

ONE OF AMERICA'S GREATEST SOLDIERS TO WHOM THE NATION NEVER HAS DONE JUSTICE -
AN IDLE REMARK THAT BROUGHT TO HIM THE ODIOUS SOBRIQUET OF "MAD"

Later, when the Jay treaty was ratified by Congress, he went West again to join the British forces turned over to the United States by that agreement. In November, 1796, he sailed from Detroit for Presque Isle (Erie, Pa.), the last post he was ordered to visit. Writing a dispatch of Erie, he was loaded with an attack of gout and when he landed he was in dying condition. He died a few weeks later.

His grave they raised a shaft on one side of which was inscribed:

MAJOR GENERAL ANTHONY WAYNE
was born at Warramshurg,
in Chester county, Pennsylvania,
A. D. 1745.
After a life of study and acquiescence
he died in December, 1796,
at a military post on the shores of
Lake Erie.
Commander-in-Chief of the Army of
the United States
His military achievements are consi-
dered in the history of his coun-
try and in the annals of his
countrymen.

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
