

FIVE TRAINS ADDED

Fast Service Necessitates New Schedules.

NEW TIME CARD IS OUT

Goes Into Effect Today, When First Train for Chicago Will Leave Union Depot—Other Schedules Are Unchanged.

Effective today, Sunday, August 22, the new timecard at the Union Depot shows five daily trains to the East over the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company's line. This has resulted from the inauguration of the Oregon and Washington Limited, a new fast train operating on a 6-hour schedule between Portland and Chicago. It will leave Portland at 5:45 P. M. daily and arrive at 8:30 A. M. In order to care for the local business as far east as Salt Lake an additional train has been provided for the Portland-Salt Lake run. It will be known as the Eastern Express and will leave Portland at 3 P. M. and arrive at 8:30 A. M. daily. These changes have required a revision in the schedule of the Harriman trains over the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company's line as follows:

Leaving Portland—No. 12, Atlantic Express, 7:20 A. M.; instead of 8:10 A. M.; No. 8, Chicago-Portland Special, 10 A. M. (no change); No. 4, Oregon and Washington Limited (new train), 5:45 P. M.; No. 4, Spokane-Portland, 7 P. M. (no change); No. 16, Eastern Express (new train to Salt Lake), 3 P. M. instead of 4 P. M.

Arriving in Portland—No. 9, Oregon Express (from Salt Lake), 8:10, instead of 7:20 A. M.; No. 5, Oregon and Washington Limited (new train), 8:20 A. M.; No. 3, Spokane-Portland, 9 A. M. (no change); No. 11, Pacific Express, 6:50 P. M., instead of 8 P. M.; No. 7, Chicago-Portland Special, 8 P. M. (no change).

IRRIGATION IS MADE SUBJECT

Pamphlet Issued by Harriman Lines Discussing Problems.

"Small Farms With Irrigation From Wells for Western and Southern Oregon," is the title of an interesting pamphlet which has just been issued by the passenger department of the Harriman lines operating in this state. The discussion of the subject was prepared by R. M. Brereton, of this city, a civil engineer, who has had wide observation and considerable practical experience in well irrigation on small farms in this state. The pamphlet treats of the possibilities of irrigation on a small scale. Its purpose is to impress upon the farming community, landowners and business men of every

class, the value to the soil, when applied by artificial methods, of the never-failing subsoil waters of the Willamette, Umpqua and Rogue River valleys. The pamphlet will be given general circulation among the farmers of Western Oregon.

"The tillable lands of these valleys," says Mr. Brereton, "now produce, without irrigation, but a third of the bulk and quality of crops which the soil is capable of yielding, if provided with the necessary moisture during the best growing and maturing period of the year. There is nothing Utopian about the data furnished. The necessary amount of water is contained in the subsoil within easy reach; the cost of applying it to the surface is a small percentage of the market value of each crop; by its use the bulk is doubled and trebled and the marketable size and quality is largely increased. The utilization of this most valuable agricultural treasury, water, underlying every acre, will soon treble the present population and establish small farms in the place of present large ones, which now raise only one crop a year, and that solely dependent upon an uncertain rainfall."

On arriving in Oregon they went onto a farm at French Prairie, near Salem, and remained there about three years. They then acquired a donation land claim on the Boon's Ferry road, about 18 miles above Portland, where they lived until 1862. From here they moved to Salem and later to Portland. Mr. Otis died February 26, 1897, and since then Mrs. Otis had been living with her daughter, Mrs. George Mercer, at 35 East Twenty-seventh street.

Mrs. Otis is survived by three children—Mrs. Mercer and Mrs. Lucy, of Portland, and Ernest Otis, of Spokane. There are also nine grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren.

BROUGHER MAY GO

White Temple Pastor to Confer on Los Angeles Call.

COMMITTEE IS PERSISTENT

He Will Go to Meet Church Officials South—Clergyman Has Undecided Whether He Will Take Dr. Burdette's Place.

Los Angeles is vehement in its efforts to secure the services of Dr. Brougner as pastor of Temple Baptist Church, of the Southern city, to succeed Rev. "Bob" Burdette, who resigned recently on account of ill health, and it seems probable the local clergyman will harken to the call of the City of Angels. At all events, Dr. Brougner has consented to confer with the pulpits committee of the Los Angeles Temple, and he will leave Portland tomorrow for that purpose. Dr. Brougner has already declined calls to important pulpits in the East, and Los Angeles may not be able to induce him to leave Portland.

Asked yesterday if he would accept a call from the Los Angeles Temple, Dr. Brougner said:

"I have merely consented to have a conference concerning the matter, and I may not be prepared to say what I might do until I return from the southern city."

Dr. Brougner and Dr. Burdette are close personal friends, and two years ago this month, at the request of Dr. Burdette and the deacons of Temple Church, Dr. Brougner supplied the auditorium pulpit and for three Sundays preached to immense congregations.

When it was known that Dr. Burdette would have to give up his pulpit, Dr. Brougner's name was immediately mentioned as the pastor to succeed him. Dr. Brougner, however, has urged him not to consider overtures made him by other churches.

LINCOLN WILL HOLD FAIR
