

DEMOCRATS NAME LISTER, OF TACOMA

Mass Convention Nominates
Candidate to Oppose
McCredie.

BAIT OUT TO REPUBLICANS

Democrats Hope to Arouse Sectional
Strife—McCredie's Certificate
of Nomination Is Filed
at Last Hour.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—A mass convention of Democrats of the Second District met here this afternoon and unanimously nominated Ernest Lister, of Tacoma, as their party candidate for Congress to succeed Francis W. Cushman. Just as soon as the nomination was made, a special committee was directed to prepare the necessary certificate to be filed with the Secretary of State, as this was the last day nominations could be filed with that officer.

The certificate was filed about 4:30 P. M., and it was then learned that the certificate of Judge McCredie, the Republican candidate, had not been filed.

Finch Jumps Into Breach.

This omission had been brought to the attention of E. C. Finch, chairman of the recent Republican convention. Finch hurried here on this evening's train, was met at the depot by Frank Cowling, of Olympia, who had been one of the secretaries of the meeting, and the necessary certificate was signed. This was filed with Assistant Secretary of State Ben R. Fish, at 6:45 tonight.

The certificate of the nomination today at Tacoma of H. K. Rockhill, as prohibition candidate, had not been filed with the Secretary of State, and therefore will not go on the official ballot.

MAN HUNT ON TODAY

POSSE BELIEVED TO BE CLOSE
ON MEYERS' TRAIL.

Realizing Fugitive Is Desperate
Man, Officers Have Orders to
Shoot to Kill if Resisted.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—Search for George Meyers, slayer of Patrolman Thomas M. Eckhart, is now being conducted by a posse of about 20 men, including a large force of deputies, will be on the scene at daybreak tomorrow, and every foot of ground between this city and Wheatland will be covered in the search for the fugitive. Some of the officers will go down the river in launches, and it is believed the fugitive, if it proves to be he, has but little chance to escape.

Meyers is a splendid shot and as he no doubt knows that his victim is dead, the police are unanimously of the opinion that Meyers will put up a bitter fight before allowing himself to be captured. The deputies have orders to take no chances, and to shoot to kill if the fleeing man makes the slightest effort to use his gun.

Meyers is 35 years old, 5 feet 10 inches tall, light complexion, hair light brown, stoop shouldered, wears dark suit of clothes, black raincoat, black soft hat, tan shoes.

The funeral of the murdered policeman will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

FALL FROM DOME KILLS
Albert J. Newsom Succumbs to Injuries at Salem.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—Albert J. Newsom, who fell Thursday from the base of the dome at the State House to the third floor, crushing his skull, died this morning at the Salem Hospital as a result of his injuries. He was 35 years old and is survived by a wife, parents and other relatives. The body was taken to Portland for cremation.

GRADING TO BEGIN MONDAY
Work on Lebanon Branch Has Been Let to Hayden Bros.

LEBANON, Or., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—Work will begin Monday on grading the Lebanon-Crabtree branch of the Wood-

burn-Springfield line. Twoby Bros., who received the contract from the Southern Pacific for the work, have sublet it to Hayden Bros., who have already reached this city with a grading crew and outfit. Two grading camps have been established, one one and a half miles northeast of this city and another four miles north-east. Both camps will be the scene of considerable activity next week. Hayden Bros. brought about 30 teams with them, but will secure all of the men and teams possible in this vicinity. Almost every day some material for railroad construction is arriving in Lebanon and the work of construction of the new line will be rushed.

While the grading is going forward work will also be rushed on the big railroad bridge which will span the South Santiam at this city, below the wagon bridge.

LIQUOR CASE HARD FOUGHT
Prosecution Alleges Defense Approached Chief Witness.

GRANTS PASS, Or., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—One of the hardest contested cases upon the charge of selling liquor in violation of the prohibition law took place yesterday when August Fetsch was duly arraigned for trial. At the very outset the jurymen were confronted with exacting and sweeping questions that called for answers that would test their prejudice or bias for or against prohibition. Many amusing incidents occurred during the examination.

The opening statement of the counsel for the state to the jury suggested that Tom Thorson, an anti-saloon devotee residing at 734 Kearney street, Portland, was approached two weeks ago by the defendant and offered \$650 to stay away from Grants Pass during Circuit Court week.

The defendant also attempted to prove an alibi by several witnesses. The courtroom was crowded with advocates and friends of both sides of the question.

SHE RODE ON FIRST TRAIN
Portland Woman Recalls Operation of Early Portage Railway.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—The distinction of riding in the first railway train in the Northwest, which ran between Lower and the Upper Cascades on the Oregon side of the straits, was enjoyed by Mrs. L. A. Borchert, whose home is now at 211 Monroe street, in Portland.

Mrs. Borchert says that the passenger car on which she rode at that time was brought from California and put together in her back yard at the Lower Cascades.

She is now 83 years old and was a resident of Vancouver for 40 years. She has spent the past few days in this city, the guest of W. R. Borchert.

CHURCH TO COST \$10,000
United Brethren Congregation Is Erecting New Building.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—The United Brethren congregation of this city has begun erection of a new church building which will cost \$10,000. The structure will be of concrete blocks, and will be 40x60 feet in size, with a gallery 20x40 feet on the second floor, extending eight feet over the entrance to the building.

Arrangements are being made for laying the cornerstone, and it is expected that Bishop Bell will be present to deliver the address and have the special exercises, which are to be held probably on October 17.

Adjourned Session Is Held.

ALBANY, Or., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—Judge William Galloway held an adjourned term of Department No. 2, State Circuit Court, here this forenoon and entered decrees of registration in nine applications to register title under the Torrens land law, granted two divorces and made minor orders in many other pending cases. Decrees of divorce were granted in the cases of C. F. Butler vs. Bertha Butler and Edna Collins vs. Fred Collins. Nine decrees of registration is by far the largest number of decrees entered here in one day.

Yakima to Set Million Trees.

NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—More than 1,000,000 fruit trees will be planted in Yakima Valley for the next season. Some of these trees will be planted this fall, but the great majority will go in next spring. The estimate is made by J. M. Brown, F. E. Thompson and N. J. Damon, who are considered the best experts in the valley. There were upward of 1,000,000 trees planted this season, and these men believe a greater number will go in this year.

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HAY AIDS M'CREDIE

State Needs Solid Republican
Delegation.

SHIP SUBSIDY IS URGED

Washington's Governor Insists Bo-
nus to Shipping Interest Is De-
cided Republican Doctrine.
Executive at Fair for Day.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—Governor Hay, while in Seattle Friday, sent the following telegram to Judge W. W. McCredie, of Vancouver, Republican candidate for Congress from the Second District:

"Kindly accept my congratulations upon your nomination. I wish you every success. Every loyal Republican in the district will support you."

"It is to the best interest of district and state that a solid Republican delegation be maintained at the National capital. Measures very important to our state some before the next Congress. Our President advocates enactment of a good merchant marine law. Such a law will add greatly to the state's wealth and commerce. It is distinctly a Republican measure, and the President must have a Republican Congress to pass proper bill."

Questioned as to the issue raised in certain quarters about Judge McCredie's eligibility owing to the constitutional provision making judges in this state ineligible for any other office during the time of their judgeship, Governor Hay expressed the opinion that he had not the slightest doubt about Judge McCredie's eligibility.

Pointdexter Case Similar.

"Why, we have one Congressman already whose case is practically parallel. Judge Pointdexter was on the Superior Bench in Spokane County at the time of his election to Congress."

Governor Hay admits that there is a slight difference in the two cases, in the fact that Judge Pointdexter's term on the bench expired before he was sworn in as member of Congress, while Judge McCredie's term is not to expire until beyond the time of his taking his seat in the house, in the case of his election. He does not, however, consider this as a vital difference, as it is the status of a candidate at the time of his election that is contemplated in the state law. The status of Judge McCredie now and that of Judge Pointdexter at the time of his election last November is identical.

Governor Hay expects to leave the state, accompanied by Mrs. Hay and by Adjutant General George B. Lamping, October 20, to meet President Taft and become a member of the President's party on his trip down the Mississippi river from St. Louis to New Orleans by steamboat. He expects to return to Olympia about November 15. This will keep him out of the second district and out of the state until the election is over.

Hay Greets Boyhood Friend.

Today Governor Hay spent viewing the exposition in company with a boyhood friend, George Burnham, who with Colonel D. C. Collier, director general, is a member of the Panama-California Exposition Commission, and who is now in Seattle in the interest of that projected fair, and was reared in the same town with Governor Hay in Minnesota, Jackson. In the southern part of the state, "We were both clerks in little stores about 25 years ago," said the Governor, "and we were great friends. I named my daughter, Neva, after Mrs. Burnham. We just put in the time today going over the exposition together and talking over old times."

TRAIN ORDERED REPLACED
State Commission Demands Local Service to Pendleton.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—The State Railroad Commission has written District Attorney G. W. Phelps, of Umatilla County, requesting the District Attorney to commence mandamus proceedings to compel the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company to comply with the order of the Commission of September 9, 1907.

The order referred to required the O. R. & N. to operate a passenger train daily between Pendleton and Portland.

FACULTY RULE SEVERE
SEVERAL SOPHOMORES MAY BE EXPELLED.

President Campbell Is Determined
That Hazing Shall Be Stamped Out at Oregon.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Or., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—Despite the faculty's promise of leniency to the sophomores who would confess their share in the recent prank on the freshmen at the university, there is a report on the campus tonight that the advisory committee, composed of President Campbell and Professors Straub, Shaffer and Young, is to recommend to the faculty that the sophomores be expelled.

The students in general feel that as this is practically the heaviest penalty that the faculty can inflict, the sophomores all of whom voluntarily gave themselves up, are being treated unfairly. The student body, although opposed to hazing as shown by recent resolutions concerning the implicated men, is indignant because of the drastic measures which it is reported President Campbell and the faculty are to take against several of the implicated.

The 22 freshmen were only put through a comical role lasting not over 35 minutes.

President Campbell tonight said: "As chairman of the advisory committee, although I feel great sympathy for the implicated students and admiration for their frank confession, I am in favor of such action as will forever dispense with the barbaric custom of hazing at the State University."

Dies While Guest of Brother.

ALBANY, Or., Oct. 2.—(Special.)—While visiting at the home of his brother, W. C. Breckenridge, in this city, John Breckenridge, of Viola, Ill., died today. He arrived here several days ago and shortly afterward was attacked by heart trouble, which caused his death today. He was a native of Ohio, 62 years old. He leaves a widow.
