Costly errors by the Casey squad kept the darkened ceiling three runs yesterday, for Chief Pinnacle held the visiting Aberdeen bunch to four lone bingles, while his own supporters collected eight off Herr Ovi's, late of the University of Illinois, though the octet proved good for only one score.

Despite the erratic work of the home guardians in the sixth chapter, and Fred Adams' wild toss in the first, the game was a fairly good exhibition and was really enjoyed by the big crowd. At any rate, the bugs saw fit to exult on several occasions, though some of the plays applauded should have been easy chances instead of close plays.

However, Dicky Breen enlivened the proceedings by a leaping one-handed stop which cut off an Aberdeen run in the ninth manner imaginable. It was in the very first inning that the erratic stuff which gave away the game commenced. Charley Moore, the first man up, and who afterwards scored, seemed to have been chased to the water bucket to think it over, but Fred Adams' wild toss with a strong-arm stunt which caused "Papa" Moore to amble three-quarters of the distance because the toss landed against the bleacher screen. Swain became a live one because Breen erred, and stole second immediately afterwards. Fournier tossed wildly and the runner taking third, Lejeune and Julie Streib failed to put Swain over, each going out easily.

Bower hit a sharp one at the Indian, who knocked it down, but in the effort to pick it up he booted the ball, allowing Swain to score and giving Breen life at first. Bower stole second, and Staton's error on Tony Streib's easy bounder allowed Bower to gallop home.

CHAMPION AT BUCKING

CLAYTON DANKS WINS TITLE ON OUTLAW HORSE.

Roping Contest at Cheyenne Is Stopped by Humane Society as Cruel.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Aug. 21.—Before 40,000 people, Clayton Danks, of Cheyenne, after a sensational ride on Steamboat, the famous outlaw horse, was awarded the world's championship in the bucking contest finals at the frontier celebration this afternoon. Danks won the championship here two years ago and in Denver three years ago.

Ed McCarty, of the Cheyenne High School, won the world's championship in roping in Thursday's throw of a steer, in Mexico, was second, 50.45 seconds. These awards were announced today. The Humane Society prevented the finals in the roping contest today on the ground that the sport was too cruel.

In the final riding bucking contest, Harry Brennan was second, St. Louis fourth, Richard Stanley, of Oregon, last year's champion, got sixth place.

This year's celebration drew people from all over the West and from many parts of the East.
