Miss Marcel Howe has returned from the Bremerton Navy-yard, where she was the guest of Mrs. Harriet Brown, mother of

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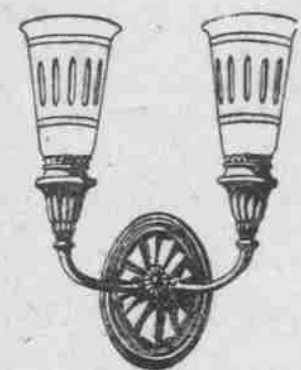
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
