HOLD BOTH BANKS AGAINST RIVALS

New Company Now Enters
Fight in Deschutes
Canyon.

AID TO HARRIMAN LINE

Southern Extension Company Is
Stranger Which Seeks Right of
Way on East Bank, Opposite
Deschutes Line.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Sept. 11.—A mysterious stranger has appeared before the General Land Office as a party to the Deschutes railroad controversy. The Southern Extension Railroad Company, incorporated in the State of Washington, is the mysterious stranger, and its papers bear the signatures of Arvid Rydstrom, vice-president, and H. N. Jones, locating engineer.

This company filed a map of location for 5.5 miles along the east bank of the Deschutes River, from a point in section 7, township 3 south, range 15 east, to a point in section 35, township 3 south, range 14 east. According to the map on file, this company seeks right of way "from nowhere to nowhere," that is to say, there is no town at either terminal. The northernmost extremity of this road is about 15 or 20 miles from the Columbia River.

Inasmuch as about half the right of way asked by this company is in conflict with the right of way already granted to the Oregon Trunk Railroad, the General Land Office has given the Southern Extension 30 days in which to show cause why its application should not be rejected.

It is suspected here that this mysterious road is subsidiary to the Harriman road, for its maps were presented by an attorney who has looked after the Harriman road's interest in the disputes, and there are other indications that it is backed by the Harriman outfit on the opposite bank of the river.

The Southern Extension survey occupies the side of the canyon opposite that of the Deschutes Railroad Company, and was surveyed, apparently, to hold the canyon against a rival road.

HEAR PACIFIC RATE CASES

Interstate Commission Will Sit on Coast in October.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Sept. 11.—The entire Interstate Commerce Commission will visit the Pacific Coast this Fall and conduct hearings on all complaints of record from that section. The hearings will begin at Seattle, October 7, and after clearing the Washington docket, the Commission will move to Portland on October 14 and to San Francisco four days later.

Among the questions to be heard are the allegations that various distributive rates in the Northwest are excessive. Testimony will also be taken on various complaints affecting the contemplated rearrangement of all transcontinental rates to Pacific Coast points. Most of the large cities have entered complaints which will be heard. In most instances where time permits the Commission will hear arguments after hearing testimony.

Among cases on which testimony will be taken at Portland are: Oregon Railroad Commission vs. O. R. & N. and other roads; Farmers' Co-operative & Educational Union vs. Great Northern and others; Astoria Chamber of Commerce vs. Great Northern.

At Seattle the Commission will take up the following: Portland Chamber of Commerce vs. O. R. & N. and others; Transportation Bureau, Seattle Chamber of Commerce, vs. Northern Pacific and others; Humboldt Steamship Company vs. White Pass & Yukon Route of Alaska; F. R. Harmon vs. Lake Shore & Michigan Southern Railroad, and Seattle Frog & Switch Company vs. Northern Pacific.

At San Francisco a long docket is to be heard, the most important case being that of the Pacific Coast Jobbers' & Manufacturers' Association vs. Southern Pacific and other roads.

NAMES TARIFF COMMISSION

Educator, Editor and Office-holder Appointed by President.

BEVERLY, Sept. 11.—President Taft this afternoon announced the appointments of the new tariff commission as follows:

Chairman, Professor Henry C. Emery, of Yale; assistant secretary of the treasury, James R. Roosevelt, of Boston; editor and publisher of the *Broadway Gazette*, Alvin H. Sanders, of Chicago.

The commission is authorized to employ experts to investigate foreign and domestic tariffs.

GOING TO BELFAST

Consul Miller Transferred at
Own Request.

HEALTH WAS BAD IN JAPAN

Accepts Only Vacancy in Europe,
Though Salary Lower, but Will
Get First Promotion Open
to \$6000 Grade.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Sept. 11.—Henry B. Miller, of Oregon, Consul transferred to Belfast, Ireland. Mr. Miller has been on sick leave for some months, and recently advised the State Department that his health would not permit him to return to Japan. He asked for a transfer to some consulate in Europe.

There was no European consulate of the Yokohama grade vacant, so he was offered the consulate at Belfast, the only one available, which pays \$6000, as against \$6000 which he received at Yokohama. Under the circumstances, he accepted a transfer to Belfast, but it will be in line for promotion back to a \$6000 position as soon as some European consulate of that grade becomes vacant.

The State Department declares that Mr. Miller's record is exceptionally satisfactory, and that no reduction in his salary would have been made had it been possible to find a \$6000 consulate for him in Europe.

HAD LONG SERVICE IN ORIENT

Miller's Appointment Due to Failure of Health in Japan.

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 11.—(Special.)—It is reported in Eugene today that Hon. H. B. Miller, for a number of years United States Consul at Newchwang, China, and later Consul-General at Yokohama, has been appointed United States Consul at Belfast, Ireland.

Mr. Miller held the position at Newchwang for a number of years previous to the outbreak of the Russo-Japanese war, when he was transferred to Yokohama and made Consul-General, which position he held until a short time ago, when he was compelled to return to America on account of ill health. Feeling that his health would not permit of his returning to Japan, Mr. Miller was transferred to Belfast at his

own request. Mrs. Miller will leave for his new post within a few months.

THIEVES MAKE BIG HAUL

Burglars Carry Away Gems Worth
\$100,000 in Pittsburgh.

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 11.—The biggest diamond and jewel robbery perhaps in the history of the country occurred in this city early last Spring, but the police are only now making it public. The value of the gems stolen amounts to about \$100,000, yet the police refuse to make known the name of the person robbed. They admit, however, that they are on the track of the man or men who stole one diamond valued at \$10,000 and enough other jewelry and precious stones to total the \$100,000. It is thought that the house, which is said to be situated just outside the city, was robbed last February while the family was at home.

The big diamond, weighing 10 1/4 karats, on account of its size and its description is expected to be a white elephant on the hands of those who took it. Numerous other jewels worth \$5000 each are on the list.

CHURCH STANDS BY SUTTON

Lieutenant's Grave Will Be Consecrated, Says Attorney.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—A sensational story was printed in a Washington paper this morning that Cardinal Gibbons, as head of the Catholic Church in America, had withheld permission for the consecration of ground in Arlington Cemetery, near Washington, where Lieutenant James N. Sutton lies buried and interred, that in all probability such permission would not be granted in view of the fact that the naval court had failed to decide positively and specially that Lieutenant Sutton did not commit suicide.

Both Mrs. Sutton and Henry E. Davis, her attorney, declare today that this story is false and that the consecration of the ground will take place Monday after the autopsy on the body of Lieutenant Sutton.

AUTO CRASH FATAL

Labor Leader Killed. Wife Injured in Collision.

TROLLEY SMASHES MOTOR

Injured Woman Says Husband Was Driving Too Fast to Stop as Rapidly Approaching Car Was Sighted.

SAN JOSE, Cal., Sept. 11.—(Special.)—While returning from an outing near Saratoga, J. W. Gano, a local labor leader, was killed this afternoon and his wife seriously injured in a collision between their automobile and an interurban car, ten miles west of San Jose on the Saratoga line.

Gano was driving eastward on Graves avenue and as he approached the intersection of the interurban tracks, he saw an interurban car traveling southwest at a rapid rate of speed. Both vehicles reached the crossing at the same time and the impact of the collision was terrific. The automobile was lifted from the road and buried 20 feet against a telephone pole.

The interurban car was stopped and Gano was placed on a baggage car and rushed to the O'Connor Sanitarium near this city. He died en route. Mrs. Gano was taken to a residence nearby. She was badly cut and bruised about the face and hands, but was conscious. She stated that her husband was driving too fast to stop when he first saw the car.

SPANISH ARE REINFORCED

Advance to Outflank Moors—Natives Beg for Peace.

MELILLA, Morocco, Sept. 11.—Reinforcements to the number of 11,000 men have arrived here. General Marina, commander of the Spanish forces in Morocco, continues to advance his line, with the object of outflanking the Moorish positions on Mount Guruga. The Spanish advance columns have encountered many natives who beg for restoration of peace.

Venezuela Winding Up Claims.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—The reported settlement of the Orinoco Corporation against the Venezuelan Government leaves undecided only one of the five large claims against that country that have grown out of alleged violation of

contracts and concessions with American citizens. This is the \$1,400,000 claim of the Orinoco Steamship Company, which is now before the Hague tribunal for determination. This claim in its early history was submitted to a mixed tribunal for arbitration, and about \$20,000 was allowed. Later the whole question involved was submitted to The Hague tribunal, from which a decision is expected within the next few months.

Roosevelt Chosen a Delegate.

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt and ex-Vice-President Fairbanks are among those appointed delegates to the world's missionary conference in Edinburgh, Scotland, next June 14 to 24. There will be about 1100 delegates of whom 500 will go from this country and Canada. They will include educators, jurists, bishops, ministers, missionary secretaries and missionaries themselves.

The delegates are appointed by the missionary board of every Protestant denomination on the basis of income devoted to missions in non-Christian lands. Seth Low is chairman of a commission to report on the "Relation of Missions to Government."

Theater Men Defy Trust.

CHICAGO, Sept. 11.—The Western Theater Managers, in session here yesterday, declared themselves for "open door" policy of booking plays, and declared that during the coming season they would accept all offerings presented by either the theatrical syndicate headed by Klaw & Erlanger or by the "Independents," of which the Shuberts are the controlling spirit. The decision was taken after long debate, when it was decided to accept the bookings of both factions.

Land Withdrawn From Entry.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—The Secretary of the Interior has withdrawn from entry southwest quarter of section 29, township 25 south, range 14 east, in Lake County, Oregon, until the Geological Survey can make an examination of the peculiar formation on this land, known as Fortrock. If this landmark is considered of sufficient importance, it will be permanently reserved as a National monument.

Governor Clark to Take Oath.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Sept. 11.—Governor Clark, of this state, will take the oath of office as Governor of Alaska at Juneau October 1. He leaves for San Francisco tomorrow, where he will be banqueted by the commercial bodies of that city.

Missouri Pacific Train Derailed.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 11.—Missouri Pacific through train No. 3, from St. Louis to Pueblo, was derailed at Swope Park, ten miles south of Kansas City, today. One man was slightly injured. The entire train left the rails, but remained upright.

Woman Drinks Herself to Death.

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—Eighteen whiskey flasks which had contained approximately five gallons of the quality of alcohol to be found in the "blue" district were on the table in the little room on the top

floor of No. 24 East Twenty-fifth street yesterday when a policeman broke down the door and found Kate Williams dead on the floor. When she was taken to the morgue later and an autopsy performed it was said that she had consumed the entire five gallons with a few days.

Fairbanks Leaves China.

SIANGHAI, Sept. 11.—Former Vice-President Charles W. Fairbanks left here today for Manila, by way of Nagasaki.
