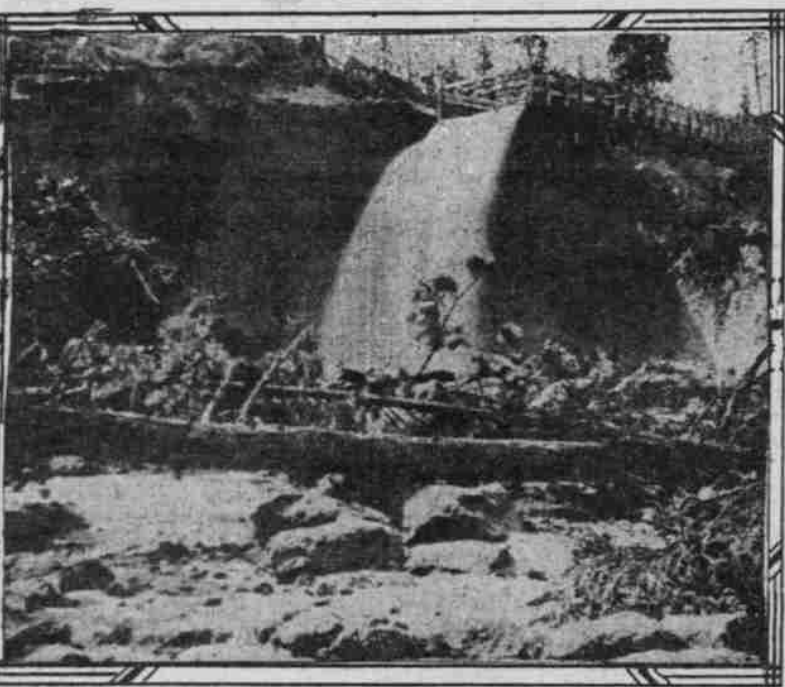
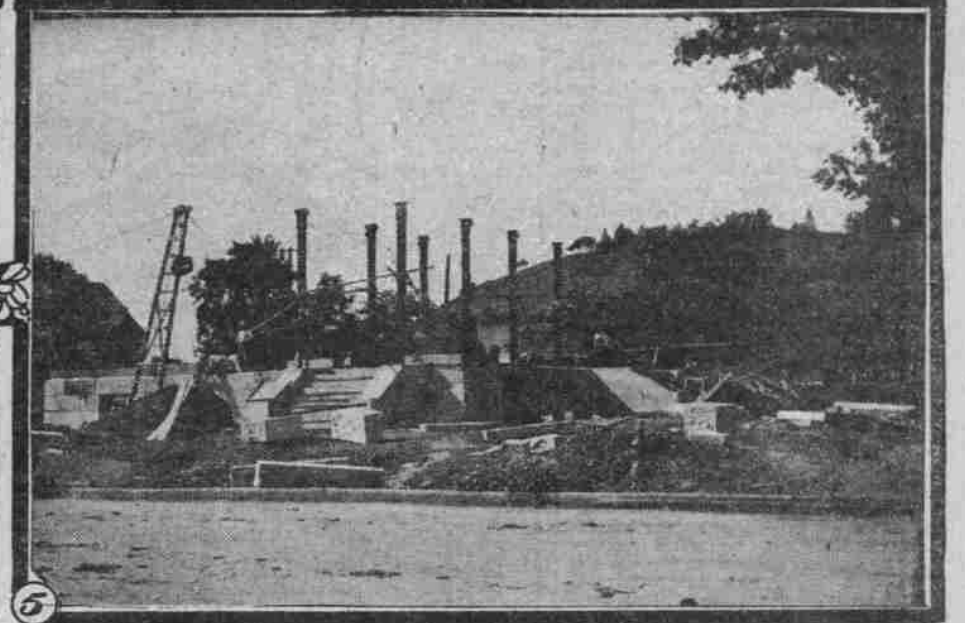
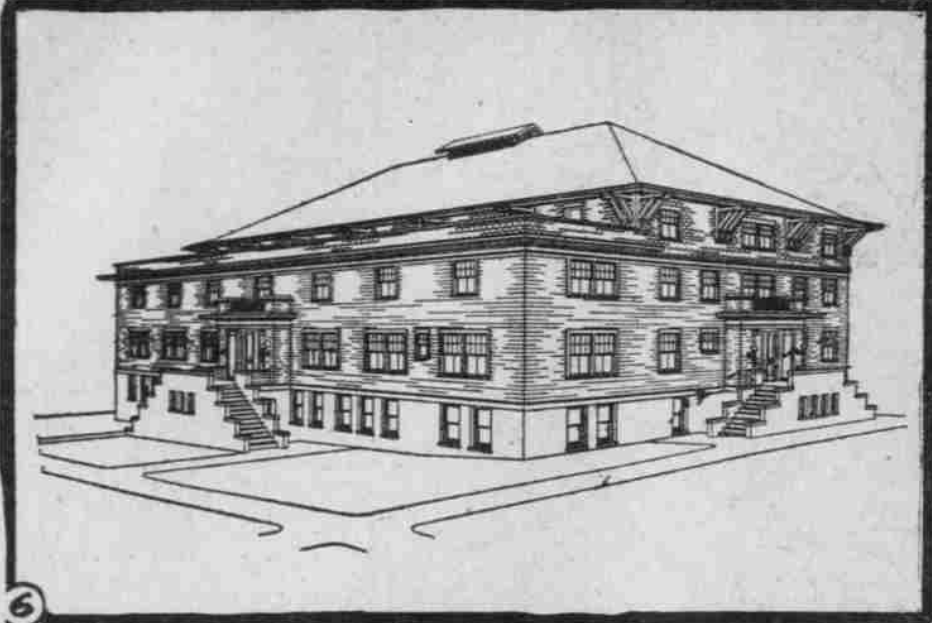
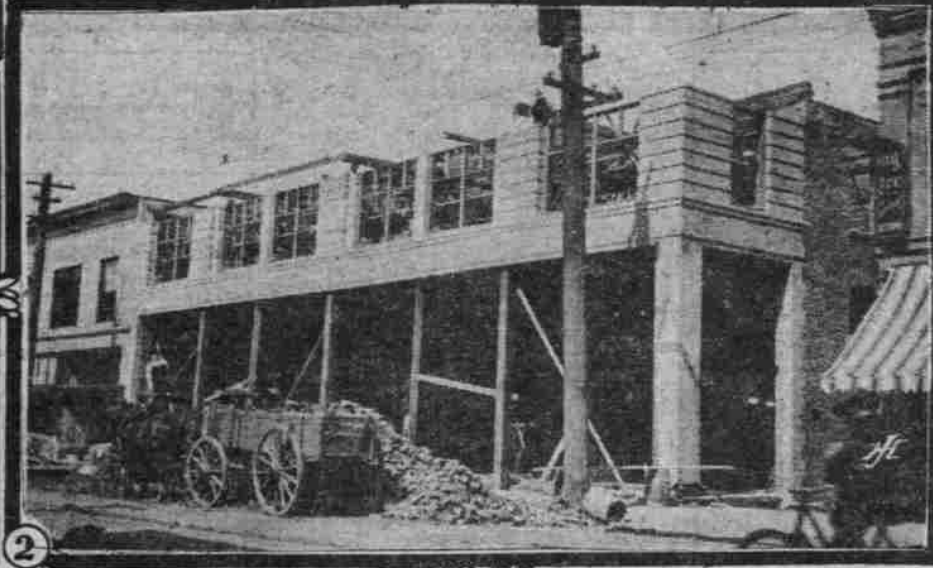
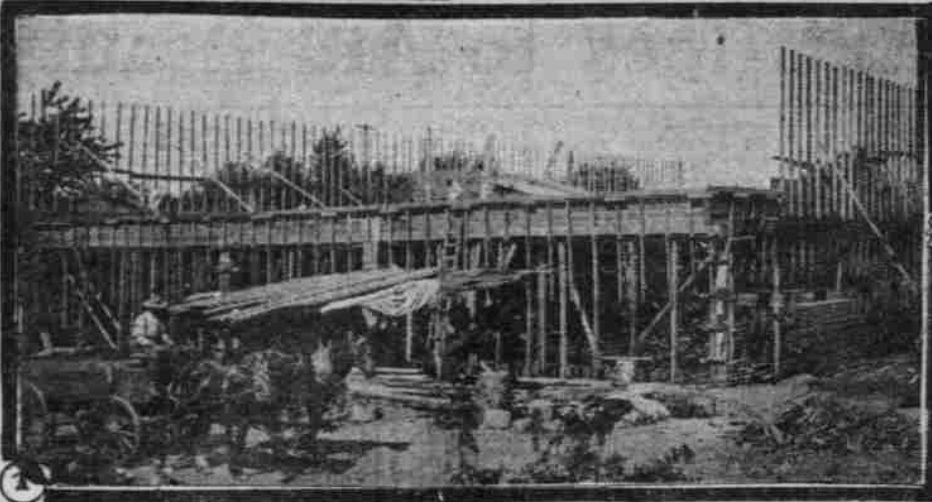

HERE are pictures and text showing industrial progress in Oregon which involves also much of civic pride, as furnished by correspondents of The Oregonian:

FIVE NEW BUSINESS BLOCKS Structures of More Than Ordinary Attractiveness at Eugene.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 5.—(Special).—Photographs of building operations in the business section of Eugene, were taken for The Oregonian, in order to give some idea of the unusual activity in the construction of substantial business blocks in this city. The photographs shown represent the building that is going on in a section of the city that two years ago did not have a brick building in it. All the photographs were taken within a radius of one block of the corner of Wilamette and Sixth streets.

Plate No. 1 shows the Cherry block, just completed, at the corner of Wilamette and Sixth. This building is entirely of concrete and is the first building of any importance to be erected in the business section of that material. Every room in the building is now rented. In Plate No. 2 is shown the Roney brick, which will be completed by Fall. This building adjoins the Cherry block. Two years ago this entire block, which consisted of a lot of cheap frame buildings, was destroyed by fire. Now the space is entirely covered with modern buildings.

Plate No. 3 shows the Roney brick, to be completed this Summer. It is on the corner of Fifth and Pearl streets, and will be the home of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company. The photograph shows a depression on the left hand side of the picture. This is where the Eagles have excavated for their new building, which will be erected right away.

Plate No. 4 is of the new Chambers concrete building, being erected on Olive street. The building will occupy a space 60x160 feet and will be two stories high. It will be the largest concrete structure in this section of the state, and will be ready for occupancy by this Fall.

building now being erected by the United States Government on the corner of Wilamette and Sixth streets. It will be used by the Government, the lower story for the postoffice and the upper by the Forestry Service. It is being built of granite and brick. It will probably be completed during the present year.

NEW COLLEGE GYMNASIUM Notable Building for Athletics at the University of Oregon.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 6.—(Special).—The new gymnasium of the University of Oregon, which will be ready for use late this Fall, is to be one of the best in the entire Pacific Northwest. The building will be 50x150 feet in dimensions and will contain a basement and three full stories.

In the basement will be a swimming pool 30x60 feet, with 11 showers to be used in connection with it. The main shower-room is to be 20x25 feet, with 18 showers. In addition to these, there will be a shower and a room 8x10 feet for the 'varsity coach; a linen closet 6x10 feet, a room 10x15 feet for the physical director; a storeroom 14x15 feet; a rubbing-room 10x15 feet; four showers and a room 20x25 feet for the varsity team; two showers and a room 14x25 feet for the visiting teams, and a drying-room 8x8 feet.

The main floor is to be 50x160 feet, with two vestibules, the office of the physical director, the dressing-room, a shower, a handball court 50x15 feet and a storeroom. There will be three stairways down to the basement and three leading up to the intermediate story, which will contain the auditorium. The auditorium will be 10x15 feet long and 55 feet wide, with a gallery 12 feet deep. From this gallery spectators can view the main floor of the gymnasium below as well as the running track on the

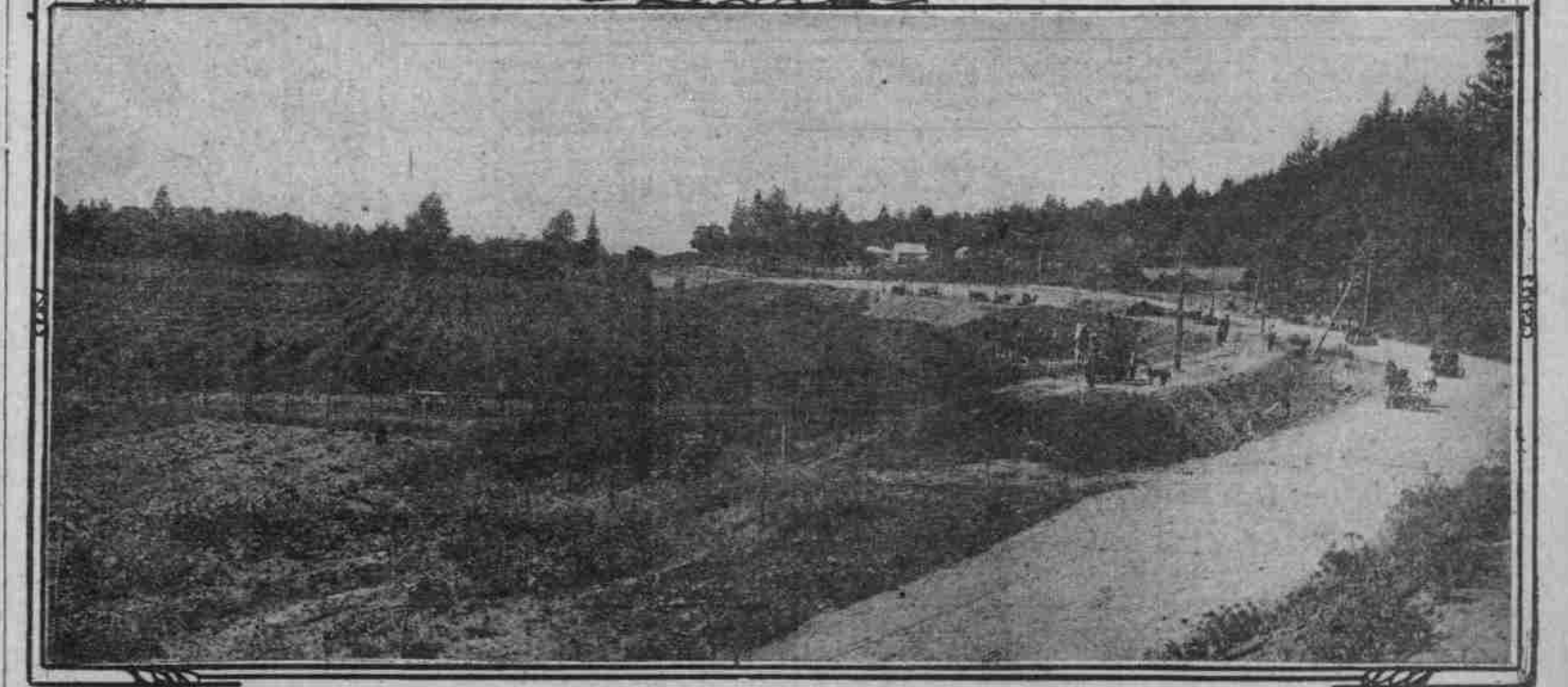
floor above, which will require 19 laps and 1 rod to the mile.

Repairing a Broken Flume.

BEND, Or., Aug. 5.—(Special).—At midnight of Sunday, July 18, the big flume of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power Company, of Bend, which supplies water for the entire 125,000-acre irrigation, "went out" a short distance below its intake from the Deschutes. At the point where the break occurred the flume is led along a steep hillside, and before the headgates could be shut off some 200 feet of fluming was destroyed, and a hole 50 feet deep washed in the soft pumice-stone formation. By putting every available man at work, the company's engineers were able to complete repairs in 10 days. The picture shows the scene the morning after the disaster, before the flow of water had been entirely checked.

Eugene's Railway Station Park.

EUGENE, Or., Aug. 5.—(Special).—Among the civic improvements in Eugene during the past few months, probably the most noticeable to the largest number are the new parks and gardens at the Southern Pacific railway station. The gardens, while a source of great pride to the citizens of Eugene, and a place of beauty that may be enjoyed by all who pass through the city by day or by night, for the gardens are well lighted by the city, they stand for more than

the beauty of their freshness and color and excellence of design. For the converting of an unattractive, unproductive strip of land into beautiful parks with gardens of roses, and a hundred other varieties of beautiful flowers and shrubs, within a period of less than half a year, is the tangible evidence of the co-operation of the Southern Pacific Railway and the people of Eugene. So harmoniously and energetically have the two bodies acted in beautifying the local station

Corean Insurgents Active.

PEKIN, Aug. 7.—(Special).—In North-

ern Corea the insurgents have again become troublesome. It has been found necessary to abandon the planting of cotton at one of the experimental stations recently created. At Kapsan a band of 87 made their appearance and were not dispersed until after several hours' fighting. They left five dead upon the field, and one Japanese was killed. Within a week recently six encounters occurred between Coreans and Japanese gendarmes and soldiers.
