WOULD HAVE WATER ANALTZED .- Rev. B. P. Culver, pastor of the First Evange-Heal Church, East Market and East Sixth streets, expresses doubt that the water from the well at the Jennings Lodge campground is responsible for the cases of typhoid fever at Lonis and elsewhere. of typhold fever at Lonis and elsewhere, among those who attended the camp-meeting. He says that the water from this well had been used for four years at the campmeetings held on the ground and until now no complaint about its impurity had been raised. Besides it was constantly used while there was no campmeeting in progress. Just before compmeeting opened Mr. Cuiver and sev-aral others pumped the well dry so there componenting opened Mr. Culver and sev-sral others pumped the well dry so there was no stagmant water left in the well to be used by campers. "I drank the water freely," said Hev. Mr. Culver, "ma did hundreds of others of my congrega-tion and from other congregations with-out: cases of typhoid fever developing. Nearly all the cases of typhoid fever are at Lents, except the son of Rev. B. F. Benn, and the cases of the well at is the cause of the apread of the disease rather than blame the well at Jennings Lodge.
