TEST OF COWS BEGUN

DAIRY COMMISSIONER BAILEY EMPLOYS DR. HUTCHINSON.
Rolfe's Herd Is Subjected to Examination by Expert—Result in Three Days.

Unable immediately to secure the services of W. H. Lytle, State Veterinarian, J. W. Bailey, State Dairy and Food Commissioner, yesterday employed Dr. Hutchinson to cooperate with Bailey's deputy, Paul B. Merrin, in making a scientific test of the dairy herd belonging to Henry Rolfe, a dairyman, residing on the Cornell Road. Mr. Bailey regards Dr. Hutchinson especially well-equipped for this kind of work, the latter having for years been attached to the Bureau of Animal Industry, an arm of the United States Department of Agriculture. The purpose of the investigation is to determine whether Rolfe's cows are diseased, as the owner has represented them to be. The test will require three days, and Mr. Bailey expects to receive a report from the experts not later than tomorrow night.

Mr. Withycombe says:
"The attacks upon Mr. Bailey have been taken in the attacks made upon him, and it is not his duty to test the animals for tuberculosis at all, but is the work of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry or the State Veterinarian. It is impossible to diagnose the disease even with the assistance of a competent veterinarian without the procedure from the United States chemical department of the Bureau of Agriculture.
"Mr. Bailey's only proper action in the case reported by Henry Rolfe, the dairyman who has suddenly become so anxious to have his herd inspected, is to turn it over to the United States Bureau of Animal Industry or the State Veterinarian for inspection. He has no authority to make the inspections himself. Mr. Withycombe's herd at Farmington has recently been inspected by Dr. McClure, of the United States Bureau of Animal Industry, and the results seem to disprove the oft-stated theory that old herds cannot help being infected with tubercular germs. This herd has been running for 30 years, and is composed of about 20 high-bred Jerseys and cattle. The test showed every animal to be entirely free from tuberculosis, with not a suspicion of a reaction in any test.
